For the year ending June 30, 1884 the total receipts of the custom house here aggregated \$70, 377.87; for the year ending June 33, 1885, the sum was \$54,492.61—nearly \$16,000 less. This is due to a variety of causes. A compartively recent reduction made A comparatively recent reduction made the tax on inbound foreign vessels six cents a loa, instead of thirty cents a ton; admitted vessels from Victoria, at three cents a ton, instead of thirty and gave free admission to vessels from the isthmus. A thousand ton vessel bound in from Australia for instance, formerly paid \$300; now she pays \$60—a saving to the vissel's our eri of \$240 and a corresponding lessening of that amount in the re-ceipts of customs. EASTERN SALMON SHIPMENTS.

Before the Columbia river canneries had direct rail connection with the east, says the Portland Journal of Commerce, the subject of the ultimate destination of the portion of the pack consumed in the United States was not of striking importance. It was exported through the usual channels or sent to San Francisco to be distributed from that point. The completion of the transcontinental lines into the northwest, however, has naturally widened the market of home consumption, and by reason of the overpack and prevailing low prices of the last two seasons, many of our canners have turned their attention to the possibilities of sales in the eastern and interior cities. The following statistics have been pre-pared from sources absolutely trustwor-thy, and the figures given may be relied upon as wholly accurate. The statement includes shipments to all eastern points, and for convenience reads in tons:
