### HOME NEEDLEWORK.

Needlework that can be done at home at a trifling cost of means and labor always proves attractive, to use up odds and ends that are useless and make therefrom some pretty article to beautify a home is both entertaining and profitable; for what adds more to home comfort than the many little trifles that take from the rooms the cold bare look that always reigns where furniture alone is used for the adorning?  
Articles made of feathers are much in vogue and command a high price. Many persons have stores of peacock and other feathers laid by. These can be utilized and many articles made up at home from them. Fire-screens made of peacock feathers are very fashionable and can be easily made. Cut a foundation of stiff black net; the most popular shapes are those of a shamrock leaf or of a shield. These are made of various sizes to suit the fancy of the owner; whether the screen is merely to shield a grate or a larger fire must decide the question. The feathers are to be sewed firmly on this net with coarse black thread, beginning at the edge, placing the feathers a little beyond it and finishing off in the center. Let the best feathers be placed at the edge, for there they show most, and place the smaller ones in the centre. Do not let the quills of the feathers be too long or it will have a bunched effect; put the feathers as close together as possible, and take care that the thread does not become entangled in the small light feathers and make them look ragged. The center where the feathers join should be covered with a bird's head and neck, or, if this is not possible, with a full tuft of peacock's breast feathers. The back of the screen should be lined with very stiff cardboard of the size of the net; over this put a lining of colored satin, silk or tery, fastening it to the edge of the net so the feathers stand up all around above it. This when finished is fastened into a piece of wood, the shape of the piece upon ordinary Japanese fans, made to stand upon feet; the wood can be gilded or stained black.  
Small hand-screens can be made by covering old Japanese fans with feathers and finishing them off in the middle with a bird's head or a rosette. Soft white or gray feathers look very pretty for hand-screens or fans, with an ornament in the center or something bright in color.  
Pheasant's feathers may be made up into very pretty bonnets. Take a small capote and cover the crown with feathers sewed on evenly and firmly. Cover the front with brown velvet put on as a puff, have a breast for trimming it by first making a small wadded pad, and sewing on it the breast feathers arranged rather full. You here have a stylish bonnet at merely the cost of frame, a small quantity of velvet and strings, as the feathers can be kept from time to time when pheasants are used.  
If you are the fortunate possessor of a large quantity of feathers, a handsome rug to lay before a fireplace or door or a carriage rug is handsome and effective. Cut a rug the size you propose making out of thin cloth or burlap, sew the feathers on in a star or pattern for the center, the pattern first being drawn upon the foundation. Then put a deep border all around and you will have a rug that will be the envy and admiration of your friends and neighbors. Feathers used for this purpose should be sewn on as tight and flat as possible, in consideration of the somewhat hard wear they will have to undergo.  
Patchwork is now so elaborate that it does not in the least resemble the work that used formerly to be known under that name. A new idea is to make the work of diamonds of colored silks, velvets or satin, arranged of course, with a due regard to the blending of colors. A fine gold cord or braid is tacked along all the seams where the diamonds are joined, so that it has the effect of parti-colored quilting. Sometimes feather-stitch is substituted for the cord. This patch-work forms very handsome covers for cushions, and when made in a piece about eighteen inches square, trimmed around with gold lace or fringe, makes a bright and pretty toy to throw over a chair. When used for this it should be lined with thin silk or silesia to cover up the raw edge upon the back.  
Push mats for standing under lamps are made nine inches square, edged all around with a narrow gold cord and finished off at each end with a silk tassel matching the mat. Red, old gold and moss green are the three favorite colors. They are lined through with cotton flannel.  
Keepsakes for holding waste paper or a piece of hand-work can be made from a small-sized Japanese parasol, half-opened and kept up by means of a wire run along inside and a bright ribbon twisted in and out around each other point outside. The top is fixed into a small stand of black or vermilion-painted wood and the handle (which is uppermost) is bound over with colored satin or velvet ribbon, finished off with a cluster of hanging loops and an artificial bird or spray of grass and feathers to one side. A fall of lace is sometimes added or a pompon hanging from every alternate point. These small-sized colored paper parasols can now be had so cheap that the outlay is not large and they can be varied in color, in the shape of stand and made of trimming to suit the fancy.—(Philadelphia Times.)

### A Wicked Boy at the Capital.

The wickedest boy lives in Washington. He visited the observatory a few days ago with a large fire-fly he had caught, and with the aid of some mucilage stuck it in the center of the largest lens of the telescope. That night, when the astronomer went to work, he perceived a blaze of light apparently in the heavens, and what amazed him the more was that it would give a couple of spurts and then die out, only to burst forth again in a second or two. He examined it carefully for a few minutes and then began to do sums to find out where in the heavens that extraordinary star was placed. He thought he found the locality, and the next morning he telegraphed all over the universe that he had discovered a new and remarkable star of the third magnitude in Orion.  
In a day or two all the astronomers of Europe and America were studying Orion; they gazed at it for hours until they were mad, and then they began to telegraph to the man in Washington to know what he meant. The discoverer took another look and found that the new star had moved 18,000,000 miles in twenty-four hours, and upon examining it closely he was alarmed to perceive that it had legs. When he went on the dome next morning, to polish up the glass he found the lightning bug. The bill for telegraphing dispatches amounted to \$2,500, and now the astronomer wants to find that boy.—(Washington Letter.)

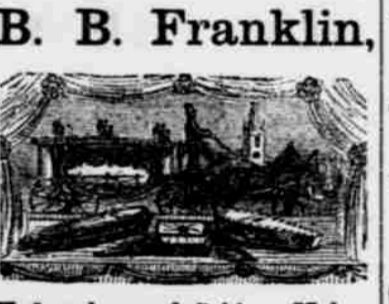
