Scotchler & Gibbs, of San Francisco, have dissolved partnership. Chas. E. Gibbs will continue the business. The fine weather yesterday gave the streets a little livelier appearance than of late. Thus far the winter has been unusually fine.

Judge Seneca Smith came down from Portland yesterday afternoon and occupied the bench at the circuit court for a portion of the afternoon session. He will sit in some of the cases during the present term that have been carried over from previous terms of the court.

The Canby Minstrels will give Astoria a fine performance at Liberty Hall on the evenings of Monday and Tuesday, the 18th and 19th inst. This is the only soldier minstrel company on the coast and the entertainments they give are always received with universal satisfaction.

Mee Jin Jan a wily Mongolian, was yesterday on trial in the police court on the charge of resisting Officer Carlson, who was at the time raiding an opium den. He was about to forfeit his bail when he changed his mind and concluded to stand his trial to-day. Wong Ho, another Celestial, was fined \$4 for smoking opium.

Next Easter Sunday comes on the latest date on which it possibly can occur, April 25th, under the rule of the Council of Nice, which decrees that Easter shall be observed on the Sunday after the full moon following the 21st of March. Its earliest possible date is March 22d. It is one hundred and fifty-two years since Easter day has been so late. It will not again fall on that day till 1943. Ash Wednesday will fall, this year, on the 10th of March.

A Washington dispatch says that reports received at the general land office state that the Northern Pacific railroad company is making extensive sales of timber on public lands in Washington territory which are claimed as indemnity lands, but which have not been approved to the company. Commissioner Sparks has recommended suit to recover 4,000,000 feet of spruce and fir logs cut by one party in Chehalis county, W. T., under cover of the railroad claim, and sold to the lumber firm of A. M. Simpson, Brother & Co., of San Francisco, operating as the Hoquiam Mill company.

Attempted Incendiarism. The attempt was made sometime Sunday night, or yesterday morning to set fire to the fine residence that Capt. Geo. Flavel is building on Benton street. Some paper and kindlings were placed under the outside stairs and saturated with coal oil and then set on fire. The door sill and door against which the fire was built are of redwood, a wood which will char and smoulder, but which it is difficult to ignite to a flame. Had the door been of more inflammable material the result might have been the destruction of the edifice. Capt. Flavel is totally at a loss to account for the motive that prompted such a dastardly deed.

News Items from Various Points.

FATAL ACCIDENT. PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—Thomas Little, aged 21, was found at eight o'clock this morning, under a bridge four feet high, fearfully lacerated. He was on a spree last night and started home at eleven o'clock, jumped on an engine, fell off, was run over and died at noon to-day.

POST MORTEM. CINCINNATI, Jan. 11.—The Gazette to-day publishes an interview with Gen. Lew Wallace, late minister to Turkey. He insists that Halleck was jealous of Grant and tried to betray him, and that he tried to get the rebels to capture him.

DON'T LIKE HIM. WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—There is considerable opposition to the confirmation of ex-Gov. Gluck as pension agent at Topeka, because he maligned the memory of Lincoln and was a virulent rebel.

OPPOSED TO NYPOTISM. CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 11.—Charles Cleveland, a nephew of the president, says he wrote to his uncle sometime ago asking him for an office and never received an answer.

A BEAR REPORT. NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—There are bad reports here from Northern Pacific, Union Pacific and Texas Pacific railroads. A decline in prices is expected.

CUTTING AND STRIKING. A thousand street car employes are getting ready to strike. The cutting of rates by the Baltimore & Ohio railroad company to a charge of five dollars between here and Chicago has created great excitement among the representatives of other roads.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT. PITTSBURGH, Jan. 11.—The regular passenger train of the Baltimore & Ohio road while going at full speed ran into another passenger train; the passengers saw it in time to jump; a few were bruised; none killed.

A GOVERNMENT MONOPOLY. BERLIN, Jan. 11.—Emperor William has signed the bill giving the government the monopoly of the entire spirit business.

GERMANY TAKES POSSESSION. LONDON, Jan. 11.—News is received that Germany has taken possession of the Samoan islands by force. The marines landed, hauled down the Samoan flag and ran up the German flag. The American and British consuls have protested.

MAKE A DEMAND. The powers have demanded that Greece, Serbia and Bulgaria demobilize their armies. England demands the same of Turkey.

WASHINGTON TERRITORY COURTS.

A bill has passed the W. T. legislature, which among other provisions sets the terms for courts in a portion of western Washington as follows: Second District—Chehalis—First Monday in February and third Monday in August.

Tacoma—Fourth Monday in February, fourth Monday in June and fourth Monday in September. Vancouver—First Monday in April and second Monday in November.

Kalama—Fourth Monday in April and fourth Monday in October. Olympia—First Monday in June and first Monday in December.

Oysterville—Last Monday in March and August. Montesano—Second Monday in September and last Monday in March.

No grand or petit juries to be brought in at Chehalis in August term, or at Oysterville in the last Monday in March term, or at the May term in Montesano, unless required by the court.

It matters not in what calling a man toils, if he toils manfully, honestly, and contentedly. The little tin nail should be a badge of nobility everywhere, and in the "good time coming" boys," it will be.

Big Fire in Wallula. About half past 5 yesterday morning fire broke out in the laundry of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company's depot and hotel building at Wallula Junction, and before anything could be done to stay the progress of the flames the entire structure was reduced to a pile of ashes.

All the guests succeeded in making their escape and most of them saved their personal effects. Nearly all the furniture and hotel appointments were burned. The building was erected by the railroad company some three years ago at a cost of \$50,000, and was one of the finest buildings of the kind on the coast. It was insured for \$25,000.—Oregonian, 11.
