Scientific Miscellany.

Mr. Sereno Watson classifies the North American roses into eighteen species.

A recent earthquake in France affected the chalk formations at the earth's surface, and was neither heard nor felt by men at work in the coal mines beneath.

A microscope having a bent body tube is a recent scientific instrument. It is intended to combine the advantages of keeping the stage horizontal and enabling the observer to keep his body in a convenient position.

For the observation of all kinds of subterranean phenomena, J. J. Martinez suggests the boring into the earth of a hole 30 by 150 feet in diameter, the expense of the undertaking to be met by a universal subscription.

The value of vaccination is illustrated by the registers of an old hospital in Prague, where the mortality from small-pox from 1670 to 1815—that is, in the prevaccination period—was 27 per cent, while from 1815 to 1855, it has been only 4.53 per cent.

According to Mr. W. H. Harris, unwholesome food, defective ventilation, and the diffusion of poisonous germs produce among bees about the same result as among the human family. A common and very fatal disease of the bees is dysentery, due to imperfect ventilation and poor winter food.

In countries having marked winter seasons, earthquakes are found to be more frequent in winter than in summer. Dr. Knott, of the Seismological Society of Japan, finds only two possible meteorological reasons for this—one being the stress of accumulated snow, and the other that of high barometric pressure during the cold season.

THE NEW ELEMENT.—The new metal gallium melts at 81.1 degrees Fahrenheit, becoming liquid when held in the hand. Its specific gravity is a little less than 6, or about half that of lead. It tarnishes but slightly in the air. It adheres readily to glass when fused, forming a beautiful mirror. In chemical characteristics the rare element gallium most resembles the abundant element aluminum.

DELICACY OF THE SENSES.—Dr. E. L. Nichols has made investigations which indicate the incorrectness of the general belief that in woman the special senses are more finely organized and delicate than in man. He found the eyes of men to be more sensitive than those of women to red, yellow, and green colors, although not so to blue; and the perception of smell proved to be more acute in men than in women.

A PHENOMENON IN QUARTZ.—Some silicious pebbles which are quite numerous in the quarternary gravels of the Loing Valley, France, have been described by Meunier. These stones—about an inch and a half in diameter and inclosing liquid water, together frequently with a loose stony nucleus. Meunier supposes that the water must have penetrated the pebbles through their minute pores, for not a sign of a crack can be seen even by the aid of a strong glass.

CHEMICAL ACTION OF LIGHT.—Prof. A. Vogel observes that the hemlock plant which yields confine in Bavaria contains none in Scotland, and he concludes that sunlight plays a part in the generation of alkaloids in plants. This view is confirmed by the circumstance that the tropical Cinchona, if cultivated in feebly-lighted northern hot-houses, yield no quinine. The formation of tannin seems to be influenced by exposure of the growing bark to the light, the proportion of tannin in the bark of the beech or of the larch having been found to increase from the less illuminated to the more illuminated parts.
