ASTORIA, OREGON: WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 27, 1886 ONE OF DINGLEY'S BILLS.

In another column is given the full text of a bill introduced in the house by Reed, of Maine, for Dingley on the 5th inst. It is not probable that the committee to whom it was referred will report it favorably. It certainly deserves no consideration, for a more ridiculous proposal could hardly be framed in words. It is an effort to do away with the pilot service and will certainly arouse determined opposition. In the almost impossible event of its passage, the government should at once take immediate steps to insure a large increase in the number of life saving stations. They would certainly be needed.

The bill is one of a batch of fifteen introduced on the 5th by Reed for Dingley and looks like a piece of buncombe. That it might meet with the approval of the committee to whom it has been referred, or that even after such favorable recommendation it would receive enough affirmative votes to make it a law, is a contingency too remote to merit discussion. The bill is a bad one and should be tabled.

THE BOYCOTT IN OREGON.

The Salem Assembly No. 4,321, Knights of Labor, have boycotted W. W. Martin, a jeweler of that city, for using watchcases made by the Deuser Watch company, a company that had refused to let any of the members of the Knights of Labor work in its factory. As this is the first public boycott of the kind that we have seen published in this state, we append it:

WHEREAS, W. W. Martin, jeweler, of Salem, Oregon, has refused to stop dealing in the boycotted Deuser watch cases, and asserted that he did not desire the patronage of the Knights of Labor, Resolved, That Willamette Assembly, K. of L. No. 4,421, ask of all persons friendly to organized labor to keep away from his store, and not patronize him in any way, shape or manner.

Resolved, That all who do purchase anything of him will be considered and treated as enemies of the order thereafter. Resolved, That all papers in Marion county, friendly to labor, be requested to publish these resolutions, so that none may deal with W. W. Martin ignorantly.

A WASHINGTON special says it is understood there will be no objection to the admission of Montana, though the population is not as great as is wished. While admitting the probability of the admission of Washington, it says the report that the leaders of both parties have agreed to admit the three territories, is without foundation, so far as learned. Senator Harrison, chairman of the committee on territories in the senate, would be likely to know if the agreement had been made. He says he has heard nothing about it. It is understood that the Democrats are more willing for the admission of Dakota than at first, thinking they may turn the political sentiment. It is doubtful, however, on account of the decisions of Sparks, over which the Dakota people are very indignant.

THE report that the Mormons are going to rise in armed conflict against the government is very unlikely. No doubt the Mormons are very angry, and if they thought themselves strong enough, would cheerfully enter upon a tussle with the government; but in spite of all their fanaticism they are by no means fools enough to believe that in a struggle of that kind they have any chance of even temporary success. Small and insignificant outbreaks among them may occur, led on by overzealous and uninformed partisans; but as for a general uprising, that is not to be thought of. The most intelligent among their leaders are recognizing the fact that polygamy must go,

and are preparing themselves to see it go quietly.

Gov. SQUIRES has signed the local option bill recently passed by the Washington territorial legislature, and it now becomes a law. The effect is to give each community in the territory the right to say, by a majority vote, whether liquor shall or shall not be retailed in the several communities. The first test of any importance will be in Seattle next June, where a determined effort for and against prohibition will be made by its friends and opponents.

THE reports made by the fortification board provides for thirteen floating batteries, to cost \$300,000 each. San Francisco will get two, New York four, Boston, Charleston and Pensacola each one. About forty torpedo boats for auxiliaries will be supplied, to cost \$100,000 each. For land the front fortifications will be of heavy armor plates of a thickness which will be impenetrable. No provision will be made for other ports on the Pacific coast.

A PHILADELPHIA dispatch says: One of the most formidable lobbies known is now endeavoring to get the president to issue a special message in favor of Ead's ship railway. It is a credit mobster scheme. It is proposed to place a bill in congress asking the government to guarantee interest on \$50,000,000 of bonds. There is no prospect of the plan succeeding in their designs.

THE only good thing in connection with some of the ridiculous bills now being introduced in congress is that it would take a hundred years to consider half of them, and their multiplicity insures their death by suffocation.

IT is thought that the foreign relations committee will probably recommend the consolidation of the Austrian mission with some other, as a rebuke for the conduct of that country towards the United States.

THE Tacoma Ledger wants to know why that city and Pierce county should pay its clerk \$7,500 a year in fees, when as good clerical talent could be got for \$2,500 a year. Why, indeed.

EASTERN Washington is making an effort to remove the capital from Olympia. Better wait till the question of state admission is definitely settled.

AN Australian cable is talked of to run from San Francisco via Honolulu to Sidney, to cost \$10,000,000.
