THE result of the Ohio election will be a great victory for John Sherman if the legislature should be Republican.

MR. BEECHER says Mr. Cleveland is a very wise man. Both gentlemen got out of a pretty bad scrape, one in '74, the other in '84.

THE New York papers say that Gov. Hill was in with Tweed and partook of the spoils when Big Six robbed that city. The worst of it is they are proving it.

A COLUMBUS, Ohio, dispatch says: "The largest prohibition gains are in Democratic precincts, thus showing that the Democratic leaders who tried to make a cat-paw of the prohibitionists have been seriously burned. The Republicans, with their better organization, got out their vote in the cities, while in the country, where the feeling seemed most in their favor, the vote was not so fully drawn out. A cold rain fell all day, with no more than half an hour's cessation at any time. This did not seem to have helped the Democrats. The Germans in all the cities went strongly for the Republicans. Colored men to a considerable extent polled with the Democrats. Cleveland's friends are much depressed by the Republican victory. They do not disguise the conviction that it will have a bad effect on the Democratic canvass in New York. It will be remembered that Hoadley declined to be a candidate for re-nomination, and that he visited Washington and was persuaded to take the field by direct solicitation of the president."

THE latest received from the Ohio election says the Republican state executive committee estimates the plurality of Foraker, Republican, for governor at 20,000, in case the present ratio of gain should continue. The Democratic committee expresses a belief that the plurality will not exceed 15,000, if it reaches that figure. Governor Hoadley is inclined to the belief that Foraker's plurality will not be more than 10,000 or 12,000 when the official returns are received. Both committees are still claiming a majority on joint ballot in the legislature. The Democratic committee claims that they have carried the legislative ticket in Hamilton county, and have reliable information that they will have a majority on joint ballot, with fifty-six members in the house sure, and twenty-one in the senate. The Republican committee's latest estimate is that they will have five majority on joint ballot outside of Hamilton county, and in case they should carry that, with half the other doubtful counties and districts, the house would stand seventy-one Republicans to thirty-nine Democrats and the senate twenty-four Republicans to thirteen Democrats.

THE census statistics regarding the age of voters, clearly demonstrates the transformation which comes over the body politic in a quarter of a century. In 1880—and the proportions hold equally true in 1885—it was found that there were in the country 8,270,509 native white males who had reached the age of twenty-one years. Of this total 5,959,804 or nearly three quarters, were between the ages of twenty-one and forty-five inclusive, and only 2,310,705 were about forty five. In other words of every one hundred men of the voting age this fall, only twenty-eight were old enough to cast their ballots in 1860. That is to say the overwhelming majority of our present voters are men who were only boys when the war broke out. Nearly one-fifth of the whole number, 1,546,703, were not born until after the firing on Fort Sumter. So great are the ravages of death among the elders that this aggregate of men

who are twenty-one, twenty-two, twenty-three and twenty-four years old exceeds the number (1,503,076) of those who have survived their fifty-second year. Each year increases largely the ratio of voters to whom the slavery contest and the war are but matters of ancient history, known to them only by reading, or, at best, vague recollections of early childhood.
