CONGRESSIONAL.
SENATE.
WASHINGTON, March 2.—Among the papers presented by the presiding officer was a communication from the secretary of war with copies of all the dispatches of Gen. Miles referring to the surrender of Geronimo, with instructions and correspondence therein, called for by the recent resolution. Ordered printed.
Platt, from the committee on territories, reported the senate bill to validate and cure defects of certain acts of the legislature of Washington territory.
The senate committee on the District of Columbia held a special but very short session this morning and voted to report adversely on the nomination of James M. Trotter, of Boston, the colored man nominated to be recorder of deeds for the District of Columbia.

HOUSE.
On motion of Crisp, of Georgia, the rules were suspended and the senate amendments to the house joint resolution for the investigation of the accounts of the Pacific railroads were non-concurred in.
On motion of Voorhees, of Washington territory, the senate amendments were concurred in on the bill annexing a portion of Idaho to Washington territory.
The house resumed consideration of the conference report on the fisheries retaliation bill, and, after some discussion, agreed, yesterday, noon 134, to recede from the amendments to the senate retaliatory bill. The motion to reconsider is pending.
The conferees on the Pacific railroad investigation resolution reached a complete agreement. The house conferees adopt the senate amendment, but the clause exacting a commissioner is modified by striking out the requirements that the commissioners be subject to confirmation by the senate, and so arranging the phraseology that the president's power to appoint during recess is beyond question.

The house laid upon the table the motion to reconsider the vote by which it receded from the amendments to the senate retaliatory bill. This passes the bill in the shape in which it passed the senate.
The diplomatic and consular appropriation bill has been agreed upon in the conference.
The president to-day approved the military academy appropriation bill; the regular pension appropriation bill; the act to organize a hospital corps of the United States; the act in relation to the importation of mackerel during the spawning season.

The conferees on the District of Columbia appropriation bill disagreed, and will so report to the house. The points at issue are in reference to schools.
Canadian Pacific Steamer Line.
New York, March 2.—The Canadian Pacific railway, to which was recently chartered the Cunard steamships *Parthia*, *Batavia* and *Abyssinia* for the Pacific trade, has arranged to start the first line from Vancouver to Japan and China ports. The *Parthia* will be the pioneer steamer on the line, leaving Hong Kong by way of Hiogo and Yokama for Vancouver. The vessels will run monthly until the new steamships are built. The line will connect with the Peninsula, Oriental and Messageries maritime lines in the East India trade.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The attorney general informed the representative of the anti-Mormons, Judge R. F. Baskin, this morning that the Mormon bill would be signed to-day. The delay has been due to the desire of the president to give the bill his careful consideration.

Newfoundland Speaks Out.
NEW YORK, March 2.—A special from Halifax says: The address of the Newfoundland legislature to the imperial government has produced a sensation. It is not a declaration of independence it is the next thing to it. The Newfoundlanders tell the imperial government that they own their fisheries and they do not propose to pay the slightest heed to French or American interests or to brook any interference from the imperial government. The situation is so serious that both the premier and Sir Ambrose Shea, the leader of the opposition, have gone to London to represent the dangerous character of the prevailing feeling in Newfoundland. The press and people are universally discussing the benefits of annexation to the United States. Anything would be better than the present state of affairs, and if annexation was submitted to a popular vote it would be carried by a three-fourths majority.

ENGLAND'S REPLY.
LONDON, March 2.—The colonial secretary has sent a dispatch to the governor of Newfoundland informing him that the home government does not feel justified in disregarding the strong protests of France against restrictions at this late period which are calculated to inflict great loss on French fishermen, and is therefore unable to allow the bill passed by the Newfoundland legislature in relation to the fisheries to operate this season. The secretary says the government thoroughly understands that the French bounties are a grave disadvantage to British fishermen, still it is not shown that the British fisheries are unremunerative.
