CUM GRANO SALIS.

San Francisco, Dec. 15 .- A most sensational and startling plot for the wholesale assassination of the most prominent men of this city came to light here to-night. Some time ago about \$100,000, and he owns consider-the police obtained information of an able real estate in Buffalo, which is light here to-night. Some time ago the police obtained information of an organization called the "Socialistic Revolutionar: Association," which, it was asserted was composed of ultra socialistic members. Close watch was kept on their movements and the police finally succeeded in obtaining the minutes of one of their meetings, held November 23. From these facts it was discovered that it was the intention of the association to "put out of the way" about twenty men, including W. T. Coleman, Congressman W. W. Morrow, Gen. W. H. L. Barnes, Mayor Bartlett, United States Judge Lorenzo Sawyer, Leland Stanford, Charles Crocker, Gov. Stoneman, the principal police officials and several others. These names were placed on the "proscriptive list," and placed in the hands of the executive committee, to carry out the orders of the association. The committee were to devise the best mode of accomplishing the ends of the base plot, and were thus engaged when their work was brought to a sudden termiand were thus engaged when their work was brought to a sudden termination to-night by the discovery of the association's headquarters, at 900 Montgomery avenue, by the police, and the arrest of four men found therein—Julius C. Koosher, Henry Wiseman, Chas. Mittelstadt and Oscar Eggers. In the room was also found a complete laboratory for manufacturing infernal machines.

Ten men were taken to the city prison, where they boldly asserted that they were dynamiters, and their purpose was to get rid of the citizens named and then raze Chinatown. The prisoners also belong to the Berman branch of the Anti-Coolie eague. No charge has yet been entered against the prisoners. Further developments are expected.

On arrival here he settled in Oregon, where he lived several years. He then moved over to Vancouver, and later to Walla Walla, in this territory. In 1873 he left the territory, went east, and settled in Mississippi; was admitted to practice there, was elected to the state constitutional convention to frame a state constitution, and practiced his profession in that state for over a year, after which he removed to Texas to engage in business with his brother. Atter a short residence in Texas, he removed to San Fran-cisco and engaged in the practice of lot 8, blk 26, McClure's Astoria; his profession for about a year, after 81.500.
