COMMENTING on the present unjust and unequal county representation in the state legislature, the Oregonian, in yesterday's issue says that "the failure at the special session to pass a new apportionment bill will not add materially to the political prospects of the members composing that body. It was a duty which that body owed to the state at large, and a duty the performance of which had already been too long deferred."

Our contemporary assumes that the chief obstacle in the way of the apportionment bill last week was the senatorial election, and formulates a theory regarding the Democratic support of Mitchell and the geographical distribution of that support. It argues that the counties now over represented, such as Josephine, Clackamas, Douglas, Baker, Polk, etc., and which send Democrats to Salem, cast their votes for Mitchell in accordance with a stipulation that by reason of their action the present unjust apportionment should not be disturbed.

But the whole facts do not bear out the implied "deal" on the part of Mitchell's friends and supporters. Such a scheme, if concerted, would be carried out in *steno*, for Beall of Jackson, Cyrus of Linn, Hayes of Lane, Leinenweber of Clatsop, and Lewis of Wasco and Crook were among Mitchell's Democratic supporters. To us it does not appear probable that the matter of apportionment, or present legislation concerning it, played any part in the senatorial contest last week.

THE ASTORIAN is of the same opinion in this matter that it was in '84 and '82; that the reason why Clatsop county has not her just representation is due to party cowardice, Republican and Democratic alike. Each party is afraid the other may regain, or retain predominance and hence we of Clatsop suffer by reason of a fear of political dominance. It would never do for Republicans to allow three representatives and two senators to go up from Clatsop county elected on the Democratic ticket; it would be equally dreadful for Democrats to permit a Republican delegation of five from this county to legislate in Salem. It is contemptible and pitiful, but it is the fact. Some men believe in party supremacy to such an extent as to sink their identity and would rather be represented by a cipher, or have no representation at all than to have a good man, an able man go, because he happens to be of the opposite political faith.

As an independent journal entirely untrammelled by party ties, THE ASTORIAN hopes that sometime the Oregon legislature will rise superior to party obligation and petty policy and sink sectional feeling in an effort for the common good. Till that time comes this county must stand in the attitude of a neglected step-daughter with no voice in family discussions and no influence in demanding her rights.

THE ASTORIAN has no candidate in the coming city election: no friend to work for; no favorite to be given a place. Its question regarding any candidate shall be—"is he honest? is he capable?" If he lacks these qualifications he can expect the support of no man who believes in good municipal government.

THE chief question that has been raised by the sudden death of vice president Hendricks is the presidential succession. At the present time there is no president pro tem of the senate, nor speaker of the house, and in case of Cleveland's death the question who would temporarily succeed him would come up. An effort was made just before the adjournment of the senate, in April last, to elect a president pro tem, but it was not accomplished. It was said by a senator that it was thought it might probably be construed as discourtesy to Hendricks to elect a Republican as president pro tempore, and the matter was not pressed. Hendricks attended to his duties every day, and afforded no occasion for the services of a president pro tempore. This doubtless, more than a wish not to be discourteous to the vice president, made the senators relax caution and permit adjournment without election of a presiding officer pro tem. But this repetition of the condition of affairs of a president and no presiding officer of the senate, or speaker of the house has put beyond doubt that the matter of presidential succession will receive immediate attention upon the meeting of congress. It is said that Senator Edmunds, who was president pro tem. of the senate, does not desire re-election. As soon as the announcement of Hendricks' death was made Republican senators concluded, without reflection, that Edmunds would be chosen again to his former place, but since then the tide has set in for Logan. As there is a prospect of some rivalry over the matter senators are reluctant to express an opinion on the subject.

"This is the time of the year," says the New York Sun, "when animals shed their coats and put on thicker ones." It proceeds to remark that it would not wonder "if the president would shed his thin spring and summer coat of mugwumpism" and "wear a thick coat of Democracy this winter."
