SINCE January last 8,361 Chinese have arrived in San Francisco from China.

IN 1884, 535,943 acres of public land were sold in Oregon. In 1885, 407,859 acres.

EASTERN Democratic newspapers are talking of Hendricks and Hill for '88. That is a long way off yet.

THE registered bonds of the United States amount to \$1,071,000,000, of which less than \$12,000,000 are held in foreign countries.

AN Atlanta policeman works twelve hours a day for \$2.25. An Atlanta street car driver works fourteen or fifteen for \$1.33. An Atlanta sewing girl works twelve hours a day for 25 cents.

A SYNDICAL observer says that the main idea of English journalism seems to be to say everything in the dullest possible way, and the main idea of American journalism seems to be to say nothing in the smartest possible way.

THE postoffice department has been advised that on the completion of the Canadian Pacific road, all the trans-Atlantic mails from England will be forwarded over that road, and that a new British line of steamers will be established at the western terminus of the Canadian Pacific for Australia.

DR. LESSEPS celebrated his 80th birthday in Paris on the 19th. All foreign ambassadors and prominent persons in Paris visited him and paid their respects. Ex-Empress Eugenie and the khedive of Egypt telegraphed congratulations. De Lesseps is confident he will live to sail through the Panama canal.

A SOUTHERN philosopher observes: "There is an appreciable amount of hog in human nature. Hogs will squeal and scuffle and trot for miles behind a leaky old wagon loaded with corn, but will not budge an inch after a wagon with a tight body. Civil service reform will tighten up the joints of the public crib, and we will have no hungry, noisy politicians hanging around it."

SENATOR DOLPH has two important bills in preparation, which he will introduce as soon as congress opens and press earnestly to enactment. The first relates to the admission of Washington territory, with some geographical modifications. He proposes to include the Panhandle of Idaho within the boundary of Washington, so that the southern line of the proposed state will stretch across to Montana. He says the whole territory within the new boundary contains at least 175,000 people. He is confident that the bill will pass the senate, and whether it goes through the house will depend largely on the policy of the administration. It is said the president favors the admission of Dakota, and it is inferred that he would likewise favor the admission of Washington. Dolph, however, is not sanguine of Democratic aid. His other measure is a bill for the forfeiture of the land grant on the main line of the Northern Pacific from Wallula to Portland. The Northern Pacific has not built the road and does not intend to at present. He thinks the sentiment in eastern Oregon is in favor of forfeiture.

YESTERDAY'S San Francisco Call says: Ex-Senator Mitchell has been elected to the United States senate. A suggestive feature in the election of Mitchell is the fact that it was accomplished by Democratic votes. The Democrats could not elect a candidate of their own, but if the Republicans failed to elect in the regular session, as they had in the regular session, the Democrats would have stood a good chance to carry the

next legislature. The circumstance of their preferring to elect a Republican to waiting for their chance, is suggestive of some motive which does not appear upon the face of the vote. The fact that Democratic votes were given to Mitchell by the action of the caucus makes the matter more suggestive. The natural attitude of the Democrats would have been that of delay. It is intimated that Mitchell has agreed to sustain the administration when requested to do so. This means that his vote will be given on the Democratic side if the Republicans should resolve upon partisan opposition to Mr. Cleveland's nominations. At the present time this means a good deal. About the only issue between the parties in the senate is that of confirming Mr. Cleveland's appointments. On the tariff, silver and most other questions likely to come before the senate the Democrats and Republicans will divide without much relation to party divisions.
