Renton, Holmes & Co., of Port Blakely, have bought the American ship *Kate Davenport*. She is 19 years old, 1,249 tons, built at Bath, Maine.

The East Portland Vindicator says that some residents of that burg would be gratified to fence the city in and put up placards reading "Nobody admitted here unless he owns a cow."

The tug *Yucca* got the large sum of \$150 for pulling the *Queen of the Pacific* off the sand at Point Hudson last week. The owners of the *Yucca* are going to take a trip to Europe on the proceeds.

Considerable building and improvement is going on all over the city. Labor and materials are a little cheaper than heretofore, and \$2,000 this summer will do as much as \$3,000 two years ago.

Astoria sends \$400 to Portland every month for Portland daily newspapers and some wonder that the *Astorian* doesn't compete with them for dispatches, circulation, etc. Some people would call that business—others wouldn't.

The attention of the proper officer is directed to the condition of the sewer on the corner of Main and Court streets. It has been sinking worse and worse for six weeks and is a nuisance. If those who have charge are not too busy or too tired, thirty-five cents worth of work might be done there to the great sanitary advantage of the neighborhood.

Everybody remembers with delight the rendition of "Emeralda," where every actor was a star, and the acting was of the best. The Madison Square Theater company will be here in "The Private Secretary" on the 17th, and the following night in the "Rajah." "The Private Secretary" ran two hundred nights at the Madison Square theater in New York, and is now in its second year's run at the Globe theater, London. Carl Adler has the management of this and other first-class companies in Astoria.

There is no time when a business man learns so much as during a period of severe depression. When things are booming, prices high and profits large, hundreds of economies that might be practiced are despised or neglected, the struggle being to produce or sell the greatest amount of goods in the shortest possible time. When reverses come, prices touch the rock bottom and profits disappear, devices for reducing the cost of production and handling of goods are invented and resorted to, which before were never thought of.

The Finnish Lutheran congregation of this city had a bazaar and reunion at Liberty hall yesterday afternoon and evening, which was generously attended and liberally patronized. Rev. J. J. Hoika, the worthy pastor, made a few prefatory remarks, after which Mr. Gustaf Wilson, the Swedish consul, delivered an excellent address in English, replete with patriotism for their adopted country and love for the homes they left behind. Several Finnish songs were sung, after which the articles exposed for sale were disposed of, the exercises winding up with a fine supper, to which all sat down. The proceeds were \$37.45. All present had a pleasant day and evening, and the enterprise reflects credit on those who made it a success.

CITIZEN'S MEETING.

A meeting of citizens was held at the city hall last evening to take fitting measures for the observance of memorial services in this city on the occasion of the funeral of Gen. Grant next Saturday.

The meeting was called to order by A. A. Cleveland, chairman of the council committee, in accordance with whose call the meeting had convened. T. S. Jewett acted as secretary.

After some preliminary discussion it was moved and carried that a grand marshal be appointed. Col. R. R. Spedden was unanimously elected to act in that capacity. On motion a committee of three on programme was appointed, consisting of Messrs. M. C. Crosby, R. V. Monteith and F. D. Winton. On motion Rev. M. D. Wilson was appointed chaplain and empowered to associate with him any other minister that he might choose to select.

On motion a committee of three on music was appointed, consisting of Prof. Utzinger, and Messrs. D. A. McIntosh and H. G. Smith.

It was resolved that the merchants and business men of Astoria be requested to close their respective places of business on Saturday, the 8th inst., from ten o'clock A. M. till after the services were concluded.

I. V. Monteith, Post Commander Cushing Post No. 14, G. A. R., stated that the post would gladly participate in the services and would take whatever part that might be assigned to them on the programme. It was stated that Ross Bros. tendered the use of their opera house in which to hold their services. A deputization consisting of J. C. Ross, J. O. Bazzorth and W. L. Robb, appeared from Astor Lodge No. 6, which had just adjourned, stating the desire of that lodge to cooperate.

On motion the meeting adjourned. It is expected that the different orders, societies, etc., and those desiring to take part in the parade and exercises will report to the marshal, R. R. Spedden, who will assign them their place. The exercises will be held at some hour to be decided upon to-day.

ANOTHER "STILL HUNT."

Her usual style of procedure is to entice a girl whom she can get to listen to her with promise of good wages and a good time, and once getting her to Astoria putting the unfortunate creature in a house of prostitution and compelling the poor wretch to hand over the proceeds of her shame.

The latest exploit of this creature, whom it would be flattery to call a prostitute, was to bring two girls named Nellie Fisher and Laura Mack from San Francisco, placing them in a den of infamy at once and taking their miserable earnings. They complained about it and an effort is now being made to get them out of her clutches.

A Thief Soon Caught.

About ten o'clock last night Jacob Wolff, proprietor of a barber shop next door to L. I. Johnson's cigar store, found that \$85 in gold and \$40 in silver that he had in a little tin box on a bureau in his room, had been stolen. He was led by circumstances to suspect that one Clark employed by him as a barber was the guilty party. A close watch was kept on him and it was found that he was spending money pretty freely at different saloons, and that he had a man engaged to take him across the river. He soon secreted himself under a wagon on Gray's dock where he was found by Officer Carlson, and lodged in jail. He had when arrested \$105.45 on his person, and acknowledged the theft.

Gene Crazy.

Considerable commotion was occasioned at the residence of C. F. McCormac last evening, by his sudden declaration that he owned the building and no one should have possession. After charging round for a while he got behind a building and was pushed into a corner of the room and showed out a revolver at officer Carlson, who had appeared to take him in charge. He was overpowered and secured, after which he was removed to a place of safety. McCormac was formerly city attorney here and made a good many friends and acquaintances, who will be sorry to hear of his mental condition.

The ship *Porthos*, from the Columbia river to England, and loaded with flour and salmon, is reported by the agents' exchange to have gone ashore on Blind island, in Eagle pass at the Falkland islands, September 28th. About 5,000 cases of salmon and a few sacks of flour were saved and sent to Kio, where they were sold for \$1,000. The vessel and the rest of the cargo were sold for \$37.—Oregonian Dispatch.

Among which is the bullet which pierced his body through and came near costing him his life at the same battle. This bullet Mr. Sheridan now wears as a watch chain.—Welcome.

BEST BAKING POWDERS.

Interesting Tests Made by the Government Chemist.

Dr. Edward G. Love, the present Analytical Chemist for the Government has recently made some interesting experiments as to the comparative value of baking powders. Dr. Love's tests were made to determine what brands are the most economical to use, and as their capacity lies in their leavening power, tests were directed solely to ascertain the available gas of each powder. Dr. Love's report gives the following:

It is but reasonable to suppose that Portland would be opposed to any enterprise which would not, as a natural result, make her the grand center of the northwest, and it is perfectly consistent with her interests that she should fight the removal of impediments to navigation in the Columbia.—Dalles Times-Mountaineer, Aug. 1.

Has the leading Portland journal, the Oregonian, not openly objected to the opening of the river to free navigation, by stopping its work on the Columbia river? Senator Sherman while on a visit here within three months not told by a man who has "Portland in his grip" while passing the locks that "there was nearly a million dollars thrown away"?—Wasco Sun, July 22.

If to open the Columbia river from Portland to this city, Portland was practically interested, every pigeonhole, back alley, street corner, newspaper, hotel or office or car would have the reasons posted why it must be done, and the legislature deluged with bills, resolves, etc. But we defy any paper or member of that board to show any resolution favoring the opening of free navigation of the Columbia river by completing the locks at the Cascades.—Wasco Sun, July 29.

There is naturally an antagonism between Portland and the inland empire, and it is not the old conflict between city and country, for the Columbia river is a natural outlet of this section, and we have never desired that our grain should seek the wharves of Portland to be reshipped to Astoria. Give the inland empire a free river, and the eastern counties of the state will send their grain to the most convenient market, and it requires but little foresight to see where that is.—Dalles Times-Mountaineer, Aug. 1.

The whole state of Oregon knows that, had Portland's policy been a broad one; had not been a supremely selfish one, half of western Oregon would not have been under mortgage to Portland, and the "inland empire" so sneeringly referred to, would have had a prosperous population ten times as great as to-day. But the policy of Portland has always been for a few to control all; a man in debt can be controlled, and it has been the policy of Portland and some men here and in every part of the country, to get control for the sake of its advantage, without a shadow of a care for justice or public economy. "It is just I and after then let the mill burn." Such a policy is despicable.—Wasco Sun, July 22.

For long years this inland empire has been struggling, and oftentimes against great odds of combinations, to achieve the greatness that must inevitably attach itself to, and characterize its future greatness. The great artery, the Columbia river, always ready to yield to the touch of science, has remained blocked by Nature's barriers, and a perceptible willingness on the part of Portland to have it so remain. Eastern Oregon has by her industry, incessantly poured down upon Portland the long stream of limitless revenue, and in return what has she received? nothing; but, on the contrary, she has been opposed by Portland, everything she has advocated for her development, even to the extent of diverting immigration from within her borders.—Fidelity Tribune, July 31.
