Strange Discovery of South American

Miners-Life in Patagonia. " Patagonia is a rough country, but strongly in contrast with the well-

dressed brokers.

About three years Captain Callom was a sailor before the mast on a Cape Horn clipper, and was shipwrecked in a storm on a rocky strip of coast, where he almost lost his life. While wandering through the in-

terior, trying to reach Montevideo, Captain Cullom picked up many rich specimens of silver ore, a few of which kept until, after many hardships, he landed in this city one year later. On the evidence of these specimens raised sufficient money to purchase the brig Eliza Thompson, which he loaded with iron consigned to parties in Rosarie, Brazil. 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
