## JOHN ROACH'S FAILURE.

NEW YORK, July 20.—John Roach, when interviewed on the subject of his failure, said: "Strictly speaking, it is not a failure, for my assignees will be able to pay \$2 for every \$1 of liabilities if they realize anything like the real value of my property. I cannot now say what is the exact amount of my liabilities nor assets, but if I were not so old a man, and if I had my health I could put things straight again. If the people understood this matter, if the mendacious free trade press had not so extensively deceived them, the failure of John Roach would be recognized from ocean to ocean as a national calamity. This is a party question. I have been a Republican, but above that I have first and last been an American. It was my great ambition that our nation should recover its glory and prosperity on the seas. I wanted to prove that American merchandise made by American workmen in American shops could be sold the world over through the medium of American ships, built from iron rolled in our shops and of timber cut from our own forests. I wanted to prove that we could do business on our own bottoms, and that other nations, with less resources, could not be more successful and enterprising on the seas. I have given my life and fortune to that end. Traded and abused by those men and newspapers whom the foreign interests have subsidized, and brought into scandal with millions of my fellow citizens who were deceived by them and who did not understand my purposes, in my old and enfeebled state, and after half a century of toil I have lost my money and spirits, but I am consoled by the fact that the people will one day understand it all and see it in its real value. I tell you those boats were condemned before their keels were laid. They were condemned in congress. The democracy dared not oppose our new navy, because it had become a popular notion. The people in the United States wanted a navy, but the democracy opposed the appropriation because, as they claimed in their congressional speeches, the money could not be honestly spent. The Dolphin, a strong, substantial, excellent vessel was condemned on the most purely technicalities, and to add to this injustice Attorney General Garland has repudiated the contracts, and practically said that there exists no binding agreement between me and the government. That capped the climax—business stagnant, \$30,000 of weekly wages to pay, my works to maintain and my contracts repudiated."

THE NEWS AT WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, July 29.—The announcement of the failure of John Roach caused genuine surprise here. It has been the principal topic of conversation in navy circles and hotel lobbies. The assignment is generally attributed to fear of future complications with the secretary of the navy in regard to the three unfinished cruisers, the Atlanta, Boston and Chicago. A great deal of sympathy is expressed for Roach, and the feeling is general that he has been driven into his unfortunate condition by the secretary of the navy in regard to the Dolphin.

"If looks as if the government was getting left," said a prominent lawyer to-night. "Mr. Whitney hasn't got his boat out of his hands, which has been paid to Mr. Roach, but he has got a lawsuit on his hands."

Secretary Whitney is out of town, and so is Attorney-General Garland, so there can be no official information gathered as to what course the government will pursue regarding the complications and consequent delay in the completion of the three unfinished cruisers.

The trouble likely to grow out of Roach's assignment is deplored by naval officers generally. Of the three unfinished cruisers the Atlanta and the Boston are now about nine-tenths completed, and if the work could be pushed as rapidly as it has been ever since their commencement they might be finished and ready for their trial trips within a month or six weeks. Work upon the Chicago is not so far advanced, but members of the advisory board, until the announcement of Roach's failure to-day, expected that this vessel would be ready for the sea trip certainly by January 1st.

The important question in regard to these cruisers now seems to be whether the government will go ahead and complete them, or whether it will require that the work be done by the assignees. Rear Admiral Simpson, president of the advisory board, said to-night that a clause in the contract provided that in case of the failure of the contractor the government could complete the work itself, looking to the bondsmen for any additional expense beyond the contract price, and this was the course which seemed to him would most likely be pursued. He said that the government had retained sufficient money to complete the vessels. If, however, the assignees should determine to go on, as representatives of Roach, and complete these vessels, they would probably have a perfect right to do so.

SALT LAKE, July 20.—Bishop Sharp, Bishop Clawson, son-in-law of Brigham Young, and Harry Dinwoody, a wealthy furniture dealer, were arraigned to-day and indictments found against them for unlawful cohabitation. All pleaded not guilty. Their trial was set for the second week in September.

WHERE THEY FOUND THE PIGS.

Last Thursday Mr. McGreen and his son-in-law, James Barner, were on a tract of land belonging to Mr. McGreen, known as the slough, looking for a sow and a litter of pigs that had not been seen for several days. While walking over the ground which was of a damp, boggy nature, Barner suddenly sank to his waist. Mr. McGreen was carrying an ax with which he cut a good sized sapling, and passing one end of it to Barner, he succeeded in pulling him out of the hole. As Barner's feet emerged from the mud there was found hanging to the lower hem of one of his pantaloons legs, a large sized rattlesnake. His snakeship had his fangs firmly hooked in the heavy jeans, and was cut to pieces before he would let go his hold. Another snake reared its head from the aperture and was killed. The two men then investigated the den, found, and killed thirty-seven snakes. And stranger still, some twenty feet from the snake nest, and in the same hollow, were found the sow and all of the pigs but two. They had fallen through the thin crust of ground covering the aperture, and were unable to get out without assistance.—Rome, Ga., Courier.

RESIGN, N. W. T., July 20.—There is increasing interest manifested in Riel's trial, and the sheriff is both-ered with applications for admittance to the court rooms. The trial began at 11 A. M. to-day. The defense will raise the question of jurisdiction and constitutionality of the court. Riel's attorneys have assurances from Montana that Dumont and Damas are ready to testify that Riel was called for by the half-breeds, and that he counselled peaceful measures and took no part in the war until the fatal charge, and that the war was commenced and conducted under the direction of a council of fourteen persons, of which Riel was not a member.

LATER—Riel's counsel demanded a change of venue, but the judge overruled the demurrer, and the trial will proceed. The prisoner was heavily ironed and guarded.

LONDON, July 20.—A private telegram from Gastien states that the Emperor William on arriving on the island of Mainau was taken ill and had several fainting fits. He subsequently recovered sufficiently to proceed on his journey, and arrived at Gastien this evening, where he was warmly welcomed.
