STEALING PUBLIC LANDS. From Colorado comes an interesting account of how land is taken up and settled in that part of the country. It is said that the works of the company which supplies the city of Denver with water are situated on land obtained through titles issued upon fraudulent homestead entries. It appears the company could not afford to buy scrip, which is necessary to locate any large blocks of public land, so they employed a number of the agents of the company to make fraudulent homestead entries. The way it was done was this: A toy house, two stories high, neatly planed, 16 inches by 24, and 30 inches in height, was made. It had a handle upon the ridge-pole of its roof. The would-be homesteader would take this house in one hand and a blanket over his arm. He would then proceed to a quarter-section, set up his house and lie down by the side of it in his blanket and way the company acquired a large either rail or vessel, block of land. WHILE Representatives Randall, Morrison, Holman and Speaker Carlisle hold decided and opposite views concerning the tariff, they entirely agree on the question of antagonizing large expenditures of money not necessary or absolutely required. For the present, the receipts of the government will not be sufficient to meet the proposed outlays. The question is, therefore, in the event that congress should attempt to pass all these measures, how the money should be obtained. Both representatives Randall and Morrison favor an income tax. They be lieve this to be the most equitable and easiest of execution of all methods of raising revenue. Morrison, Carlisle and other tariff reformers would prefer to raise the revenue by a revision of the tariff in such way as to increase the revenue from that source, but as they fear this cannot be accomplished they are willing to adopt the income tax. Randall thinks that an income tax should be imposed anyhow to raise sufficient money to pay the pension list.
