In three weeks' time the legislature will convene in special session at Salem to finish some business left uncompleted last February. Prominent among this unfinished business is the election of a colleague to Senator Dolph.

At present two things stand prominent. One is that no member of the legislature is constitutionally eligible to the position of United States senator. The other is that any attempt to continue last winter's fight will result as that did.

Last winter Hon. Sol. Hirsch, state senator from Multnomah, had two-thirds of his party vote weeks before the day of adjournment, which entitled him to an election.

Article IV, sec. 30, of the state constitution says: "No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he may have been elected, be eligible to any office, the election to which is vested in the legislative assembly."

Ordinarily this should prove an effective and sufficient bar to the nomination or selection of a candidate from either branch of the legislature, but as the Republican members had committed themselves to the extent of allowing Mr. Hirsch a two-thirds vote nothing less than his election was then due to him as a matter of party usage and party right.

In the coming session the situation is different. No member of the senate or assembly should have a single Republican vote for U. S. senator, nor should any inducements or promise be held out in that direction.

With due deference to the distinguished ninety who so sagely represented admiring constituencies last winter it may be said that they do not comprise all the great men for which our state is so justly famed. Apart and beside those who will draw per diem for twenty days from the ninth of next month are men of sagacity, experience, reputation and ability who would well represent Oregon in the national legislature.

Nothing is politically right that is morally wrong. The Republican party of Oregon would commit a moral wrong in electing to the U. S. senate a man whose eligibility for the position is inhibited by the state constitution.

Apart from the question of right or wrong as a matter of policy it would be a political mistake. A repetition of last February's mistake or any portion of it would tend to alienate a good many Republicans who vote that ticket from principle and from a belief in the ideas it represents, but who do their own thinking and do not care to be officered by political schemers or narrow minded men.

TALKING of the work required at the hands of the legislature next month, The Dalles Times-Mountaineer aptly says: "There is another matter of great importance, and that is the present area of our judicial district. For some time past it has been impossible for the judge of this district to hear all cases on the calendar at the stated terms of court in this city. The adjournment last Thursday left several important cases not adjudicated, because Judge Taylor was forced to close the session in time to reach Prineville to hold the court for Crook county. This circuit should comprise the counties east of the Cascades—Wasco, Crook, Gilliam and perhaps Morrow, and Clatsop, Columbia, Clackamas and Washington should be in another district. There is an urgent necessity for this action, and there is not a member of the bar in this section but favors a division of the district. It is impossible, under the present arrangement, for lawyers to pay proper attention to the interests of their clients, or for the judge to adjudicate all the cases on the docket."

A LONDON dispatch says: "Probably the world has never before witnessed such a strangely perplexing situation as that which this week was seen in the Balkan peninsula, with hundreds of men being dragged into the field, with forced levies, with half a dozen different states on the very threshold of hostilities, and with nobody able to guess how the various combatants will range themselves once the die is cast. Austria and Russia are preparing for war. The suppression of news has become one of the fine arts in both countries, but enough leaks out to render this certain, that Austria is now mobilizing 60,000 men, who are being quietly got ready in Bosnia."

The Democratic newspapers are divided as to advice regarding Democratic policy in the coming legislative session. The most of them oppose the session and indirectly advise the Democratic members to stay away. The Republican newspapers endorse the action of the governor in calling a special session. There is considerable interest manifested as to who the senatorial candidates will be. Williams and Mitchell are mentioned as frequently as any. If Clatsop county had, the say, Jno. H. Mitchell would get an almost unanimous vote.

A WASHINGTON dispatch says "the president never changes his mind." If so he won't have much left of the original material in another year. As a matter of necessity presidents and other public men should change their minds occasionally.

It is considered certain that war will result between England and Burmah. England has fought nothing but savages for the last twenty years, and the Burmese are but little better than savages.

The railroad between Tacoma and Seattle will be opened to traffic next Sunday.
