#### CHINOOK'S LETTER.

Writing from "the Columbia river" inder date of July 31, to the California Grocer and Canner, "Chinook," disc ing of salmon, says:

ing of salmon, says:

I notice that the London Grocer notes as "discreditable" the practice of relabeling ordinary brands with fancy designations such as "Crown," "Royal," etc. I have been informed that some inferior salmon which is packed upon the Columbia is relabeled by a large Liverpool firm. and that in consequence the quantity of salmon sold under the brands noted above is usually more than double the real volume of the pack in queston. In that event the name of the river upon which these brands are packed would seem exceedingly appropriate. I desire to note here that the onus of guilt is not with the packer. It would seem that the Liverpool firm in question is at fault. At a time when everything which is wrong is attributed to the packer of salmon it is cheering to show that he is not alone in wrong doing. With a pack not alone in wrong doing. With a pack so small as the one in question it would appear easy to detect any attempt at deception. Is it not time to classify the Columbia river salmon packers? We hear a great deal about discrimination, but does it attain to any result? One hear a great deal about discrimination, but does it attain to any result? Our London friends who ought to attend to this seem remiss. How would the fol-lowing classification suit? First-class.—Packers who have only one brand, who put up no other fish than salmon, and who use their label only up-ton fish which they pack in their own

on fish which they pack in their own

canneries.

Second-class. — Packers who besides putting up fish in their own canneries purchase salmon which they know to be good, but upon which they use their own label.

Third-class.-Packers who put up salm on under several brands. The first only has the name of the packer. The second has a fancy name (McGinnes perhaps) and if there be a third, as I know there is, and if there be a third, as I know there is, the third is geographically uncertain.

Fourth-class.—Speculators who claim to be packers who have obtained a label which they are ready to put upon anything which they can purchase at low figures. I might add another class, but as the goods which they put up have frequently to be removed from the cans with a spoon (as a well known Brussels grocer reported last season,) I omit this grade because I am not writing about soup.

Now here we have a clearly defin Now here we have a clearly defined gradation affording ample opportantly to protect the best salmon and to ensure the purchaser against trash. But will it do any good to point out any means for guarding against imposition? This is the age of fraud. Salmon alone is not at fault
