CHARLIE HAMILTON WHO WAS SUPPOSED TO BE SHOT IN MEXICO, STILL ALIVE.
About eighteen months ago it was reported that Charlie Hamilton who figured rather conspicuously in the murder of J. N. Brown in this city, had been executed by the Mexican authorities for the killing of a soldier in that country. The details of the alleged execution were published in a great many of the papers of the northwest, and the people of this section were led to believe that the career of a dangerous man had been brought to a tragic close. It now transpires, however, and from pretty authentic sources too, that Hamilton is still alive and doing as well as the stunted bill of fare and the narrow confines of a Mexican prison will permit. Shortly after sentence of death had been passed upon him, he wrote to friends in San Francisco stating that if he had a few hundred dollars he could purchase his liberty from the jailer before the day of execution arrived. Those who knew him when he was a better man, and believing that in this act, at least, he was justifiable, raised about \$400 and forwarded it to him through the American consul in Mexico. Among his fellow prisoners was one other American whom Charlie let into the secret, for the purpose of enabling him to escape also, but who unfortunately for Hamilton and the jailer proved a Judas to cause by informing the prison superintendent of the scheme in time to prevent its consummation. As a result of this exposure the jailer was fired and forced to leave the country under penalty of being shot, while Hamilton was heavily ironed and placed in a dungeon to await his terrible doom. On learning this his friends further interested themselves in his behalf by securing a statement of the facts produced at his trial and forwarded them to the secretary of war with the request that an investigation into the matter be had. It was found upon investigation that the evidence did not warrant the verdict reached by the court and upon the recommendation of the American consul, Hamilton's sentence was commuted to twenty years' imprisonment at hard labor. His friends in San Francisco are still working, through the influence of prominent officials to secure his release with a fair prospect of success.—Mercury.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 23.—Major E. T. Gunn, editor of the Transcript, died this morning at 4 A. M. after a few hours of intense suffering of neuralgia of the heart. He was in a collapsed condition at the outset of the attack and had for months past been subject to similar attacks, of less severity. He was conscious of his condition and despaired of recovery.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The Standard this morning confirms the statement that Russia has abandoned her claim to the Zulfiar pass and says that peace is thus secured.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The German corvette *Augusta* has been wrecked and 238 men lost. The ship was valued at \$1,750,000.

PACIFIC COUNTY DISTRICT COURT.
Territory of Washington vs. E. A. Soule and Ida Humison—charged with adultery: The indictment returned in this case on demurrer, was held bad. Defendants appeared by Messrs. Caples and McFadden and the territory by Pros. Atty. N. S. Porter. The court held the defendant, E. A. Soule, in \$500 bonds to appear before the next grand jury of Pacific county.
E. A. Soule vs. Job Buelard, et al.—action for \$20,000 damages: The plaintiff in the above entitled cause came into court with his attorneys on Tuesday morning and filed numerous affidavits on his own behalf which all were to the effect that by the general state of public prejudice against him in Pacific county he could not obtain a fair and impartial trial of his cause at the hands of a Pacific county jury; that the officers of the court were so prejudiced that they were working to injure him and his cause in every way. To these affidavits were filed counter affidavits on the part of the defendants, together with the affidavit of Sheriff Turner, denying so far as each of them was concerned, the statements in plaintiff's affidavits. The plaintiff appeared by J. F. Caples of Portland, and J. C. McFadden, of Olympia, while the defendants were represented by F. D. Winton of Astoria. The court, in passing upon the application for change of venue, said that in his recollection either as judge upon the bench or as attorney practicing at the bar he had never before heard an application of the kind based upon such strong showing as this, and therefore he would grant the application. The action will be tried at the November term of court at Kalama.

Remington vs. Mills: This case occupied the attention of our late district court over a day. The action was brought by one Ed. Remington against Wm. Mills, formerly of Bay Center, for damages for criminal conversation with plaintiff's wife, and was for \$10,000. The evidence went to show that Remington, known in this county until the bringing of the suit, as Chapdelain, was a tenant of Mills, the defendant; that one night last spring he returned home late and found Mills in the same room, and he claimed in such close communion with his wife that his wife became so greatly excited upon them, when at Mills fled out of the room as though Satan and all his legions were behind pursuing; that he then brought his wife to Oysterville and left her there; that prior to this time his wife had always conducted herself in a proper manner and been a most affectionate and loving spouse; that his home was broken up and his children disgraced by the defendant. Mr. Mills admitted having been in the room with Mrs. Chapdelain or Remington at the time Remington stated, and it was shown by other witnesses that there had been a ball that evening in Bay Center, and Mrs. Chapdelain had requested that he accompany her home, which he did, when Remington burst into the room as he had described when Mills thought it best to vacate the premises. Mrs. Chapdelain was not permitted to testify, as Remington, her husband would not consent, and the defense availed themselves largely of this point. She is a bright, buxom lady, and until it was decided that she should not testify, remained sitting in the court room by the side of Mills. The jury were addressed by C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, attorney for plaintiff, and by B. F. Dennison, of Vancouver, and W. J. Reynolds, of Chehalis, for defendant, and were out some thirty hours, being unable to agree on a verdict. The case will stand for trial at the next term of the district court. *Pacific Journal, 21.*
