Bulling the Market.

All reports bear cumulative testi-mony to the fact that the salmon packing industry is in a better condition to-day than it has been for several seasons. It is an accepted fact, though perhaps it would be a difficult matter to demonstrate with mathematical exactness that the world's salmon stocks are lighter unprecedently heavily stocked and goods at a that dull markets could best be accounted for by the superabundant supplies. The remarkable revival in the demand for Columbia river sulmon since the definite determination of the shortage in the pack has worked the complete demolition of the theory that heavy stocks have retarded the movement. It is beginning to dawn upon the packers and the trade that while salmon markets have continued dull or quet through the season the movement from the Columbia river has been one of phenomenal activity.—Cal. Grocer Canner, 18.

Better Weighted and Dumped in the Bay.

This market is now pretty well supplied with do-overs for local consum-ers. True, buyers get the benefit of doubly-processed goods, without additional cost, and an additional number of vent-holes well sealed in each can; but, after all, these don't really improve the quality of the fish. Prices for this description of salmon range from 65 to 85c. If consumers want the cheap kinds we know of no law to prevent them from taking them; but to put these goods on the market is an injustice to the salmon interest. It would be better if a good portion of this salmon was weighted and dumped in the bay.—Grocer and Country Merchant, 18.
