From high railroad authority the Welcome hears that the O. R. & N. Co. lease is definitely off, and from equally high legal authority that the papers will all be signed and the lease go into effect within sixty days.

At two o'clock this afternoon at the court house door, by order of the assignee, E. C. Holden will offer at public auction to the highest bidder for cash, the unpaid book accounts of the estate of Prael Bros., insolvent.

The manager of the Trebelli and Musin opera concert has been here, and in order to give every one a chance to hear these great artists, it has been concluded to charge popular prices—50 cents, 75 cents and \$1.

The locomotive for J. C. Trullinger's railway came down on yesterday's river boat. This is the second railway engine in the county and the first brought here by private enterprise. Look out for the locomotive when the bell rings.

J. G. Stutz, whose theatrical company played here last week, is buying property throughout the northwest wherever he finds what he considers a good place to buy property in. He bought seven blocks of city property in Sprague. He tried to buy some in Astoria but the price asked paralyzed him.

For a wonder the Portland papers all agree on one thing—that someone is to blame for the recent suicide of an ex-policeman in that city. Each journal advances a separate theory. As additional hypothesis THE ASTORIAN suggests, that probably Elwanger himself was somewhat to blame in the matter.

Next Friday Mme. Trebelli, the celebrated contralto, Mons. Musin, the violinist, Signor Spagnolo, the tenor, and Herr Steindorff, the pianist, will appear in opera and concert at Ross' opera house. This company is in receipt of high praise from the eastern press. The box sheet for the sale of reserved seats will be open at the Crystal Palace at ten o'clock to-morrow morning.

Capt. Plummer, of the Wizard, while off shore about twenty miles, yesterday, sighted what he at first took to be a couple of castaways from some wreck, but on nearer approach found that it was a fishing boat with two men in it. They had left Gray's harbor for Brookfield last Sunday, but when overhauled were too far to the southward to hope to make it. They were taken in tow and brought as far as Astoria on their way up the river.

From the Oregonian it is learned that already this year "80,000 lbs of fresh Columbia river salmon has been shipped to the east." About the 15th of next August much will be said and sung about the catching of salmon after the legal time, and the "80,000 lbs" spoken of by the Oregonian represents about five per cent of the amount of spring salmon illegally taken from the Columbia river

A complete list of the lighthouses, beacons and floating lights on the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts, corrected to January 1, 1887, has been published by the government printing office. The characteristics of each light, and the color and description of the stations are given in full. The flashing white light at Cape Mendocino is visible twenty-eight nautical miles at sea, or farther than any other light in the country. The flashing light on the Farallone islands comes next, being visible twenty-six miles, followed by the fixed light at Point Loma, and the flashing light at Point Reyes, each of which can be seen for twenty-four miles.

FIRE AT NAPA. NAPA, Cal., March 21.—At nine o'clock last night a fire broke out in McBarnea's tannery houses, all of which were in a short time consumed, being very inflammable; loss, \$50,000; insurance, \$18,000.

SEAL AT THE MOUTH OF THE RIVER.

There was an item in THE ASTORIAN last Thursday about 1,000 seals being seen the day before at Sand Island.

That sounds like a good many seals, but Capt. A. Harris, of the Dolphin, says that yesterday he saw 1,500 about the same place. They were having a good time. Those fellows are terribly destructive. They will rob a net of nearly every salmon in it. A sea lion will content himself with snatching at to or three fish and go way swinging the fish and playing, but a seal swims stealthily along and kills the salmon just out of pure meanness. He will take a bite out of one, and nip another so that he is worthless, and so on, till twelve or fourteen are destroyed. They kill thousands and thousands of salmon every day at the mouth of the river and are an unmitigated nuisance. If there was a bounty for their destruction, as there should be, they would soon be decimated. Even as it is they are worth catching, for each seal will average three or four gallons of fine oil. They have grown so tame from the constant passing and re-passing of sail and steam craft that a seine could be dropped astern of them and a big haul of seals made netting a handsome sum to their captor, and earning the thanks of many 's fishermen who, after a hard night of toil, find nothing left him by the seal except a few gills and torn fragments of fish in his net.

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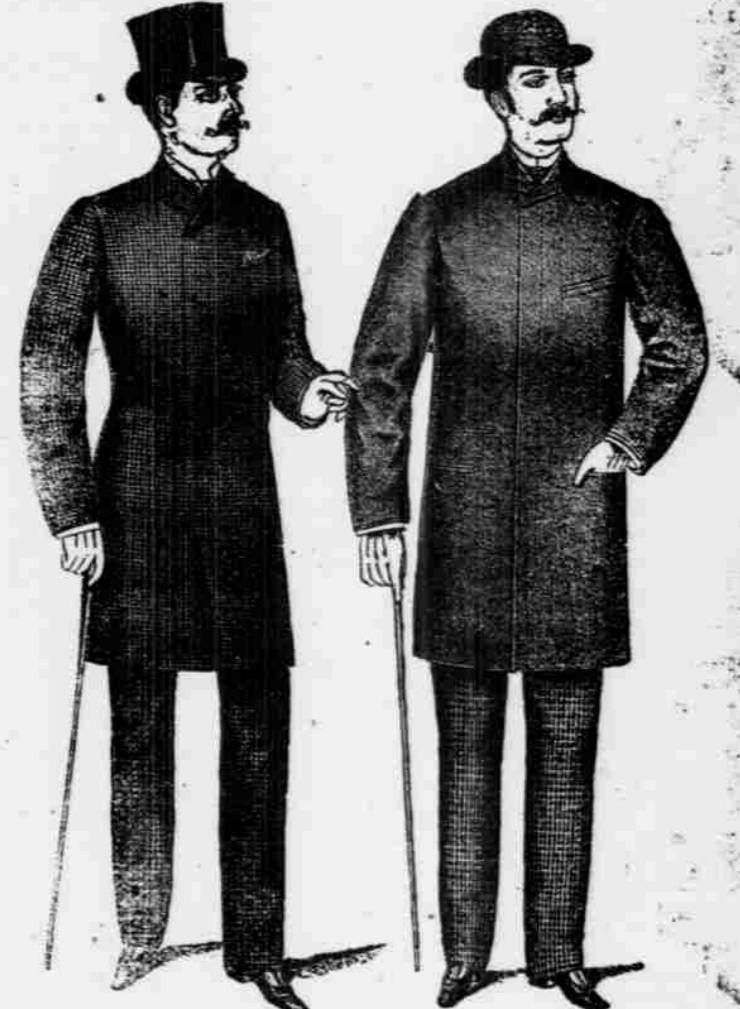
