TRUE IF IMPORTANT.

In three weeks' time the legislature will convene in special session at Salem to finish some business left uncompleted last February. Prominent among this unfinished business is the election of a colleague to Senator Dolph. Duty to the state demands that the commonwealth have full representation in the national legislature. Possible defeat of Sherman in Ohio makes it imperative on the political majority in the state legislature to see that party supremacy in the U. S. senate is preserved. It is to be hoped that the mne months intervening between the angry adjournment last winter and the coming reassembling will result in party harmony and prompt and sensible disposition of the question of senator.

At present two things stand prominent. One is that no member of the legislature is constitutionally eligible to the position of last winter's fight will result as that did.

Last winter Hon. Sol. Hirsch, state senator from Multnomah, had two-thirds of his party vote weeks before the day of adjournmen's which entitled him to an election. It is an unwritten law in Re publican conventions that once a man receives a two-thirds' vo',e he is entitled to every Repub'rican vote in the body. Mr. Hir sch should right to demand it the moment he had thirty-nine vo tes in the joint convention.

Article IV, sec. 30, of the state constitution s 4ys: "No senator or representative shall, during the time for w'aich he may have been elected, I se eligible to any office, the election to which is vested in the legislative assembly."

Ordinarily this should prove an effective and sufficient bar to the nomination or selection of a candidate from either branch of the legislature, but as the Republican members had committed themusage and party right.

With due deference to the distinguished ninety who so sagely represented admiring constituencies last winter it may be said that they do not comprise all the great men for which our state is so justly famed. Apart and beside those who will draw per niem for twenty days from the ninth of next month are men of sagacity, experience, reputation and ability who would well represent Oregon in the national legislature.

It wants to see a senator sent to Washington who does not need to go with the bar sinister across his credentials as any would who should be elected by direct violation of the oath he took on taking his seat at Salem

Nothing is politically right that is morally wrong. The Republican party of Oregon would commit a moral wrong in electing to the U.S. senate a man whose elegibility for the position is inhibited by the state constitution.

Apart from the question of right or wrong as a matter of policy it would be a political mistake. A repetition of last February's mistake or any portion of it would tend to alienate a good many Republicans who vote that ticket from principle and from a belief in the ideas it represents, but who do their own thinking and do not care to be officered by political schemers or narrow minded men. There are Bourbons who never learn anything nor never forget anything, in the Republican party as well as in the Democratic party. If their counsels prevail at Salem next month they must rely for their party majority on the forgetfulness or ignorance of the means that would render possible their present success.


