A bill has passed the state senate fixing the time for holding court in this county the third Mondays in February, June and September.

The Heppner Gazette runs a picture in its columns of poor old John Roach, dead and gone, and says it is a correct likeness of J. P. Wager.

A freeze up is all that is needed now to make the thing complete. The snow, etc., comes a little late this winter, however, and any detention to navigation is not among the probabilities.

Since Mrs. Dunway sold the New Northwest, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, the leading newspaper of Washington territory, has come squarely out in opposition to woman suffrage.

Reports from north and south indicate a big storm all along the coast. The sea is extraordinarily rough; vessels receiving constant buffeting from the waves. Fortunately, as yet, no casualties have been reported.

F. P. Hennessey, whose memory is dear to many Astorians, is at present working a little mining racket in New York city. The mine is in Mexico, the game is in Hennessey's mind, and the joke on the investors will come in later on.

Head Keeper Hornung and the other employees of Tillamook light house here have rather a protracted stay. The rock is a hard place to reach just at present and a locality that does not present a dazzling multitude of attractions in a social point of view.

Last Sunday Thos. Dalgott, aged about 16, a resident of upper town, was examining a revolver and the weapon, as is usual in such cases, was discharged, the bullet imbedding itself in the palm of his hand. Dr. Page out the bullet and the hand is healing.

D. L. Beck & Sons, M. J. Kinney, and F. H. Poindexter have formed a joint account to operate the Chilkat cannery in Alaska the coming season. Mr. Poindexter will go with the outfit from Astoria in June and will remain at Chilkat until the close of the season.

The Scandinavian Benevolent Society held a business meeting last night and among other things changed the times of their regular meetings from the first and third Tuesdays to the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The organization is in good working order, has fifty-three members and has a prosperous future before it.

The Snow & Burgess which had drifted over by the Clatsop Mill Company's wharf last Monday night was pulled off by the tugs Wizard and Escort yesterday morning, apparently uninjured, though a survey, of course, will be required to determine. The Raglan Castle, at Sand Island, lost an anchor and chain last Monday night. These are the only casualties reported from the vessels in the stream or at bar anchorage.

After reading the accounts of the doings of the various city councils as recorded in the various exchanges, it is evident as a matter of relative comparison that the Astoria city council does the business of the city in an economical manner with one or two exceptions. The Seattle papers are full of insinuations against the Seattle city council and think that making Seattleites pay \$37.50 apiece for lamp posts is a good deal like a cinch on the taxpayers.

During January, says the News, 236 first-class passengers and 490 immigrants passed Heron on the Northern Pacific bound west, and during the same time 212 first-class passengers and 435 immigrants passed Huntington on the Oregon Short Line coming this way. The San Francisco steamers brought 403 cabin passengers and about 800 in the steerage. The total passenger movement for the month was 1,956 as compared with 1,787 for January, 1896.

In the circuit court yesterday, in the case of Rosenbaum vs. Hobson et al., the demurrer to the amended complaint was sustained. In the case of Hobson vs. Bain & Rosenbaum the demurrer to the answer was sustained. In the case of the state vs. Julius Udy, previously convicted, the prisoner was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. The case of M. Dillon vs. Mrs. O'Brien, came up on a writ of review, and was a quod. Court adjourned to the 8th inst.

There are several miles of wind occasionally blowing in other localities as well as on the Oregon and Wash-

ington coast. At a railroad camp eleven miles west of the Cascade tunnel last Sunday morning a breeze blew through the woods, knocking down some big trees, which, falling, killed nine Chinamen and seriously scared nine hundred more. At another camp close by four white men were seriously injured by falling timber and taken to Tacoma for treatment.

The usual excursion of the legislature does not in the latest instance, appear to be an occasion of unalloyed pleasure. Several members of the honorable lower house went to Yaquina last Saturday, but land slides and water slides on the railroad tracks have up to last accounts prevented their returning. God moves in a mysterious way his wonders to perform, and if the legislature could be sidetracked at Yaquina for the remainder of the session the loss would not be irreparable.

LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.

SENATE. SALEM, Jan. 31.—The senate this afternoon was called to order by President Carson.

A message from the house announcing the passage of a bill increasing the salary of the county judge and treasurer of Klamath county, and changing the time of holding courts, was read a third time and passed.

Watts' resolution providing for the enactment of a general incorporation law for cities and towns so as not to conflict with the constitution. Referred to judiciary committee.

Barn's resolution inquiring whether the Yaquina railroad has earned the lands granted by the state, was made a special order for 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

BILLS INTRODUCED. By Cartwright, allowing The Dalles city to issue bonds for the construction of a bridge across the Columbia river. Read a third time and passed.

By Coleman, allowing Lane county to vote on allowing swine to run at large. Read a third time and passed.

By Shupe, amending an act incorporating Oakland. Read a third time and passed.

By Stanley, amending an act incorporating Jacksonville; engrossed.

By Simon, providing that the auditor of the city of Portland receive no salary as clerk of the board of police commissioners. Read a third time and passed.

By Shupe, for relieving relatives of insane persons for their support after commitment to the insane asylum. Read twice and referred to the judiciary committee.

By Siglin, authorizing the construction of a dyke in Coos county. Read third time and passed.

By Barn, to change the time of holding circuit court in the Fifth judicial district. Read third time and passed.

By Cartwright, abolishing free scholarship in the state university. Read the first time. Adjourned.

HOUSE. Called to order by chief clerk Jennings, and O. Summers was elected temporary speaker; roll call; no quorum, adjourned till to-morrow morning.

"Sic Transit Gloria Mundi."

So much was written about John Roach at the time of his business failure, eighteen months ago, that but little remained for his obituary. Several years ago Mr. Roach purchased the splendid country seat once owned by Ben Holladay, the overland stage route millionaire, in Westchester county, and known as Ophir Farm. The place contains some twelve hundred acres. Holladay bought it to please his wife, who had large notions, but he never cared to live there himself. To be among the politicians in Washington suited him better. Mrs. Holladay, however, set up a grand establishment at Ophir Farm, and the place soon became quite famous in a local way. But its brilliancy did not last long. For a number of years the bodies of Mrs. Holladay, her two daughters, who married titled foreigners, and one of her sons, have reposed in a vault under a chapel that she built on Ophir Farm. Less than twenty years ago the two Holladay girls enjoyed some fame as American beauties. One married the Baron de Bussiere, a Frenchman, and after living very unhappily with him a few years, died alone in a New York hotel. The other married the Count de Pourtales, also a Frenchman, and she, too, after an unhappy experience, died in a few years, expiring in a railroad car on the way from California. Ben Holladay is still in Washington. His second son died there lately, and his body was brought to Ophir farm to be interred in the vault under the chapel. One of Mr. Roach's sons, who has charge of the place, refused to bury the interment. Magnificent Ophir farm did not bring much happiness to the Holladay family. Nor did Mr. Roach get much enjoyment out of it. He was there for awhile after his failure, but did not like it, and soon returned to New York. His tastes were always of the plain sort, and a magnificent country seat, with various baronial estates, was rather too grand for him.

When one of the Holladay girls became a countess and the other a baroness it was supposed their golden cups of happiness were filled to the brim. But the draught in a golden cup may be as bitter as in one of common tin, and the Holladay girls so discovered, as did many other ambitious young women before them. Their titled husbands turned out heartless scamps, and all their dreams of joy and grandeur were soon dispelled. It is often so with dreams of that kind.—New York Letter.

Shipwreck and Loss of Life.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The British ship Kapunda, which left London December 11 for Fremantle, western Australia, with emigrants, came into collision near the coast of Brazil with an unknown vessel and was sunk. Three hundred of those on board were drowned. The remainder were saved and have arrived at Bahia. The Kapunda was an iron ship of 1,084 tons. She was commanded by Capt. Masson.

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 31.—An Ottawa correspondent of the Mail says: Yesterday the imperial government was made that the imperial government has consented to send men-of-war out next season to assist in the protection of the Canadian fisheries. To the people of the United States doubtless this would be anything but palatable information, but as a matter of fact, it is simply following a precedent established before the Washington treaty came into operation. A prominent official on being interviewed as to the correctness of the report, said: "It is true that the imperial authorities have consented to send out one or two gunboats next spring to assist the marine police in the enforcing of our fishery rights."

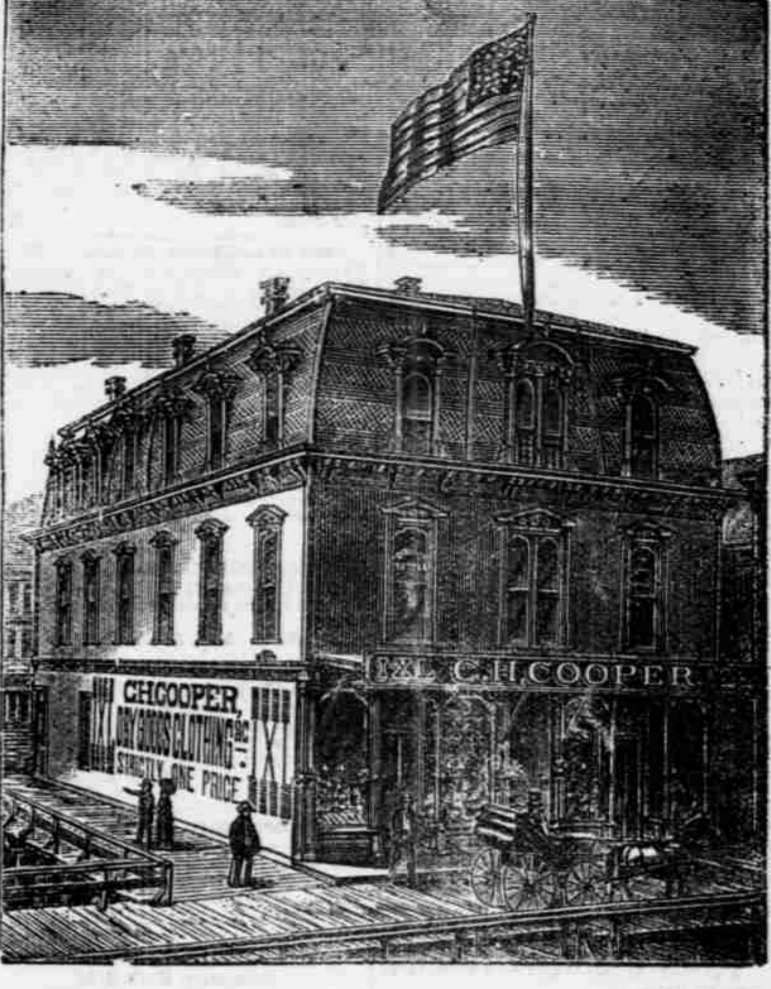
