ORDINANCE NO. 453.

To Provide a Board of Health and to Pro tect the Public From Contagious and Infectious Diseases.

The City of Astoria does ordain as

Section 1. There shall be a board of health, which shall consist of the mayor, who shall be ex-officio president of the board, the committee on health and police of the common council, and a health officer. The health officer shall be a competent physician of this city. He shall be appointed by the common council and shall hold his office during the pleasure of the council.

Sec. 2. The chief of police shall be ex-officio health inspector, and shall perform such duties as are required of him in this ordinance and is may be directed from time to time by the board of health.

Sec. 3. In case the mayor, from any cause, shall be unable to attend to his duties as president of the board of health, the board may choose any other member of said board as president thereof, and the member so chosen shall possess the powers and perform the duties of the mayor, in that respect, during the absence or

inability of the mayor to act.
Sec. 4. The board of health shall have power, whenever in their judgment the public health shall require

1.
