It is written by Ben: Perley Poore, the veteran journalist, clerk of the senate printing records, editor of the congressional directory, and is a history of the United States government in its shirt sleeves. Sixty years of the social and political life at Washington is here portrayed in an inimitable way, and now being considered by Garrett, the book illustrates the wit, humor, genius, eccentricities, jealousies, am-bitions, and intrigues of the brilliant statesmen, ladies, officers, diplomats, lobbyists, and other noted celebrities of the world that gather at the center of the nation. It is just the book one wants, lifting as it does the mantle of official dignity and showing just how the great men of American history lived, shows their secret motives, the governing impulses of their lives. This is a view seldom gained. Great men's names and deeds are familiar, but the men themselves, their mental habits, their appearance, their associates, their personal characteristics. are far less known. 
