WHERE THE REMAINS WILL REST.
NEW YORK, July 28.—The site chosen for General Grant's tomb is in Riverside park on a sort of promontory on the Hudson river, and in the highest point in Manhattan. The outward swell of the promontory begins at One Hundred and Twenty-second street and the river bank, and returns to its regular line at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. The summit of this elevation is almost a level plateau of something more than twenty acres. On the river side the descent is abrupt. At its foot, 200 feet below, are the tracks of that branch of the Hudson River railroad that runs into the West Thirtieth street depot. On the northwest is the ferry to Fort Lee, and on the north and northeast the red brick stores, houses and manufactories of Manhattanvale cluster around the base of the hill. If the observer looks to the north he has opened before him the long vista of Riverside park, of drives, hewn stone walls and ancient oaks and maples, on the steep slopes of the Hudson. The spot suggests revolutionary war memories. Fort Lee is opposite, the old fort in Central park is on the southeast, Fort Washington is on the north, and the highlands near West Point shut in the horizon beyond the Tappan zodiac. No structures can be erected to break the uniformity of the view, as the water front and park belong to the city. The temporary tomb to receive the body will be built of brick.

General Perry said that the arrangements for the Grant funeral procession could not be completed for two or three days. Military and civic organizations, as well as Grand Army posts from nearly every state in the Union had applied for positions in the line. The Grand Army men he has arranged in a solid body, divided into four or five divisions. There will be two divisions from this city, and other divisions will be made up of delegates from visiting posts. Each division will be headed by a band of music, and will march in double file. The First and Second divisions of the National guard of the state of New York will form a prominent feature of the parade, and it is probable that many militia organizations from this state and other states will take part. Three militia organizations from Illinois have already given notice that they will be present.

It is requested that all civic and military organizations desiring to take part in the parade will report at once to General Hancock, on Governor's island. The parade will probably be headed by a full force of mounted police. It was said that from 25,000 to 30,000 veterans would take part in the parade on Saturday August 8th. Each division will carry post colors and old battle colors, and old battle flags, massed in the center of the division.

Mayor Grace said to-day that it was more than probable that the board of aldermen would very shortly change the name of Riverside park to Grant park.

GRANT'S LAST VISIT TO OREGON.
A number of the state papers have referred to General Grant's last visit to Portland in September, 1883. When Mr. Frederick Billings was here, a short time ago, he alluded to this visit in conversation with the editor of the Standard. Mr. Billings said that he did not know anything about Mr. Villard's great excursion until the plans were published in the newspapers. He disapproved of it so utterly that he immediately notified Mr. Villard that he should not attend, and it was only upon the assurance of Horace White, the treasurer of the O. R. & N. Co., that his absence would excite suspicion in regard to the financial condition of the Villard companies, and perhaps bring on a crisis, that he reluctantly consented to make the trip. While coming out, Mr. Billings, for the first time in his life, had an opportunity to become personally acquainted with General Grant. After the ceremonies of the first day were over in Portland, General Grant told Mr. Billings that it would be impossible for him to have such a visit in Portland and vicinity at that time as he desired, and that if there was a good opportunity to slip away he would like to return to New York. Mr. Billings had done all he supposed doing on the trip, and so he took General Grant and William M. Ervatt into his car and went home. On this return trip he had the pleasure of free and unstrained association with General Grant, and, though in 1872 he had in a public speech in Vermont, criticised the low tone of Grant's administration, and in 1880 had gone to Chicago and worked night and day to prevent the nomination of Grant for a third term, he was charmed with the companionship of his distinguished guest, and became from that time his devoted friend.

As they were nearing New York, General Grant said, "Mr. Billings, if it is not too much trouble to you, I wish you would let me go with you to the Pacific coast sometime when you go again, when I can have time and opportunity to see that country, where I spent some of my early days." It was afterwards arranged that General Grant and his wife should accompany Mr. and Mrs. Billings on a trip to Portland, this summer. Just before Mr. Billings started on his last trip over the road, he called upon General Grant, between whose family and his own there had been an intimate acquaintance since the Villard excursion, and expressed his deep regret that General Grant was unable to make the trip with him. General Grant then wrote in reply: "My Dear Billings: I am very sorry that I cannot go to Portland with you. I hope you will have a pleasant trip, and when you return come and see me and tell me all about it." "If he were not sick," Mr. Billings added, Grant would be here, talking with you and me, to-night."
