LET DAKOTA IN.

SOME members of the congregation of political adventurers who are assembled in one of the Dakota towns for the purpose of constructing a state constitution for part of that territory, have been proposing to put into the instrument a section substantially recognizing the old doctrine of state sovereignty and the right of revolution. As the gathering, although authorized by an act of the territorial legislature, has no more power in the work it has undertaken than might be assumed by any other debating society, this manifestation of the perversity that is best described as "pure cussedness," is not of much consequence to the outside world. And the gabble about forcible resistance to national authority which accompanied the proposition, was too utterly foolish even to provoke indignation. The people who subdued the great rebellion of the southern slave holders will not be alarmed by the bluster of a handful of political tramps in Dakota, who scarcely represent anybody but themselves. For it is certain that the people of Dakota are as intelligent and patriotic as the inhabitants of any of the states, and will regard with no other feeling than unmitigated contempt the mouthings of a lot of fools, the inspiration of whose folly is but ravenous office-hunger. These creatures are frantic in their demand for the erection of half of Dakota into a state, simply because a state government machinery will furnish more offices than are needed in the less complex territorial system.

Dismissing the Sioux Falls collection of construction builders as wholly insignificant, it must be said, nevertheless, that it is clearly time for congress to take the proper preliminary steps for the admission of Dakota as a state. The territory has now a population three or four times greater than the single ratio of representation in congress, which has been considered a sort of standard for admission, and six or eight times greater than was required for Nebraska and Nevada. In such a case no party consideration should be permitted to obstruct the action of congress; nor should the matter be confused or complicated by bestowing any attention upon the debating club meeting now in session at Sioux Falls.

An Ottawa dispatch says: "The recent discovery of gold in the vicinity of an imaginary boundary line dividing British Columbia from Alaska, has led the people of this province once more to press their claims on the dominion government to have the boundary definitely determined. It is represented that unless this is done serious complications may arise, as it is impossible at present for those locating mining claims to ascertain whether they are in British Columbia or on United States territory. Any step in this direction will have to be carried out jointly with the United States government, which will probably be asked to cooperate with the Dominion government in fixing the boundary line at an early date."

BALTIMORE papers speak of a new local industry; one of the outgrowths of the prohibition movement, which consists of packing what are known as "brandied fruits." A peach or a few plums or cherries are put up in cans of whisky, specially labeled, and sent out as canned goods. No complaint has been heard against the quality of the goods, but there is a general demand for packs with "less fruit and more liquor."

FERDINAND WARD, one of the biggest villains unhung, says he isn't worth a dollar, which every one will be glad to know.

There will be a bill introduced early in the next session of congress looking to the creation of another cabinet position. The proposed legislation contemplates the consolidation of the department of agriculture, the bureau of labor and two or three minor branches of the service which have a natural affinity with industrial matters, or rather with the interests of the industrial classes. The attempt will be made to bring these all into one department, with a cabinet officer at the head. The idea of dignifying labor will be made prominent, and it is claimed the movement will be a very popular one. Some of the southern senators have discussed the features of the bill and talk favorably of such a measure.

The czar is determined to Russify the Baltic provinces of his empire. The German language is to give place to the Russian for official purposes, and we be to them who stand in the way. The mayors of Riga and Revel have been dismissed by his majesty's orders, not, as it appears, for refusing to talk Russian, which, perhaps, they could not do, but for objecting to the compulsory substitution of Slavonic for Teutonic.

A CENSUS has recently been taken of the population of Danish Greenland, which includes nearly one thousand miles of the west coast. It is found that Denmark numbers among her subjects about 10,000 Esquimaux, of whom 1,400 are half-breeds, the descendants of European fathers and Esquimaux mothers. The census report gives a very favorable account of Greenland.

THE mugwumps tried to run the Republican party last fall and are trying to run the Democratic party this fall. They beat the Republican national nominee and now threaten to beat the Democratic state nominee in New York. They are trying to demonstrate the incorrectness of the mathematical axiom which says that the whole is equal to the sum of its parts.

MINNESOTA has a novel law under which dogs are assessed at their actual value, the 60,000 dogs in the state being assessed at \$197,375. The highest priced dog in the state is valued at \$12 and the lowest at 92 cents.
