#### THE HADDINGTONSHIRE.

A TOTAL WRECK OFF POINT REYES.

All On Board Drowned Except One Sailor and a Cabin Boy.

Last Thursday morning, the 29th inst. word came to the Merchants' Exchange San Francisco, that the British bark Haddingtonshire had gone ashore near Point Reves and was a total loss. Later on came another dispatch saying that all on board except one sailor and a cabin boy were drowned. A dispatch received at THE ASTORIAN office last night was to the effect that the two men saved were so badly exhausted as to be able to tell ere little of the disaster.

The British iron bark Haddingtonshire 1119 tons, Frazer master, sailed from itio de Janeiro for this port on January 24th, and arrived here on May 14th. She was chartered by Sibson, Quackenbush & Co., to load for Liverpool, and took 9,601 bbls, flour, worth \$43,204, and 17,696 cases salmon, worth \$88,490, the total salm of here are being \$121,684. The cases salmon, worth \$88,480, the total value of her cargo being \$131,684. The salmon consignors were J. O. Hanthorn, 3,224 cases; Catting Packing Co., 2,965 cases; Pillar Rock Packing Co., 4,007 cases; J. G. Megler, 3,000 cases; Anglo-American, 1,000 cases: Hapgood & Co., 1,000 cases; Occident Packing Co., 2,500

This is a terrible disaster but one that t would seem no amount of foresight could have guarded against. Other ves-sels that crossed the Columbia bar in sels that crossed the Columbia our in safety bound for foreign ports have been wrecked hundreds and thousands of miles away, but with no loss of life. Of the ill-fated Haddingtorshive but two

were saved from the waves.

The Astoria salmon fleet long enjoyed immunity from dissister, but of late the vessels carrying salmon bave been particularly unfortunate. First was the C.S. Hurlbert, then the Kirkwood, then the Perthshire and now the Haddingtonshire The two last named belonged to Thos Law & Co. The vessel and cargo were insured, the latter for its full value.

There is an earnestness and honest sincerity about his acting, a clean-cut character and evident sinking of his identity in the personality of the part he is portraying that indicates the true artist. All of his scenes last evening were managed with artistic skill, particularly that with De Mersac in the third act, and with the detective at the end of the second.
