BLOOD UNDER THE MICROSCOPE.
"The only instance on record when the blood of two persons was compared in a criminal trial," said Dr. Piper, the microscopic expert, to the San Francisco Call, "was in a murder case in Chicago. The comparison settled the innocence of the woman on trial for her life. A comely woman, with \$20,000, married a man in Chicago, and placed her snug little sum in his business. In the course of time he began to abuse her, and finally she decided to apply for a divorce. The double calamity of losing a woman to beat and withdrawal of her \$20,000 from his business made the brute furious, and next morning he was found dead in one corner of his bed chamber, a bullet having gone through his heart. His wife was found wounded in another part of the room. She said that her husband had come home the night before in a rage and began to abuse her while she was in bed; that he hit her on the head with the butt of his revolver while her head was on the pillow and spattered blood over the linen; that she jumped up, and he shot her, inflicting a slight flesh wound in her side. She then rushed at him, and snatching the revolver from him, shot him through the heart. He reeled to the corner where he was found and died. The prosecution did not believe her story, and set up the theory that she shot him while he was asleep, and dragged him to the corner, and then inflicted the wound on herself. The carpet where the dead man lay was saturated with blood. According to the theory of the prosecution, the blood on the pillow was his also. I put the section of the pillow with the blood upon it under the microscope and drew on a card-board the shape of the corpuscles, enlarged about 2,000 diameters. I then put the blood on the carpet under the microscope in the same way. The comparison was wonderful. The corpuscles on the pillow were bright, round and clean. They were beautiful. The corpuscles on the carpet were large and disfigured, the result of disease. Comparison settled that question at once. The blood corpuscles were as different as day and night, and sustained the woman's account of the shooting. As between human blood and dog's blood, the microscope enables the expert to determine precisely whether a specimen is from a human being or a dog. But it is impossible to determine between human blood and a hog's blood. This fact convicted one man that I know of. He claimed that the blood on his clothes was dog's blood. I was able to show that it was not dog's blood; but if he had said it was hog's blood I could not have contradicted the statement."

RAISING THE DEAD.
Dr. Richardson, in a recent number of the *Astorian*, suggests some serious reflections on the questions of what is death? When does death occur? May life be restored after actual death? By combining "artificial circulation" with artificial respiration a dog was restored to life one hour and five minutes after being killed by an overdose of chloroform, the heart being perfectly still, cold and passing into rigidity. Animals that have been killed by suffocation, the heart and other viscera displayed by partial dissection, were so far brought into a state of muscular irritability that the experiment was stopped from motives of humanity, lest the mutilated body should return to conscious sentient life. Frogs poisoned by nitrate of amyl were restored after nine days of apparent death; in one case after signs of putrefaction change had commenced. Various methods of effecting these resuscitations are described, the most original and effective being that of pumping warm dechlorinated and oxygenized blood into an artery in such a manner that the stroke of the pump shall correspond with the natural pulsations of the artery, and to the stroke of the heart, which is thus awakened to its customary work. The action of peroxide of hydrogen in reanimating the blood and restoring animal heat in a really dead body is quite startling. Dr. Richardson's paper appears to justify the conclusion that a drowned or suffocated man is not hopelessly dead so long as the bodily organs remain uninjured by violence or disease, and the blood remains sufficiently liquid to be set in motion artificially, and supplied with a little oxygen to start the chemical movements of life.

Lewiston, July 31.—A messenger brings the following from L. P. Brown, dated Mt. Idaho, July 30: "War is raging among the Indians on the Clearwater, which may lead to an outbreak of the tribe. Nine Pipes and Aleck were killed to-day by a returned hostile. The trouble was about some property. Hostiles have been on Salmon river threatening trouble. A very uneasy feeling exists among the people on the prairies, they fearing an uprising of the tribes." In a letter from Grangeville it was said that a brother of one of the murdered Indians came there and wanted to buy a pistol to slay his brother's murderer. There is great excitement.

THE PUGSLEY-MCINTOSH QUARREL.
Under date of July 23th, the Wilapa correspondent of the Pacific Journal says:
Henry Pugsley had a preliminary examination last Saturday before Justice Skidmore and was acquitted on the grounds of excusable homicide. The testimony, as near as I could learn, was substantially as follows: Pugsley and McIntosh had some words earlier in the day, and Pugsley told McIntosh that he did not want to fight him. After that McIntosh and Hastings had a quarrel, and McIntosh came at Hastings with an axe, whereupon Hastings stood him off with a couple of wedge axes and told him not to come any further. Hastings then said he would quit, and Pugsley said he would quit too. McIntosh said to him, "You won't. Go back and go to work." Pugsley tried to pass and McIntosh rushed upon him with a shovel and Pugsley dodged down. As he dodged, he picked up an axe that was lying in the chute, and raised up and shoved the axe at McIntosh. The axe struck McIntosh on the left arm, cutting through the arm and thence diagonally down between the ribs and entering the heart, killing him almost instantly. It seems that Pugsley was in a place where he could not get out of the way and was forced to defend himself. If he had not dodged just as he did, the shovel would have severed his head from his body.

WANT THEIR MONEY BACK.
A meeting of parties interested in payments made upon lands of the Oregon Central railroad company was held at the St. Charles hotel, Westport, W. T., a few days since. Samuel L. Lovel was elected chairman and Robert James secretary. The chairman addressed the meeting, stating that its object was to take concerted action to recover the amounts paid to the company upon their lands, which were now forfeited; that the company was now in the hands of a receiver and the agents refuse to refund the money made as payments upon land, as agreed in the contracts. A suit would be necessary in order to compel such payment. If the parties interested would unite the percentage of cost would be small; therefore he suggested that a committee be appointed to ascertain the amount of claims that would be willing to unite in pressing this suit, and then the percentage of said claims that it would cost to conduct the suit to a termination. A motion was carried that the chairman constitute a committee of one to take such action as necessary to carry out such suggestion. The number of claims presented was 122, aggregating the sum of \$1,780. The meeting was then adjourned, subject to the call of the chairman.
