United States Senatorial Elections.

NEBRASKA.
LINCOLN, Jan. 18.—The first ballot for United States senator was taken to-day at noon in the two branches of the state legislature, and resulted as follows:
Senate—Paddock, Rep., 4; Cobb, Rep., 2; Van Wyck, anti monopolist, 11; Weaver, Rep., 4; Laird, Rep., 1; Riese, Rep., 3; Morton, Dem., 7.
House—Van Wyck, 33; Morton, 25; Weaver, 12; Paddock, 8; Cobb, 8; Laird, 5; Miller, Dem., 2; Nance, Rep., 1; Livingston, Rep., 1; Thayer, 1; Dilworth, Rep., 1; Maxwell, Rep., 1. This gives Van Wyck a total of 44. The Democrats have 34 and the Republicans 55 distributed among various candidates. The Republicans will probably caucus to-night, and concentrate their strength on one man. The first joint ballot will take place at noon to-morrow. Indications for a deadlock are very favorable. It is conceded that Van Wyck, in to-day's ballot, received four votes of Democrats. The only question is now whether he can or not secure enough Democrats to secure his election. It is conceded that he will get quite a number of additional Democrats, but the Republicans confidently claim he cannot control enough to secure his election.

CALIFORNIA.
SACRAMENTO, Jan. 18.—At the Republican legislative caucus this morning senator Henry Vrooman received the nomination for U. S. senator. The other nominees were Chancellor, Hartson and S. C. Houghton.

A ballot for U. S. senator was taken in the assembly to-day. Vrooman, Rep., received 40 votes, and Hearst, Dem., 28. In the senate the vote for U. S. senator resulted as follows: Hearst, 25, Vrooman 11.

MASSACHUSETTS.
BOSTON, Jan. 18.—Both branches of the legislature met this afternoon in individual session to ballot for United States senator. On the first ballot the senate stood: H. L. Dawes 11, J. D. Long 12, H. A. Collins 14, G. D. Robinson 2. The senate then adjourned.

MAINE.
AUGUSTA, Maine, Jan. 18.—The legislature to-day elected Eugene Hale to succeed himself as United States senator.

MISSOURI.
ST. LOUIS, Jan. 18.—The two branches of the legislature voted separately to-day for a successor to Senator Cockrell. In the house the vote stood: Cockrell 86, Warner 50, Ford 2. Senate—Cockrell 25, Warner 8.

ILLINOIS.
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 18.—Both houses of the legislature voted to-day in separate session for United States senator, Charles B. Farwell receiving the total Republican votes. A joint session will be held to-morrow.

NEW YORK.
ALBANY, Jan. 18.—At the Republican caucus to-night two ballots for senator resulted as follows: Miller 45, Morton 36, Hiscock 11. Adjourned.

MICHIGAN.
LANSING, Mich., Jan. 18.—F. B. Stockbridge received the Republican votes in both houses to-day, for senator. Joint ballot occurs to-morrow.

CONNECTICUT.
HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 18.—Gen. Joseph R. Hawley received the majority vote in both houses to-day for senator.

PENNSYLVANIA.
HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 18.—M. S. Quay was to-day elected United States senator.

Forced Him to Confess.

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 18th.—A few nights ago a store was entered here and \$1,000 stolen. Suspicion rested on a man named Shellnutt, and on Sunday night his door was broken open and a party of men wearing masks hurried him off. Finding a suitable limb they produced a strong rope and fastened one end around his neck and drew him up. After suspending him until life was almost extinct, the line was slackened and an opportunity given him for confession, but this he refused to do, and again was the rope tightened. When the breath had about left him, Shellnutt was taken down and dragged 100 yards to a log. While he held him across it, a brazen fellow administered a severe flogging with a cat-o-nine tails made from a heavy leather strap. Finally, with his back bleeding from a hundred wounds the poor wretch, to save his life, told them that a man named Griffith robbed the store, and that he (Shellnutt) happened to see him in the act, and that Griffith gave him \$5 to keep mum. The mob then let Shellnutt go. He is in a precarious condition and may die.

The Satsop railroad is working about 150 men on the grade at present. They have made preliminary surveys, so it is said, on the grade, and will build their road on to Gray's harbor as rapidly as it can be done with their present force, which is to be greatly increased as soon as the weather moderates. Both roads have track laid and are running trains for about six miles from tide water on Puget sound. Neither are at present laying track, but are doing the most work on grading and on trestle work. In the meanwhile they are running several logging camps, and putting large numbers of logs in the water daily. Work on the contract extending the railway as far as Elma must be begun before March 1st. Wages on the two roads are nominal, being on one \$30 per month and board, and on the other \$2 per day, while a charge of \$5 per week is made for board.
