The Manzanita is supplying with coal the various lighthouses on the Sound.

Stutz' brass band was around yesterday, enlivening a damp afternoon with music.

Leon Fabre now has charge of the Vancouver telegraph office at a salary of \$45 a month.

Capt. Ingalls, of the City of Chester, is to take command of the Idaho, now on the way to Alaska.

At the Portland school election last Monday there were 912 votes cast: the successful candidate got 272—185 less than a majority.

In the police court yesterday the case of the city vs. Jas. W. Welch, charged with refusal to repair street adjacent to property, was dismissed.

The Stutz company at Ross' opera house played "Rip Van Winkle to a pleased audience, last evening. To-night they give "A Celebrated Case."

The question of ownership of the deep sea fishing net has been decided by Justice Cleveland. The ownership being awarded to S. McKenzie, the defendant.

Messrs. Bergmann, Christensen and Haaven are building a boat on Young's river to accommodate the growing trade of that section. It will be called the Frolic and will cost \$4,000.

Those fine oil paintings have arrived and will be on exhibition in the store next to A. V. Allen's, to-morrow evening. The collection is worth seeing and a general invitation is extended.

The appropriation being exhausted, no more meteorological reports from the bar via Astoria to the other offices. The treasury is bursting with money. The little \$500 stingily and grudgingly inserted to repair the cable was also denied; still the treasury funds pile up.

It is reported that the prospecting force of men on Lewis and Clarke's, engaged in selecting suitable rock for the jetty, has been discharged. It is in contemplation to shortly place a corps of engineers in the field to make a preliminary survey for a line of railroad from Fort Stevens to a suitable point on the Lewis and Clarke's.

C. B. Watson returned yesterday from a trip through the inland empire where he has been showing the tangible benefit and proposed workings of the invention recently made by Wm. A. Grondahl to overcome the difficulties of upper Columbia navigation. In the several places he visited he met with much encouragement and success.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Ross yesterday libeled the Gov. Nease, on the Wallucki at Mayor Trullinger's railroad camp, at the instance of Capt. Jas. Cox, who sues for wages as master, to the amount of \$3,000. Bonds will be furnished this morning for the release of the boat. The case will come up before Judge Deady on the 4th of next month.

Several canneries are busy making cans and a considerable amount of gear is being put in readiness, though it is probable little will be done in the way of catching fish for five weeks yet. The April fishing is particularly destructive to gear and otherwise unsatisfactory, and the tendency every season is to push the beginning of the season toward the 1st of May.

An exchange remarks "that men who are advertised in their papers are the men who transact the business of the town. You can pick up a newspaper, and in a few minutes tell who does the buying and selling and keep alive the interest of the place. A newspaper invariably reflects the worth, the enterprise and intelligence of the community in which it is published."

The last legislature appropriated in all \$41,000 to pay its own expenses, exclusive of the printing. Of this amount, says the Telegram, \$34,063.75 has been paid out by the state treasurer, and there still remain outstanding warrants which will bring the sum up to somewhere in the vicinity of \$40,000, about \$1,000 under the limit set by the legislature. It has been estimated by the secretary of state that the printing will cost near \$10,000; and so the total expense of the late session will approach \$50,000. The expense of the session of two years ago was about \$28,000, exclusive of printing, and of the special session, \$16,000.

THE TERRIBLE RAILROAD DISASTER. BOSTON, Mar. 15.—A revised list of the injured by the accident on the Boston and Providence railroad, yesterday, shows a total of 114; a gang of laborers were engaged all night in clearing away the wreck; At daylight a rope was stretched to keep the crowds of spectators at a distance. Two of the cars are nothing but kindling. The wreck is even more appalling than the White river Junction ruins.

FIRE AT BUFFALO. BUFFALO, March 15.—The large brick building of Miller, Greener & Co., was burned this morning; the walls fell, and in half an hour the building and contents were an entire loss; the loss on the building is \$200,000, and on the contents \$250,000. It is heavily insured; The upper floor was occupied by a masonic hall; loss, \$35,000; insurance \$26,000.

THE BIG RAILROAD DEAL. NEW YORK, March 15.—The latest regarding the big railroad deal says the Baltimore Ohio railroad has passed into the hands of a syndicate; it is also stated that Jay Gould has secured quarter interest. Russell Sage is also in the syndicate; the Western Union Co. also secures the telegraph; the Adams Express Co. gets the express business; the Pennsylvania Road gets the road; it is said all the details were arranged last night.

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The city council met in adjourned session last evening, councilman Bergman, president of the council, in the chair, a full board present. The proceedings began at 8:20. A proposition from Arndt & Ferchen was read, offering to duplicate the boiler for the engine of Astoria No. One, for \$1,080, that sum to include the taking out of the old boiler and replacing the same with the new boiler and furnishing all the necessary fittings, connections, first class work being guaranteed. A proposition from the Astoria Iron Works was read, offering to build a steel boiler for that engine, for \$1,200, that to include disconnecting old boiler and connecting new one, furnishing all the necessary fittings and connections, guaranteeing first class work, to complete within 30 days from date of contract, and furnish bonds for the faithful performance of the work. A motion authorizing the city to enter into a contract for the building of a boiler for that engine, was passed.

A communication was received from the board of fire delegates, requesting that the council require all parties becoming members of any fire company to deposit the price of a department badge, to be refunded when the said party withdraws from the department, and that the council buy a few more badges for present use. Referred to fire committee.

A remonstrance against the proposed improvement of Hemlock street, numerous, signed, was read, and, on motion, was granted.

A memorial from numerous property owners, calling the attention of the council to the condition of the property in the vicinity of blks. 32 and 36, McClure's Astoria, was read, and, on motion, referred to street committee.

A communication from F. R. Stokes asking that the liquor license of Jno. Enkela be transferred to Martin Empeo, after some debate, was granted, the city attorney stating that the law forbids any transfer of retail liquor license.

A petition from Pine street property owners asking for the improvement of Pine street from the west side of East 5th street to the east side of claim line of the city of Astoria, was granted.

A communication from street superintendent Logan, calling the attention of the council to the condition of Hemlock street, a debate following which elicited considerable hilarity.

An ordinance authorizing the committee on streets to enter into a contract with the Astoria Gaslight Co., was passed under suspension of the rules.

An ordinance establishing the grade of Cedar street was passed under suspension of the rules.

The reports of street superintendent and police judge for February were read and referred.

An ordinance amending ordinance No. 186 was passed under suspension of the rules.

The following bills were ordered paid: J. Erickson, \$23.60; Gragg & Co., \$135.50; J. G. Hnatler, \$89.04; Jno. Larson, \$5.75; F. Clinton, \$2.50; A. Abrahamson, \$5.75; R. Clinton, \$1.50.

The following were read and referred: Astoria Gaslight Co., \$137.55; \$9.80; Van Dusen & Co., \$3.60; \$24.35; D. L. Beck & Sons, \$7.10; M. C. Crosby, \$4.40; C. J. Treuehard, \$1.50; Jas. Gardner, \$8; T. S. Jewett, \$2.50; Carnahan & Co., \$1.30; Wm. Clinton, \$1.50; steamer Electric, \$3; R. E. Marion, \$5; Electric Light Co., \$48.50.

An ordinance authorizing the committee on fire and water to enter into a contract for the furnishing of a new boiler for Astoria Engine Co. No. One's engine was passed under suspension of the rules.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: ASTORIA, Oreg. Mar. 15th, 1887.

WHEREAS, J. W. Welch has received from the city of Astoria for the term of 10 years, from November 1876, and until revoked by the common council, a franchise for water-works, and

WHEREAS, the same James Welch, notwithstanding the favors he has received from the city of Astoria, refuses to repair the street adjacent to his property, therefore be it

Resolved, That the city attorney be and is hereby instructed to draft an ordinance to abrogate the said franchise.

On motion the street committee had given to it power to set in the matter of the crossing on Hemlock street.

On motion the police committee were given power to act in the matter of alleged infraction of the rules by officer Corbett.

On motion the city attorney and committee on health and police investigate the accounts of the late police judge C. P. Moffitt. On motion adjourned.

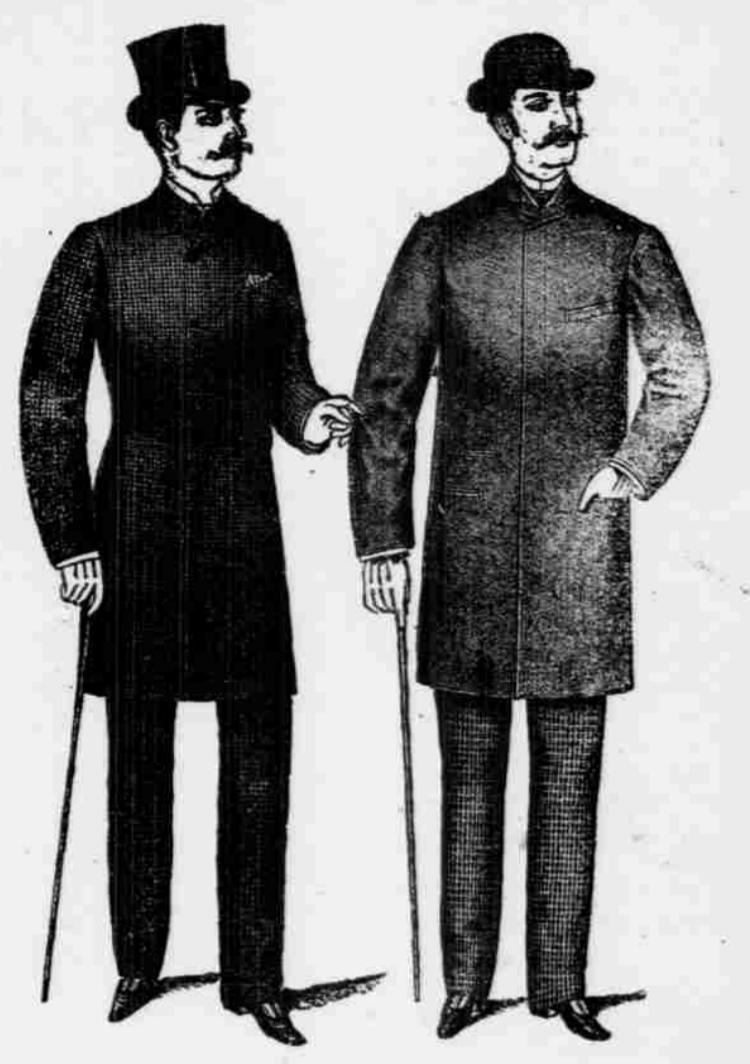
