This was occasioned by a change in the time of meeting of the legislature from September to January. No one ever served two full terms as governor of Oregon, though Gov. Grover came very near it.

In the circuit court yesterday, the case of Braunschweiger vs. Gure Arvola, was on trial. After evidence and argument the case was given to the jury, which found a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$227. The grand jury returned four true bills, and one not a true bill. Olaf Kynsijow and Peter Snomela renounced all allegiance to foreign prince or potentate, and court adjourned to this morning.

The O. R. & N. Co.'s shops at The Dalles have shut down indefinitely. On Christmas, says the News, the men were notified of a shut down until New Year's, and since then have been told that their services were no longer needed. The suspension of work is in accordance with orders from headquarters in New York, and is believed to have some connection with the lease of the O. R. & N. Co. to the Union Pacific.

SALEM, Jan. 12.—Gov. Moody appeared this morning and read his retiring message to the legislature in joint session. Gov. Pennoyer was then sworn in and read his message, which provokes considerable comment.

CHANGE OF ADMINISTRATION. SALEM, Or., Jan. 12.—The senate and house met in joint convention at ten o'clock this morning to hear Governor Moody's excellent retiring address and Governor Pennoyer's inaugural. His severe attack on the Federal and judiciary is criticised and regretted by most of those whom your correspondent has met. No other business was transacted to-day.

CUT DOWN HALF. PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—Judge Shattuck to-day ordered the Kelly-Highfield verdict cut down half and ordered judgement entered for seven thousand dollars instead of fourteen thousand dollars. This will probably end the case, but it is not positively known.

THE NEW JERSEY LEGISLATURE. TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 12.—Two policemen, who exercised their authority in the assembly chamber yesterday, were arrested to-day, but were at once admitted to bail; the object of the arrest simply being to lay a ground for proceedings against Governor Abbott, who decided the policemen's actions. The purpose of allowing the regular Democrats to organize the assembly on their own basis was abandoned, and the house met this morning with speaker Baird in the chair, and the members elected were sworn in.

TURKEY AND BULGARIA. CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 12.—The mission of Zankoff to Turkey it is expected will be without any definite result. Zankoff helped to obtain the assent of the porte to the resumption of power in Bulgaria, but it is unlikely that he will gain support, as it is considered impracticable that he should be placed in office in view of the position to him of the Bulgarian army and people.

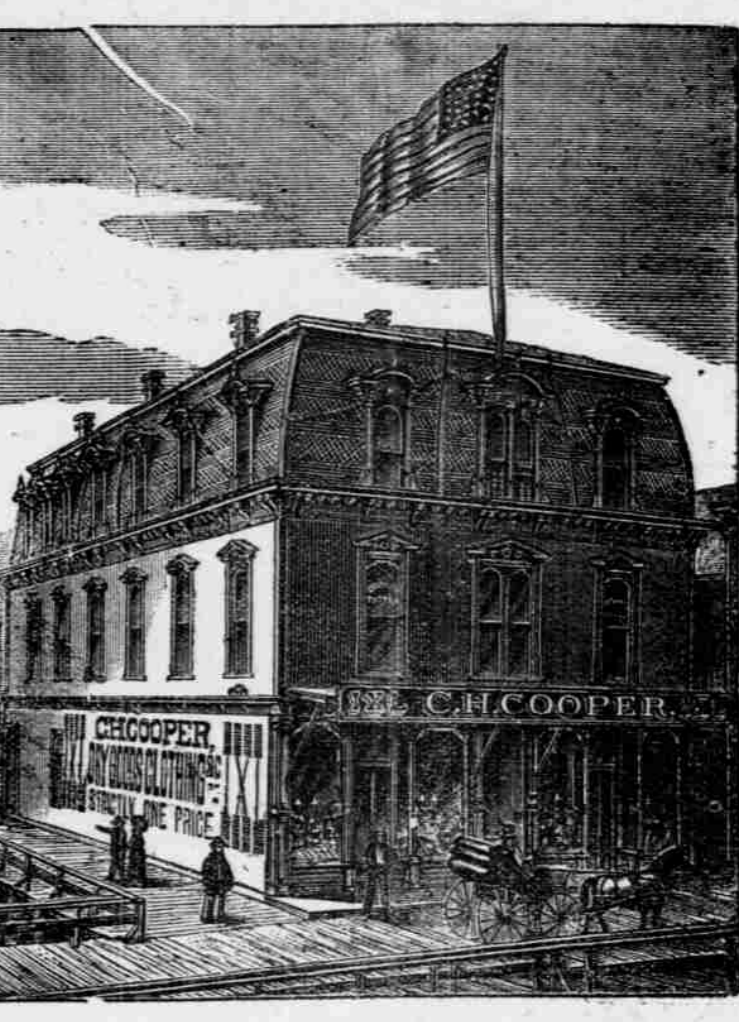
