UNRULY CONVICTS.
How They Were Subdued by a Determined Warden.

NEW YORK, July 25.—For three days the Brooklyn penitentiary has been in a state of uproar through the convicts striking for an improved bill of fare, the demand being for meat at breakfast. At 8 o'clock there were eighty men in the dark cells. Before noon sixty of them sent word to Warden Green, saying that they were sorry to have caused him any trouble and expressing a willingness to comply with the rules of the institution in the future. Mr. Green took these men at their word. He said he was willing to permit them to return to their own cells, on the strength of the promises made, and significantly added that if such promises were not kept, it would be the worse for them. The men were marched back to their cells, under the surveillance of eight keepers with drawn revolvers, and for a time they remained peaceful.

At noon the warden went home, and when he returned at 8 P. M. he found the situation more serious than ever before. Starting in the long term prison, the shouts of the rebellious convicts had been taken up by the short-term men and were echoed by the piping voices of the women. Cell doors were being battered, and threats of violence against the warden and his men, to the act of accompanying of ribald songs and obscene jests, rang through the buildings. Mr. Green found the ringleader to be Tom Tivy, and he determined to make an example of him. With eight keepers, armed with double acting revolvers, Green went to the main prison. The keepers first went to the dark cells. Green stationed a man at each cell with a pistol in hand, and then opening the doors, said: "If this noise does not stop you will be taken out separately and flogged."

There was not a word spoken after waiting some moments, during which perfect quiet prevailed. Mr. Green ordered the doors locked again, and took his men to the third tier, which contained the cell occupied by Tivy. The doors of all the cells in a tier are opened and closed simultaneously by a spring bolt. In order to get into one cell it is necessary to spring back the lock which fastens them all. Green announced that Tivy was on the tier who left his cell when the bolts were sprung would be shot on the spot.

Each keeper having his place, with his pistol ready, the word was given to unfasten the bolt, and immediately there was the flash of a revolver. No one was shot and the doors had been swung back and locked again before the smoke from the pistol had cleared away. It was simply a device and it answered its purpose. When again the locks were sprung back not a man left his cell. Everything was quiet. While the doors were open the warden walked along the tier to Tivy's cell. Tivy had wrenched a large wooden roller from the top of his cell, and held it in his upraised hand ready for use. Mr. Green did not parley long with Tivy. Leveling his pistol at the prisoner, he said: "I will give you ten seconds to drop that club and come out of your cell." Tivy dropped his weapon on the spot and marched out of the cell. The bolts were then sprung back and the keepers withdrew from their positions.

Green now marched his man down the steps leading from the third tier to the hallway, and told him to take off his jacket, the command being audible all over the prison. "I am willing to go back to the dark cell," said Tivy, "and give you no more trouble."

"Take off your jacket," repeated the warden. "If you do not, I will do it for you."

Tivy reluctantly removed his coat and glanced mournfully at two stout cowhides, one of which was in the hand of the warden and the other in the hand of Keeper Kelly, who stands six feet two inches in his shoes and is considered one of the strongest and most athletic men in the country.

"You will oblige me," said Green, addressing the prisoner, "by removing your shirt." The prisoner did so and then the lash applied by both Green and an athletic individual who was assisting him, the blows cut deep into the flesh, and as each stroke fell on the bare back of the prisoner he uttered piercing shrieks of pain. Murders came from some of the cells. When the first five lashes had been administered the warden stopped the thrashing process for a moment and gave it to be understood that the next prisoner who made a disturbance would be taken out of his cell and similarly dealt with. Then the thrashing proceeded. Tivy was held in position and ten more lashes were given. The man was then returned to his cell. So far as quellng rebellious tendencies of prisoners was concerned, the treatment proved entirely successful.

THE TEST OF GRANT'S GENERALSHIP.

"Why," I asked General Sherman once, "did you and Sheridan always acknowledge Grant to be your leader?" "Because," he responded in his quick, idiomatic manner, "while I could map out a dozen plans for a campaign, every one of which Sheridan would swear he could fight out to victory, neither he nor I could tell which one of the plans was the best one; but Grant, who simply sat and listened and smoked while we had been talking over the maps, would at the end of our talking tell us which was the best plan, and in a dozen or two words the reason of his decision, and then it would all be so clear to us that he was right that Sheridan and I would look at each other and wonder why we hadn't seen the advantage of it ourselves."

"I tell you," he continued, after a moment's pause, "Grant is not appreciated yet. The critics of Europe are too ignorant of American geography to appreciate the conditions of his campaigns. What is it to march an army from Berlin to Paris? Look at the multitude of roads. Look at the facilities of transportation. Consider how many times the same ground has been fought over by successful commanders. Is not every point of vantage known? What commander can blunder where all the conditions lie open to his eye? But I have seen Grant plan campaigns for 500,000 troops along a front line 2,500 miles in length, and send them marching to their objective points through sections where the surveyor's chain was never drawn and where the commissariat necessities alone would have broken down any transportation system of Europe, and three months later I have seen those armies standing where he said they should be, what he planned and accomplished. And I give it as my military opinion that General Grant is the greatest commander of modern times and with him only three others can stand—Napoleon, Wellington and Moltke."—Eastern Corr.
