The feast of the Epiphany was yesterday celebrated in St. Mary's and Grace churches in this city.

The city paid \$142 toward exterminating dogs last year. So far the dogs are ahead. Every dog has his day.

Five vessels cleared for Queenstown from this port yesterday, carrying in the aggregate, 182,897 bus. wheat.

The British bark *Glenogle*, 914, Marshall master, 55 days from Taitai, arrived in yesterday. The *Firth of Dornoch* is due from Liverpool with tin plate and cannery supplies.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Fanny C. Ferguson took place from Grace church at two o'clock yesterday afternoon and was attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends and acquaintances.

Deputy U. S. Marshal J. C. Ross yesterday served a warrant on Capt. Warren, and first mate Curran of the *Sardinian* at the instance of C. W. Norelius, who claims that he was beaten while aboard the vessel. They go to Portland this morning.

Ten of the new electric lamps came on Tuesday's steamer. They are of clear glass, and are considered better than the ground glass ones first put up, which are more for store use than in the street. Twenty more are expected on Sunday's steamer and after being tested they will be put in place.

A Salem correspondent of the *Standard* says the B-publican slate is all fixed up for next June; that the state ticket is, for governor, D. P. Thompson; for congress, C. W. Fulton; for secretary of state, J. C. Fullerton; for state treasurer, Andrew Gilbert; for supreme judge, M. L. Olmstead. Well, well.

Hon. W. Lair Hill declines the judgeship of the new judicial district created at the special session of the legislature. It is thought that Mr. Pierce Mays may be induced to accept the place. If it really goes begging it may be that some of the boys down this way could be coaxed into filling the position.

The wind to-day will blow from the south, unless it should happen to veer around to the east; if the barometer falls we will have falling weather; if it goes up the weather will either tramp or follow suit; if the mercury goes down below zero we will have ice in the Columbia; if it remains stationary the weather will do likewise, a very rough bar will prevent vessels ready for sea from crossing out, or vessels under way from crossing in. Should to-day be cloudy and get cloudier the sky will be overcast; should the sun shine all day we will have clear weather.

What appeared to be a young riot in that part of China town on Chenamus yesterday afternoon was found to be a muss kicked up by Wah Chung, who claims that he made a big winning in a Chinese lottery there and that the chaps who were running the game wouldn't pay him. They say that he drew a knife on them and threatened to carve them, whereupon they blew their whistles and yelled. The last seen of Wah Chung, Sheriff Ross was walking him into the jail, and the bad men who coned him in to the scrape were drinking samshu and writing out a lot of tickets for another drawing.

Death of P. E. O'Bryan.

A private dispatch from San Francisco yesterday brought the sad news of the death of P. E. O'Bryan in that city the day before. Mr. O'Bryan was the junior partner in the well known firm of Henry Doyle & Co., and was a well known visitor to Astoria and the northwest. Of him it may with truth be said, "none knew him but to love him, none named him but to praise." A good business man, of high moral character, a firm friend, his was a character that elicited admiration, and many will be the expressions of regret at his untimely death. He was for many years a sufferer from consumption and his life was only prolonged by skillful medical care.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

The county commissioners were in session yesterday, a full board present.

In the matter of petitioning congress to allow Clatsop county the right to construct a bridge across Young's bay and Skapon creek, decided immediate action be taken.

Bond for sheep shed road approved. Report of viewers at Smith's point road extension read second time and allowed.

Report of viewers at Knappa road second time and minority report allowed.

Report of road from Smith's point to Skapon landing read a second time and ordered by the court that it be laid over until the next regular term for further consideration.

Bill of St. Mary's hospital to keep county poor for \$4 per week accepted by the board for no specified time.

In the matter of mortgages foreclosed, county clerk was instructed to examine all mortgages and make reference marginal notes.

A reduction of \$369 on assessment of Gust. Holmes was allowed. Report of S. Glasser, Supt. district No. 10, laid over for further consideration.

In the matter of the division of road district No. 15, petition and remonstrances presented and petition granted. Thos. De Moss appointed supervisor district No. 16.

A reduction of \$10,000 was allowed on assessment of property of A. Booth & Co.

In the matter of the change of the county road at Wingate's farm, ordered that the county furnish the necessary plank and stringers for a bridge to be 25 feet long and 12 feet wide, and that the road be located according to the report of the viewers.

A petition for a county road at Seaside to run to the ocean beach was allowed, and H. B. Parker, C. Leinenweber and P. C. Warren appointed viewers.

Peter Salvatore was admitted to citizenship.

The following bills were allowed: W. E. Dement, \$2.95; Columbia Water Co., \$24; Carl Adler, \$32.35; Max Young, \$1.60; Astoria Gaslight Co., \$16.45; Griffin & Reed, \$15.65; W. D. Baker, \$5; Drs. Fulton, \$17.55; W. G. Ross, \$324.30; Neil Nelson, \$16; B. B. Franklin, \$15; Carnahan & Co., \$65.20.

Ordered that the attorney be allowed to test the question of taxation without representation.

Ordered that the county treasurer be ordered to hold all monies that belong to the state by the assessment roll of 1885, now in sheriff's hands.

A DOUBLE ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

Story of the Loss of the "Carrie B. Lake" and Drowning of Part of the Crew, As Told by One of the Survivors.

Harry Robinson, the man who was ashore with the boat from the lost schooner *Carrie B. Lake*, last Sunday night, came over to Ilwaco from Stone's, where he had been stopping yesterday, and came upon the *Gen. Canby* yesterday afternoon in company with John and Wm. Exon, the son and brother of the drowned master of the schooner.

Robinson says: "About six o'clock Sunday evening, the weather being very thick at the time, we were heading south, all of us being in the cabin eating supper except the other man who was saved and whose name I don't know. He was steering. The schooner struck and we rushed on deck. We could see lights on shore which appeared to be about a quarter of a mile away. We burned flare-ups, but no use, and after half an hour or so the captain said that it looked as if a blow was coming up and if it struck the schooner would go to pieces, and the best thing for us to do was to get into the boat. So we all got in, the five of us. I took the oars, but a sudden sweep of the water carried them and the rowlocks away from us, and the boat was left to drift. We were going towards where we saw the light, three of us, the captain, Exon, the mate, Jamison, and myself, in front, pulling the boat along with us, and the other man and the Chinaman behind, when we suddenly came to a deep hole. The boat upset and the three of us held onto it, the other two staying where they were on the bar. We drifted around for an hour, the water dashing over us, and at last Jamison and Exon let go and the last I saw of them."

Here the captain's brother asked the narrator what made that ugly scar on his neck, a red line as of a recent cut showing on his throat.

"Well," continued Robinson, "I'll tell you. I suffered so much with the cold and the sea pouring over me that I lost all heart. I didn't see any use in drifting up and down and dying that way, so at last I managed to get my knife out of my pocket, intending to cut my throat and be done with it. I gave my throat one slash, as you see, when just as I was going to set the knife firmly in, my feet touched the bottom. I flung down the knife, and waded and staggered on to the beach where I fell. After lying there about ten minutes I managed to crawl to the house where I told them what had happened. They sent right away for Capt. Harris' life crew, which got up there as soon as they could. They went out to the schooner and found the man aboard. He said that when they saw us go into the deep water he and the Chinaman went back to the schooner, the Chinaman hung on to the bob stay, but along in the night he let go his hold and was drowned. Capt. Harris and his men brought him to shore. I stayed at Stone's till to-day, when I felt well enough to come up here. I never expected to see Astoria again."

The above is told word for word, as related to the writer. It is a plain narrative of one of the narrowest escapes both from accidental and intentional death, that ever came under our observation.

OREGON IN CONGRESS.

In the senate on Tuesday, a resolution offered by Mitchell of Oregon was agreed to, directing the committee of transportation routes to inquire into alleged grievances by discrimination and overcharge on freight rates from the far west, and also the subject of the improvement of the Columbia river and the removal of obstructions to navigation. The resolution recites in preamble that the Columbia and its tributaries drain a grazing and agricultural region of unsurpassed fertility, as large as Germany or France; that freight charges on wheat from the D. D. to Portland, eighty miles, are twelve cents a bushel, and for another distance of 214 miles are eighteen cents a bushel. It declares such charges exorbitant and ruinous to the producer, and instructs the committee on transportation routes to inquire into them and the proper means of relief, and also as to the importance of the speedy completion of the canal and locks at the Cascades, and of the proper means to be adopted to overcome obstructions at The Dalles.

Congressman Hermann will introduce a resolution into the house at the first opportunity, asking the postmaster-general to inform congress what alterations he has made in the mail service in the west, and his reasons therefor. It is said the extent of these reductions will be a great surprise to congress.

THE DEBTS A \$5 PIECE WILL PAY.

A little money sometimes goes a great way. As an illustration of this, read the following, founded upon an incident which is said to have really occurred:

A owed \$15 to B
B " \$20 to C
C " \$15 to D
D " \$30 to E
E " \$12 50 to F
F " \$10 to A

All of them were seated at the same table.

A, having a \$5 note, handed it to B, remarking that it paid \$5 of the \$15 he owed B.

B passed the note to C, with the remark that it paid \$5 of the \$20 which he owed.

C passed it to D, and paid with it \$5 of the \$15 he owed D.

D handed it to E, in part payment of the \$30 owed him.

E gave it to F to apply on the account of the \$12 50 due him.

F passed it back to A saying: "This pays half of the amount I owe you."

A again passed it to B, saying: "I now owe you only \$5."

B passed it again to C with the remark: "This reduces my indebtedness to you to \$10."

C again paid it to D, reducing his indebtedness to \$5.

D paid it over to E, saying: "I now owe you \$20."

E handed it again to F, saying: "This reduces my indebtedness to you to \$2 50."

Again F handed the note to A, saying: "Now I don't owe you anything."

A passed it immediately to B, thus canceling the balance of his indebtedness.

B handed it to C, reducing his indebtedness to \$5.

C canceled the balance of his debt to D by handing the note to him.

D paid it again to E, saying: "I now owe you \$15."

E took \$2 50 from his pocket, handed it to F, and returned the \$5 note to his pocket, and thus the spell was broken, the single \$5 note having paid \$2 50, and canceled A's debt to B, C's debt to D, E's debt to F, and F's debt to A, and at the same time having reduced B's debt to C from \$20 to \$5, and D's debt to E from \$30 to \$15.
