"STRUCK LIE."

An Important Discovery.

A discovery has been made in Payallup valley, W. T., about fifteen miles east of Tacoma, which promises to revolutionize the oil trade. The exact location is near Eli, about six miles from the Cascade branch of the Northern Pacific railroad. On this spot over a year and a half ago traces of oil were discovered. F. E. Smith, who is interested in this important find, reports that the discovery was kept quiet and prospecting continued, and the oil indications were so encouraging that a corporation was formed called the Tacoma Oil company, with L. F. Thompson, the hoping, president, and W. H. Fife as secretary.

A few weeks since the officers of the company became so well satisfied that there was a vast deposit of oil where their lands were located that they sent to Pennsylvania for two experts and also for well-boring machinery. The oil experts, with their boring apparatus, have arrived, and began operations last Monday.

The indications, the Pennsylvania men say, are the best they ever saw, and the confidence in striking a flowing well is very great.

The oil so far found is what is known as "amber," and burns in a lamp readily without being refined. It is of the highest known grade. It is anticipated that the borers will consume thirty days time in sinking the well 1,500 feet.

There is already considerable excitement over the affair in Tacoma, and oil prospectors are out in every direction.

The importance of this discovery, should it prove that flowing wells are plenty, cannot be over estimated. With oil in plenty the country around Tacoma could supply the entire Pacific coast and the whole country for at least half way across the continent. Washington territory may yet have its coal oil Tommy, and as Colonel Sellers would say, "There's millions in it."
