PRESIDENT CLEVELAND has sent \$1,000 to New York to help elect Hill. The New York mugwumps say that it is necessary to beat Hill that Cleveland shall be endorsed.

The publication of the American Scimitar will begin in Portland next Tuesday. It will be a four-column evening folio. It will be an anti-Chinese paper and will be published "in the interest of mechanics and workmen."

The classical gentlemen who edit the Oregonian and Standard are having a high toned discussion regarding the correctness of each other's Latin. The common herd are barred out. However that is better than calling each other liars in a deep bass voice.

A SPECIAL from Ottawa says that the cabinet has decided to postpone Riel's execution until November 11. French Canadians still express confidence that Riel will not be hanged. They base their hopes on the recommendation to mercy of the Regina jury.

The general land office has just issued a correct list of the various United States land offices in the different states and territories. There have been but two changes of location since January 1st last, viz.: In Dakota territory, the office formerly at Creethburgh is now at Devil's Lake, and in Washington territory that at Yakima has been changed to North Yakima.

MR. FITZHUGH LEE, Democratic candidate for governor in Virginia, made a great speech at Winchester the other day, in which he thanked God that the war was over and that its hideous animosities were forever buried. If Mr. Lee is so tickled over the burial of war issues why does he parade Robert E. Lee's old saddle before the Virginia people he addresses?

The legislature appropriated \$10,000 last winter for a fish ladder at Oregon City. The affair was formally "inspected" and "accepted" a few days ago, and now comes the Oregon City Courier, with the statement that "the structure is falling in and will be a total wreck next spring." Well, the legislature can appropriate \$10,000 more for "repairs" next month.

SEVENTY-FIVE Chinese cigar makers in the employ of Koenigsberger, Falk & Mayer, of San Francisco, struck last Friday morning because the proprietors refused to discharge fifty-eight whites. The latter had been employed, and were found much more effective, and did neater and better work than the Mongols. The firm is determined to replace all the Chinese with whites, and say the Mongolians shall not dictate to them.

A NUMBER of thieving Cree Indians have crossed the line from the dominion into the United States. The secretary of state, in reply to a request that they be sent back, says that these Indians cannot be arrested except upon extradition of the British authorities, and that this government should not countenance any kidnapping of Indians. The interior department is at a loss to know how the dangerous refugees can be removed under the circumstances.

WE read of Aladdin and his wonderful lamp; of the roc and other Arabian night fables, and smile at the ingenuity displayed by those ancient romancers. But science in the nineteenth century eclipses in actual facts the recorded fables of the ancient magicians. Where in the pleasing pages of old tales can be found a more marvelous story than the plain record of the late work at

Hell Gate in New York, when the pressure of a child's finger on a little button tore to pieces nine acres of rocks, rent four miles of tunnels, and set into dynamic activity 300,000 pounds of explosives! The feat is unequalled in the wildest tales of magic.

THE recent sale of the Northern Pacific lands comprises several townships in northwestern Minnesota, amounting in all to about 113,000 acres. It is estimated that \$7 per acre will be netted, or a total of \$791,000. The purchase money is part cash, and the remainder, \$500,000, is in preferred stock. This will retire from circulation forever over 50,000 shares of that stock. The purchasers are a number of capitalists, headed by Charles Watrous, formerly of California. The sale is supposed to have been brought about by Senator Sabin, of Minnesota, who is a member of the purchasing syndicate. A great body of the land is heavily timbered. It is the intention of the owners to begin the manufacture of lumber on a large scale at once. Watrous has been in the lumber business several years, and was once well known in political life in California.

ONE day last week, says the News, persons crossing London bridge were somewhat startled to see a small boat suddenly collapse, whereby five or six persons, including a lady, a clergyman and some officers were thrown into the water. They ought, by all the laws of analogy, to have been struggling in that element, but they were not. On the contrary, they appeared perfectly at their ease, and making no movement, rested calmly with their heads above the surface. The explanation of the phenomenon was that the clothes worn by these people were made of a fabric in which threads of cork were interwoven with other material. Mr. Jackson, the inventor, is to be congratulated on the complete success of his ingenious device. Timid sea travelers can now equip themselves in garments which, while undistinguishable from those of ordinary mortals, will make death by drowning an utter impossibility.
