LOSS OF STOCK.
CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Dispatches indicate that fully 15,000 cattle died in the region of Fort Elliott, Texas, during the recent cold weather.

BIG FIRE.
FRANKLIN, Penn., Jan. 28.—The opera house block burned to-day; total loss, valued at \$135,000. Ten business firms were also involved in the fire and lost all.

CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.
In the circuit court yesterday the greater part of the day was taken up by the trial of Frank Miller, charged with larceny. The jury found him guilty.

In the afternoon the great case of Loomis vs. Mathieson came up. This has become a celebrated case and has awakened a great interest in the section of the county where it originated. It involves the ownership of a cow which both plaintiff and defendant are confident belongs to them individually. Four lawyers, twelve jurymen and a crowded court room awaited with bated breath, yesterday afternoon, the testimony of an expert witness regarding the effect of a cow having one additional tooth as compared with the renewed dentition of an animal possessed of four maxillary cuspids. The overwhelming magnitude of the case involving the possession of a cow and the payment of what must be a big bill of costs makes the matter one of great moment.

To an ordinary looker-on it seemed as though the lawyers were doing the milking, and the parties to the suit would get the horns and tail. The case will be continued to-day.

In the evening the matter of the injunction in the case of the Oregon board of pilot commissioners came up. Messrs. Fulton and Dorris arguing that the injunction should obtain, and Messrs. Bowley and Page arguing that it should be dissolved. At the close of the argument the court proceeded to sum up the evidence in the case of the preceding day where the commissioners had been cited to appear and show cause why they should not be adjudged guilty of contempt of court in an alleged refusal to obey the mandate of the court regarding a writ of injunction served upon them by the sheriff.

His opinion as delivered was long and marked by moderation of statement. He summed up the evidence and stated it as his conclusion that while appearances would seem to indicate that a portion of the board acted in a way that might be construed as having an appearance of intending an expression of contempt to the court, yet, on the whole, he would take no further cognizance of the matter, and accordingly dismissed it.

Regarding the continuance of the injunction the court stated that a decision on that point would be announced to-day.

The Cushing Post band arrived here on the *Telephone* from Astoria yesterday to furnish music for the Grand Encampment of the G. A. R. They attracted a large crowd at the wharf by the music they made as the steamer passed along the city front. —*Oregonian*, 28.

AN ANTI-CHINESE CONGRESS.

Called to Meet in Portland on Saturday, February 13.

A mass meeting of members of different encampments of the anti-coolie association was held in Portland last Wednesday evening at which several speeches were made and the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTIONS.
WHEREAS, We, the citizens of Portland and vicinity, in mass meeting assembled, do believe that unless intelligent action be immediately taken by us on the Chinese question, destruction of life and property will be the inevitable result. And inasmuch as there are thousands of our wage workers out of employment, with no prospect in the future of securing work whereby to earn bread for themselves and families. And realizing that under the present state of affairs their condition cannot be made worse. And seeing as we do the danger that threatens our city, we deem it our duty to humanity to adopt the following resolutions. Therefore be it

Resolved, That a congress be held in the city of Portland on the second Saturday of February next for the purpose of taking intelligent and concerted action in this matter. Be it further

Resolved, That all companies, corporations, trades unions and labor organizations be and are hereby requested to hold meetings and elect delegates to represent their respective organizations, each organization, trade union, company or corporation to be entitled to three delegates to represent their respective locality. Be it further

Resolved, That no delegate shall be admitted to this congress without the proper credentials, signed by the presiding officer and secretary of his respective organization. Be it further

Resolved, That a committee of ten be elected by this meeting with full power to act in these matters. Be it further

Resolved, That we invite our co-workers in eastern Oregon and Washington territory to assist us in this movement. And be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and resolutions be published in all the papers of Oregon and Washington territory.

SPARKS FROM THE WIRES.

Mrs. U. S. Grant has received a check for \$250,000 from the publishers of her husband's memoirs. It is thought her entire profit will be as much more.

The *Tribune* and *World* correspondents in Washington, write that there is strong probability of the passage in the house of the bill for the revision of the tariff. It will receive the support of both parties, they think.

Holden Dick and Vincente Olivas were taken from jail at Susanville, Cal., on the night of the 26th and hanged to the beams of a wood shed in the court house yard by a mob. Dick was a Pitt river Indian and confessed to the killing of S. B. Shaw, three years ago. Olivas was a Mexican, who confessed to the killing of Griffin Logan last November.

A meeting of the board of directors of the O. P. R. R. was held last Friday at the company's office in Corvallis. An official telegram was read from President Hoag, stating that the subscription from Albany had been received and accepted, and that work on the road would commence by the first day of next March. This means a business boom for this city; and every business man should prepare himself to meet and give it encouragement. —*Albany Herald*.

Captain Harriman, pilot of the steamship *Walla Walla*, fell from a sleigh a few days ago, and sprained one of his arms very seriously. The pain is so intense that he can neither sleep nor eat. —*Seattle Post-Intelligencer*, 26.

FIGHT BETWEEN MEXICAN AND AMERICAN TROOPS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27.—A telegram received at the Presidio to-day from Fort Bowie, Arizona, signed by General Crook, gives the contents of a dispatch received by the latter from Lieut. Maus, dated Nogori, Sonora, Mexico, January 21. It states that the troops under Capt. Crawford, January 11, surrounded and attacked an Indian camp fifty miles southeast of Nogori. A two hours' running fight took place and a number of Indians were wounded, but all escaped.

The hostiles sent word that they wished to hold a conference, and while the troops were in camp awaiting the time fixed for the conference, they were attacked by 154 Mexican soldiers. Efforts were made to let them know the troops were Americans and Lieut. P. Maus advanced to talk with them, when a volley was fired. Capt. Crawford was shot in the head, and Mr. Horn, interpreter, was slightly wounded in the left arm.

The Mexicans' fire was partly returned by scouts of Capt. Crawford's command, but only sufficient to keep them at a distance. The firing lasted half an hour.

When Lieut. Maus succeeded in having a talk with the officer in command of the Mexicans, their captain having been killed, he was told they had been taken for hostiles, owing to the darkness. The Mexicans signed a paper to that effect.

The loss to the Americans by the unfortunate affair was: Capt. Crawford, mortally wounded; Mr. Horn, chief of scouts; two Indians, slightly wounded; and another severely wounded. The Mexicans' loss was four killed and five wounded.

In the telegram sent by Lieut. Maus to Gen. Crook he says of this affair that he believes the Mexicans expected to drive the Americans off with an overwhelming force, and secure their camp and effects.

Capt. Crawford died on the 18th, during the march to Nogori, where he was buried. He was unconscious until his death. Lieut. Maus then assumed command.

While the troops were en route to Nogori two squaws entered the camp, through whom arrangements were made by Lieut. Maus for a conference with two bucks of the hostile band. This ended by Chief Nana and one buck, the wives and children of both Geronimo and Natchez, a sister of Geronimo, one boy and a woman being given as hostages to Lieut. Maus for observance of peace until Geronimo meets Gen. Crook, with whom he expressed a wish to have a talk. The meeting between Crook and Geronimo will take place in about a month and will undoubtedly end in the Indians surrendering. The band consists of chief Geronimo, Natchez, Chihuahua and Nana, twenty bucks, some women and children.

Lieut. Maus is now heading for Lang's ranch.

There has been considerable speculation as to who owned the opium captured by Collector Beecher. The opium manufacturers here are very quiet on the subject, and very little information can be gleaned about actual ownership. However, it is understood that the opium was the property of two of the Chinese merchants, one being the chief owner, and that it was smuggled through on the *Idaho* for a high commission, so the loss in opium will fall altogether on the Chinese. —*Victoria Colonist*.

One of the largest trees ever put into the water by a Skagit logging camp was one that was cut at Jackson's a few miles above Mt. Vernon, last week. The tree contained three 24 foot logs, which sealed as follows: Butt, 7,512 feet; second, 6,732 feet; and top, 5,825 feet—a total of 20,070 feet of lumber in the tree. The diameter at the small end was 78.71 and 64 inches, respectively. —*Spokaneish Eye*.

To Remove the Chinese.

Says the *Oregon City Courier* of Jan. 15: To a member of the labor bureau committee I. Jacobs of the firm of Jacobs Bros., stated that he would willingly place white help in the woolen factory instead of the sixty Chinamen, but he must have written guarantees that the white help would stay two years at the wages paid to the Chinamen, which is ninety-eight cents a day, or \$25.50 a month, only four receiving \$1.07 per day. He could not, considering eastern competition, pay out more in wages than he did. The mill had eight drummers on the road, trying hard to place its large surplus of goods on the market. Some of them were in Iowa and Nebraska, and his brother had gone to New York in search of customers. If their over-production could not be disposed of, they might be obliged to shut up the mill for awhile, though he hoped such a misfortune would be avoided, as it would be a serious blow to his white hands, in whose welfare he took an interest. He wished to see the Chinamen displaced by young ladies and boys of families living here.
