THE New Northwest expresses fears that the Republican party is dying, and appears to worry about it. Its fears are groundless.

NEAL DOW says the rum-sellers are running the state of Maine. If this is true, one may be pardoned for asking what the prohibitionists, headed by Neal Dow himself have been doing in Maine for the past thirty years.

THE annexation fever is raging in the northern tier of Mexican states. It is not the policy of the United States to give encouragement to any proposition looking to impairment of the territorial integrity of our sister republic.

THE Corning, Iowa, Gazette says an insurance man was called out in the country to adjust a loss on a horse on which his company had a tornado insurance. The farmer said the horse died of colic, and that if tornado insurance did not cover all losses by wind he did not want any more insurance.

THE habit of giving children a whole apple or a large piece of bread at one time is deprecated by a recent writer. A better plan, he contends, is to give them small slices and thus discourage gorging and teach them the virtue of moderation. This is probably where the president got his notion of distributing the patronage to Democratic office seekers.

IT is untenable to claim for the Indians any sort of control over the disposal of lands they have sold and ceded to the United States, when the government unquestionably can by law transfer the title of their patented lands from the tribe to individuals in severalty, or ordain that all or any portion of the same shall be sold to the highest bidder for their common benefit.

ULTIMATELY there can be but one outcome. The railroad system of the country will pass under the ownership and control of the Federal Government and have a unified central administration, conducted in the interest of the people. The pooling system is hastening the era of government control by reducing the road to a system, with management from a central source.

A GERMAN critic thus distinguishes between ridicule, wit, irony and humor: "Ridicule is the wit of a stupid or vulgar person; wit, the ridicule of a superior intellect of a man of the world; irony the wit of a thinker, and humor the irony of a poet. Ridicule is like a blow with the fist, wit like the prick of a needle, irony like the sting of a thorn, and humor the plaster which heals all these wounds."

YESTERDAY'S San Francisco Chronicle editorially believes that before two years are over Senator Mitchell will make himself equally conspicuous as a Democratic partisan and as a friend of the railways. These and kindred comments excite the same amusement in Oregon that is occasioned by the location, by San Francisco journals, of Tatoosh island off the Columbia bar; the prophecy and geography being of equal value.

MR. LEINENWEBER deserves great credit in voting for Mitchell; but he deserves censure for his action in defeating in the house the bill confirming the validity of the issuance of the schoolhouse bonds in district No. One. He has got time to retrieve himself, to redeem his record, to earn the admiration of all well meaning men by going against what is wrong and in favor of what is right. He knows and every one else knows that the bonds were duly issued, that the money was honestly raised, that the money so raised was used in putting up

the building—extravagantly it is true, but it was spent, and that no man can rightfully repudiate those bonds. Mr. Leinenweber is a public spirited man with a splendid reputation. Let him not sully it by continuance in error.

A NAVAL officer remarks upon filibustering expeditions to Cuba, that these things never happen in the summer, when the North Atlantic squadron cannot get down there to stop them. When the squadron is to start on a cruise from the north, he says some of the interested parties down there subscribe two or three hundred dollars and hire some ragged fellows to drill after dark. Then word goes abroad that a formidable expedition is fitting out for Cuba. Away goes the squadron, and before it gets back the merchants at Key West will have received \$100,000 of money spent by the officers for stores, etc. This is all there is in it.

WINNIPEG special dispatches from Battleford, concerning the Northwestern Indians, are of an alarming nature. It is asserted that southern and northern tribes are on the point of forming an alliance to sweep the whole country, from the far north to the boundary line, massacring the inhabitants and destroying their homes. This means much more than the late rebellion, and it will be impossible for the government to compare it to a simple riot. From information obtained from runners who have been among the various tribes, and from observation of others, it is predicted that trouble may come at any moment. The government was warned very much in the same manner of the Saskatchewan troubles, but neglected to take precautionary measures until it was too late.

SOMEbody is comparing the size and cost of the Great Eastern and Noah's Ark. The cost of building and launching the Great Eastern was \$3,650,000, and this broke the original company. A new company was formed, which spent \$600,000 in fitting and furnishing her. Then this company failed, and a new company was organized, with a capital of \$500,000. At the close of 1880 this company sank £26,715 upon the vessel, thus making her total cost \$4,703,575. Nothing ever built can stand comparison with the Great Eastern, excepting Noah's Ark, and even this vessel could not match her. The length of the Ark was 300 cubits, her breadth 50 cubits, and her height 30 cubits. The cubit of the scripture according to Bishop Wilkins, was 21.65 in., and computed into English measurement, the Ark was 547 ft. long, 91 ft. beam, 54.7 ft. depth, and 21,762 tons. The Great Eastern is 689 ft. long, 83 ft. beam, 56 ft. depth, and 28,093 tons measurement. So Noah's Ark is quite overshadowed by the Great Eastern.
