He noticed with tender concern that the mint seemed to have been stripped from the darky's yard as by a tornado, and the place looked forlorn and gloomy. The pine trees sighed mournfully as he drove up. In the door sat a negro, but not his negro. It was a dejected and tattered old man who answered the white man's call.

"Ah! where's my friend Julius, who lived in this cabin three months ago?"

"Po' Julius am gone, sah," said the negro, rolling his eyes.

"What! not dead?"

"Yes, sah."

"What was the matter with him?"

"Oh! dat's de sorrowful part of it, sah. Dats de white man come along here 'bout free months ago; seems like he was from de Norf; an' he larnt Julius how to drink grass in his rum - an', an', an' - now he's gone, po' Julius."

OIL NEAR TACOMA.

Concerning the discovery of oil in the neighborhood of Tacoma, it is said that real, genuine petroleum has been found. The discovery of the fluid is not of a very recent date, for its appearance on the swamps and marshy places had been noticed some two years ago. At that time a company, in which some Portland capitalists were interested, was organized to develop the product, but through lack of means and enterprise the scheme fell through before any results had been accomplished. Lately citizens of Tacoma have enlisted in the enterprise, and a company has been formed with L. F. Thompson president, and W. H. Fife, secretary. This company secured the services of two thoroughly competent and experienced experts from Pennsylvania, Messrs. Kneel and Brothers, and they have been making investigations and examinations of the localities where it was reported the coal oil had appeared.

They report as a result of their efforts that unmistakable evidences of the precious product had been found. Five thousand dollars were then subscribed by the company and boring machinery was sent for. This arrived a few weeks ago, but was not put in operation until last Wednesday, and it is predicted with great confidence that valuable discoveries will be developed. The place where the boring is to be commenced is situated fifteen miles southeast of Tacoma. The company has bought and leased 10,000 acres of land in that vicinity. The indications of oil were first seen on the farm of Mr. VanBibber. Parties possessing lands near the anticipated oil regions will not sell them for love or money. The regions where the indications have been most prominent are within five miles of the Northern Pacific road leading to South prairie.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 - Ex-Postmaster General James, on the subject of the present mail troubles on the Pacific side of the country, said the future commerce of the country was to be developed on the Pacific, and he regarded anything interfering with trade between this country and China, Japan and Australia, or South American ports as a public calamity. The steamship companies had made a mistake in refusing to place their vessels on August schedules, and in refusing to receive mails from the government for sea and inland postage. "They should have continued as heretofore, and presented their grievances to congress next winter. People don't realize the importance of those lines across the Pacific. They are the entering wedge to an immense trade which should be fostered and developed. We have paid too little attention and allowed other nations to step in and get the start of us. Everything should be done by congress and the government not only to sustain the present lines that carry the American flag, but to encourage and assist in placing new lines of steamers at every point where commerce can be developed. Wherever people will buy our goods we should send a line of steamships."
