quite evident that the deed of June 2, 1885, conveyed the highland adjacent to and on the north side of said block 11. I am informed that this court has ruled, and I must consider that ruling as decisive of the question. But if the deed referred to showed an evident intent to reserve the said riparian rights to the grantors, they and their successors should be adjudged the owners thereof. In Colman v. Winslow, 10 Mass. 129, it was held that a deed to a tract of land bounded on a street or way would not be construed as extending across the street or way so as to include other lands and flats below high-water mark. Such a construction might have been applied in this case if the said grantors had owned the land below the water mark. But where the right to the latter land is only incidental to the ownership of the highland, I think it would not be separated therefrom without a special reservation in such grant, and I am unable to discover any reservation in the deed of June 2, 1885. Besides, Welch himself does not seem to have supposed that his right to purchase from the state arose out of any such reservation, as is based upon his alleged ownership of block 11. I am of the opinion, therefore, that the equities are with the respondents, and that they should have a decree enjoining the appellants from interfering with their riparian rights in front of said block under and by virtue of said deed from the state, which is the extent of the relief I think they are entitled to, and that neither party should recover costs.

THE ASTORIA LAND GRANT.

Official Notice of the Forfeiture of the Oregon Central Lands Received at the Oregon City Office.

The following self-explanatory letter has been received from Register Bain, of the United States land office at Oregon City:

UNITED STATES LAND OFFICE, OREGON CITY, July 21st. This office is now in receipt from the general land office of the official notice of the act of congress of January 31st, 1885, declaring the forfeiture of certain unearned lands granted to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from Portland to Astoria and McMinnville, and flings under the homestead, preemption and other laws will now, if properly made, be allowed at this office.

Under the provisions of the second section of said act, persons who on January 31, 1885, were actual settlers in good faith on the restored lands claimed by them, and are qualified to make the entry applied for have a preference right of entry, but such preference right must be exercised within six months from this date.

If any such person is not entitled to make entry under the homestead, pre-emption or other laws he may purchase within one year from the date of the act, to-wit, January 31, 1886, not exceeding 160 acres of land embraced in his settlement or occupation, at the price of \$1.25 per acre.

Persons applying for the preference right of entry under the homestead, pre-emption or other general laws, or for the right of purchase under the special provisions of said act, will be required to prove their actual settlement and occupation of the lands so claimed.

Such proof must be made to the satisfaction of the register and receiver, and may be by affidavit executed before them, corroborated by witnesses, settlement, the facts relative to actual occupation of the land and the nature, extent and value of improvements.

Final proof, under the settlement and improvement laws, will be made in the manner provided under those laws respectively.

The price of all lands within the restored limit is \$1.25 per acre, but the same are not subject to sale of ordinary private cash entry.

GRANT'S LAST HOURS.

MOUNT MCGREGOR, N. Y. July 23. I. A. M.—The general remains in the same quiet condition. His pulse and respiration are unchanged, and there is a feeling that he may tide over the night season of weakness and tire until 4 A. M. Hypodermic injections of brandy are being used.

2 A. M.—The family is astir at the cottage, though there are no visible indications that point to other conditions than at the time of the last bulletin.

3 A. M.—Grant is in a somnolent condition. The respirations have grown shallow, and the general is no longer able to expectorate, because of weakness, which is increasing. There seems but little possibility that the patient will survive the night.

4 A. M.—The respirations are 50, and the pulse so rapid as not to be counted. Hypodermic injections, which have been quite freely administered through the night, have no longer a marked effect. The family are astir.

5:25 A. M.—The respirations have increased to sixty, and the death rattle occasioned by the filling of the lungs and throat with mucus, is heard. He now recognizes his friends by opening his eyes.

7:10 A. M.—Grant is dead.

TERRITORIAL CENSUS.

Returns have been registered from all but three Puget Sound counties, and all but four of the counties of western Washington, namely: Skamania, Mason, San Juan and Clallam. The counties heard from show up handsomely compared with 1883 and years previous, and almost justify the claim of 50 per cent. increase in the past two years, and of a present population in the territory of 100,000 inhabitants. The two latest censuses compare as follows:

The only county showing a lessened number of inhabitants is Whatcom, and the decrease there is accounted for by the division of the county by the legislature and the creation of Skagit county. Whatcom and Skagit together, as they were in 1883, have now 5,911 inhabitants, against 3,665 two years ago. All the other counties gained largely. The aggregate population of the fifteen counties reported in the table above was in 1883, 66,290, and in 1885, 68,422. Returns from the eastern counties come in slower, and it will be a month yet before all are heard from.
