LIFE IN SIBERIA.
From a man who has been in Siberia for several years past, the *Post-Intelligencer* learns some things of interest. The population is sparse, and is composed chiefly of mixed breeds, with a few Russians and natives of unmixed blood. They live mostly by fishing. The fish, like those on our own side of the North Pacific ocean, are of many varieties. Salmon is the most plentiful and common. Down the coast the salmon are smaller, and about like our silver sides. The Kamshatka salmon are immense, ranging from 40 to 100 pounds apiece. Off the coast are cod, seal and whale. There is but little communication with the outside. Petropavloski is a forbidding place, the country about being undesirable, the town itself small (about 1000 inhabitants), and poorly put together, and the people ignorant, stolid and unattractive. They go powder, and see nothing but an occasional sealer, whaler, trader or war ship. About half the year they are frozen in. They travel about with dog sleds. Great tales are told of the speed and power of these animals. Our informant says that he has himself gone with a ten-dog team 50 miles in nine hours; also that with the same team he has hauled 1,500 pounds of freight 80 miles in two days. The dogs are fed wholly on fish, a single silver salmon constituting a day's food for one animal. It would be impossible to live there without dogs, and some families have several teams of them. To keep from freezing resort is had to skins and furs. To illustrate: The warmly stockinged feet are put in a skin stocking, with the hair on the inside. This in turn is pushed into a long-legged, skin boot, the foot of which is partially filled with hay. This boot is tied closely around the leg, so as to keep out snow and cold, and they master not only for boots but for pantaloons as well. The seal islands, off the coast, are leased to the Alaska Commercial company, which get from them over a hundred thousand skins a year. Other persons are forbidden to engage in the traffic, yet violations of the regulations are common. Five schooners engaged in illicit sealing were seized last year. The Russians favor Americans in trade over other foreigners, and they look upon us as allied with them in bonds of the firmest friendship. Vladivostok, which is far down the coast, near the Cororan and Chinese lines, is building up rapidly and handsomely, and promises to be a large city. Russian war ships and soldiers are kept there all the time, and in case of trouble that city would become one of the most active points in the empire. The country there will slowly develop in the future, as in the past, and the time will come when it will be of considerable consequence in the commerce of the world, and particularly in that of the west coast of the United States. This country already enjoys the bulk of the Kamchatka trade, having even more than Russia herself. The government permits the use of lands by the people without price, but it passes no title, and for this reason settlement and improvement are retarded.

Horrible Suffering.
Vicksburg, Miss., July 19.—A report has just been received of a horrible butchery in a convict camp at Crew lake, La., on the Vicksburg, Shreveport and New Orleans railroad. It has leaked out that Philip Riley was whipped so unmercifully that he died from the effects. Riley, who was about 18 years of age, was sentenced in New Orleans to one year's servitude for larceny. He protested his innocence to the hour of his death, and it was reported that he was to be pardoned by the governor this month. There are about 371 convicts in the camps who are employed in working on the railroad wheeling dirt and raising the road bed. The camps are under control of Captain C. T. Husted, one of his lieutenants—a man whose heart is as hard as stone—is Joe McQuarters, who is known among the prisoners as 'Joe, the butcher.' It is stated he beat and whipped young Riley after he had fallen at his work, sick and faint from weakness. The boy plead with McQuarters in vain for mercy. While the lash was being applied four negro convicts held the victim down. Young Riley was carried from the pillory to what is called a hospital. He became speechless, and death soon took him beyond the reach of the inhuman wretches at Crew lake. The stories told of the horrors of convict camps are almost incredible, but there is good reason for believing that the worst has not been told. The 'Le-gree' of slavery times was a philanthropist compared with the convict contractor. The prisoners are worked sixteen hours a day. They are half furnished for want of food. While the convict lives the contractor is determined to grind the largest possible profit out of his bones. When the convict dies the contractor loses not a penny, as the supply of this kind of labor is at all times equal to the demand. At one place where the Crew lake convicts were housed for a few weeks, twenty-three newly made graves are to be seen. Protests are being raised in many quarters against the murderous barbarity of contractors; but the legislature of Louisiana is proof against public opinion. It is quite likely the outrages incident to the convict camps will be tolerated for many years to come.

Jewelry Store Robbed.
A large jewelry store in Boston was robbed recently by some ingenious rascals who had secured the combination for the safe lock. They carried off about \$20,000 worth of choice jewelry.
