STATISTICS show that there is a fall in prices of manufactured goods and provisions all over the world. The causes of this fall in prices is ascribed to the lessened product of gold and the demand for it all over the world.

THE amount of expenditures at the penitentiary, for the quarter ending June 30th, was \$6,552.22; earnings and collections, \$6,537.05, leaving a balance of expenditures over the receipts of \$15.17; work amounting to \$566.68, for which cash was not paid, but which should be figured in the receipts. This leaves a remainder of \$428.71 of receipts above expenditures.

THE untimely death of Commander Henry H. Gorringer is announced. He died in New York city on the 6th inst. He was here three years ago and engaged in some enterprises of local importance. It was at his shipyard at Philadelphia, that the Tilloe E. Starbuck and the Clarence S. Bennett were built, the first and second respectively full rigged iron sailing ships built in the United States, both vessels making their first trip to Astoria. Commander Gorringer was an able man and a gallant officer and had he lived would have made a substantial name for himself in his country's history.

"REFORM" seems to be sticking close around. If the custom house business on this coast is overhauled it will be found that "economy" which is only another name for good management, will require an efficient force of officials, and what will be saved by curtailing expenses will be only a part of what will be lost by reason of inefficient service. The custom house at Los Angeles, California, is the only one on the list that could be dispensed with. As for the custom houses here and at Portland it is quite evident that in any event the most urgent necessity exists for continuance of a custom house here and in case any change should be it is probable that the Portland custom house would be consolidated with this one, as here is where the business is done.

THE arrival of the steamer Wisconsin in New York harbor with over 500 converts to Mormonism, drawn from the dregs of European peasantry, with passage prepaid, through tickets to Utah in their pockets and half a dozen Mormon missionaries in charge, is a suggestive spectacle. It is daily becoming more evident that, while what is being done against the Mormon plague is good so far as it goes, it does not go far enough. We have been trusting to the legal proceedings inaugurated to clear the territory of the pest, while all the time fresh supplies of material from Europe have been arriving. If paupers can be prohibited from landing at Castle Garden because they are likely to be a burden on the country, why should not Mormons be prohibited for the reason

that they are becoming a moral curse? There is as much reason in the one case as in the other, and the sentiment of the nation will uphold any legislation that may be undertaken with a view of diminishing either the influence or the numbers of these people. The only drawback to such legislation is the fact that it will be practically inoperative. If there were a law prohibiting the immigration of Mormons, as many people as ever would go to Utah, but not a Mormon could be found among their number.

TALKING of salmon the California Greener and Casner says that just now "there is a very encouraging inquiry from London and Liverpool. There is some little demand for Australian shipment, and the movement by rail is of very fair volume. Whatever the pack may be, an active movement must follow. On the Sacramento river packing was suspended several weeks ago, and there is no probability of any general activity for the rest of the season, though it has yet two months to run. There has been no run of salmon at all for the past week, and old fishermen have abandoned the idea of fishing in August. The Sacramento river pack has not exceeded 19,000 cases at the outside. Last season at this time there had been a pack of treble that volume. The Rogue river pack is not more than one-third the volume of the pack of last year. The light packs all around naturally have expedited the movement somewhat and Columbia river packers have enjoyed whatever benefits can be claimed for reported that Columbia river fish is being packed for Sacramento river early sales in such a season. SIXTY YEARS' PROGRESS. As late as 1825, a prominent member of the United States senate, in his speech opposing the creation of one solitary fort in the vast Columbia river country, said: "Oregon can never become one of the United States. It can never be of any essential benefit to the Union; therefore it is inexpedient to adopt any measures for its occupation and settlement. Suppose it ever should have a member of congress and he should travel thirty miles a day, allowing for Sunday, 350 days of a year would be required to come to the capital and return. A young, able-bodied senator might travel from Oregon to the Atlantic and back once a year, but he could do nothing else. He might come here more expeditiously through Behring's strait, round the northern coast of the continent to Baffin's bay, thence to the Atlantic and so on to Washington. Of course this passage has not yet been discovered, but it will be as soon as Oregon becomes a state."

The days of prophecy had gone by when this gentleman considered Oregon more remote than the uttermost parts of the earth are now. He lived to see Oregon divided into four great domains, each of which has six times the area and natural wealth of that which he represented in the senate. At that time the speech was not considered foolish, and yet today the representative from Oregon can get aboard the cars at Portland on Monday, live like a prince, dining and sleeping as he goes, and be in Washington on Saturday, less wearied than by a twelve hours' journey by stage. This defeat of distance is not more strange than the development of Pacific civilization toward that of the Atlantic, till the gap closed. The word "desert" will be eliminated, and the vast unknown region now supporting hundreds of thousands, is capable of supporting millions. It offers an equal chance for all.
