A Very Creditable Performance Last In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Clatsop County.

We have examined into all charges of crime brought before us and have found indictments in such cases as seemed necessary. We compliment seemed necessary. We visited St. Mary's Hospital where the county poor are cared for, and found that the good Sisters in charge of that institution were giving every possible attention to the wants of the unfortunate people committed to their care. Our visit was made without any previous notice of our coming, and yet we found everything in the hospital neat as a pin and ar ranged in an orderly manner, show-ing that system, cleanliness and good order are the invariable rules in that institution. It could not be better onducted than it is at present.

We call the attention of the city onneil to the crowded condition of where they cook, smoke, eat, in less room than is allowed to a horse in his stall; their habits and filth are a standing invitation to contagious discases and it is only a question of time when small-pox or some other such disease will start there, and by

We recommend that an efficient cu bic air ordinance be passed and rig idly enforced as a measure for the protection of the public.

CHINESE IN PORTLAND.

The Standard says there are now ver one thousand idle Chinese in Portland, and all are of the coolie or working class, consequently they have no means of support except neager allowance doled out to them by their bosses or owners, and this is charged against them, and will

have to be paid out of the first work they do. The idle men congregate during the daytime at the "Mon ten tone," or loafing places. The joss house affords an excellent retreat for many of them, as a good fire is kept going there all the time, and the

Chinese as a rule are very partial to The poorer class, who have cruel bosses or masters "bum" their living at the room or store of a friend about meal time, and the etiquette of the nation demands that they be invited to partake, and the demands of the inner man prompts the acceptance of the invitation. By this means the poor heathen is able to eke out a miserable existence through the winter. The are longingly looking for-ward to China New Year, which will begin on the 3d of February and continue through five days and nights. During this period many visits are interchanged, and custom requires that if a man comes into a store or shop and wishes the proprietor a prosperous business for the coming year, the proprietor is in duty bound to pre-sent his well wisher a small coin, usually a five-cent piece. By taking advantage of this custom, many of the poorer class make quite a collection during the five day's festivities. One merchant informs us that he usually spends from \$40 to \$50 in this way every New Year. Many of the merchants and small shopkeepers are in very straitened circumstances, and unless work becomes more plentiful in the spring, several failures will be recorded. Many of the bosses are sending men out into the country to cut cordwood and grab land, and in this way they manage to scrape enough money together to keep the wolf from the door. However, there are many in town too poor to leave, and who are to be seen daily picking up refuse pieces of meat and stale bread to fill the aching void within.
