FOUND DROWNED.
 Chris. Johnson Found in the River Near Hanthorn's Cannery.
 The body of Chris Johnson, a resident of Alderbrook, was found floating in the river near J. O. Hanthorn's cannery yesterday morning. On the 8th he started to Gray's river to look after some land in that section, returning on the *Union* last Friday. He was last seen alive near Johansen's at upper Astoria, that afternoon. On Monday his continued absence alarmed his friends and a telegram was sent to Vancouver asking if he was there, to which a reply was received saying that a man answering to the description had been there inquiring about land. This allayed the fears of his family and friends, but yesterday morning at seven o'clock, Messrs. Welcome and Bruen, with R. Johnson, a brother of the missing man, who were at Hanthorn's wharf, saw the drowned body of a man floating in the water between the beach and the roadway. They got a boat and brought the body ashore. The brother recognized it as the body of the missing man.
 Coroner Ross held an inquest, the jury finding that the deceased was a native of Denmark, 33 years of age, and came to his death on or about the 11th of September, by accidentally falling into the Columbia river from his room at upper Astoria while drinking. Deceased leaves a wife and six children, the youngest being but three days old. The funeral will take place from the Scandinavian church at upper Astoria at one o'clock this afternoon.

NEARLY THIRTY YEARS AGO.

A SAN FRANCISCO ESTIMATE.
 Practically the local salmon market is in the hands of a few Columbia river packers who hold from 50,000 to 75,000 cases of the season's pack which constitutes the available stock on the river. While it cannot be said that there is the inquiry which the situation should have developed, there is no salmon on the river seeking a market, and holders are firm in their demands for top prices. The light pack and active movement of the present season has been a lesson to the progressive packers on the river. To a certain extent in future seasons they will follow in the footsteps of the fruit packers of California. It has been demonstrated that it is more profitable in a season to pack for a certain market than to continue operations at full capacity regardless of stocks and the condition of trade; and already the healthful effects of an occasional glut have been noticed in an interesting consideration in discussions involving the present situation and the prospects of the industry.
 It is almost certain that any change in the policy of a few of the leading canning companies would be followed eventually through the entire line of Columbia river canneries, but no radical changes could be expected in a single season.
 There is disposition to buy brands. There is always an inquiry for certain packs which have found their way into the experience of years that the public and progressive packers demand a careful selection of material and neat workmanship in packing brings a handsome return for the time and labor involved in conducting a cannery on the sound business principles which have enabled successful men in other industries. The public quickly learns of any voluntary effort on its behalf especially in the improvement of any line of preserved foods. The enterprise of a packer who follows his brands through the world. It cannot be disputed that there is always a demand for certain packs of Columbia river salmon. In season and out of season and a packer's reputation follows him. The packers' brands which are thrown upon the market without the endorsement of some standard canning concern. It is a noteworthy consideration that there has been something of a general effort to build up a trade for certain brands, and that this fact has contributed immeasurably to the rapid distribution of the pack of the present season.
 Such fortuitous changes in general situations should not be profitable to the packers. At the opening of the present season it was doubtful if capital sufficient could be enlisted to carry forward a full season's operations, but under present conditions a more favorable outlook for the industry could not be desired. Practically the pack of 1885 has been marketed. Fair prices have been realized considering general industrial and commercial conditions. Another month, the world, and the opening of another season will find bare markets and depleted stocks where the trade has relied upon supplies from the present season's pack with every prospect of a great and general improvement in the market which has ruled through the season.
