### A ROYAL ROW.

LONDON, July 27.—It will be remembered that at the wedding of Princess Beatrice the queen herself gave the bride away, although the official programme assigned this duty to the prince of Wales. The reasons for this change in the programme turns out to be that the prince of Wales all along refused to take any part whatever in the ceremonies, and declined even to be present at his sister's marriage. His name was, however, placed on the programme without his knowledge, and in obedience to the imperative command of his royal mother, he reluctantly consented to attend the wedding. Upon his arrival at Osborne house, Beatrice vainly begged the prince to give away the bride, and the queen added her commands with as little effect. The prince declared the match was beneath the dignity of the royal family, and the alliance worse even than that formed by the marriage of Princess Louise to the marquis of Lorne. If Beatrice must be given to an obscure beggar it should never be done with his consent, and certainly not by his act.

At this juncture the duke of Edinburgh, probably with an eye to his mother's hoarded millions, came forward and offered to officiate. He was promptly and effectually snubbed, however, by the queen, who doubtless seeing that the substitution of the duke of Edinburgh for the prince of Wales in so important and conspicuous a capacity would create immediate suspicion that a serious eruption had taken place in the family, decided personally to give the bride away. Couriers were accordingly instructed to circulate a story that the queen, anxious to give crowning proof of her affection for her only remaining daughter, would personally give her away.

A report is current in imperial circles across the channel that Ex-Empress Eugenie made Princess Beatrice her chief legate, in partial recognition of the constant and tender friendship of the queen, but more that her fortune may be diverted from the family of the hated Jerome. As the ex-empress is understood to be one of the wealthiest persons in Europe, the legacy, when it falls in, will be a very welcome addition to the exchequer of the "beggarly Battenburg."

Serious apprehensions are felt for the health of Mrs. Grant since the death of the general. It has been this sickness, or rather the weakening of it, which causes what to many must be the inexplicable delay of the funeral. Under other circumstances it would have taken place as early as the 24 or even the 25 day of August—in fact, within the shortest time possible within which the necessary arrangements could be made. All the necessary arrangements could be made quite easily before the time set, as much as a week indeed; but what first was a reasonable fear that after the great siege the family could not stand the excitement and fatigue of the funeral, has become a sad reality.

LONDON, July 27.—It is now announced that services in memory of General Grant at Westminster Abbey will take place at 4 o'clock Tuesday, August 4. The dean of Westminster will read the Episcopal service, and Rev. Dr. Farrar will deliver an address. A large number of Americans have been allotted seats for the occasion.

The preservation of General Grant's remains during the heated term for a period of ten days is a matter of no little importance. Two days were occupied in the thorough embalming of the remains, the cavities and arteries being supplied with embalming fluid which displaced the blood, as it was introduced. This embalming fluid will be to-morrow displaced and replaced by another operation with fresh fluid. The process of absorption also renders frequent treatment of the remains advisable if not necessary.

The forces now at work on the Cascade branch of the N. P. R. R. Co. will be doubled on August 1st, and the line pushed to completion. Lately two new camps have been added to the grading force, increasing the number thirty men, and other additions will be made shortly. Nelson Bennett, the contractor on the branch, is in the city securing laborers for the work.

This man had a son and one daughter. The son died, leaving about \$1,000 to the girl, who was but a child. It is said by his neighbors that he actually charged his own daughter for board until the \$1,000 had found its way to his bank account.—Boston Post.
