The county jail is empty.

At the next state fair a \$500 prize is offered for military drill. Co. "H," O. S. M. to the front.

The Gen. Nellie is at the O. R. & N. dock, loading the cars and locomotive for Mayor Trullinger's railway.

The Olympian, which will run on the Alaskan route this summer, goes to the dry dock at San Francisco for repairs.

Testimony in the Toothaker-Warn staff contested land case was being taken before county clerk Trenchard yesterday afternoon.

The British bark Selkirkshire, 1,192 1/2 days from Melbourne, arrived in yesterday. The Abercorn and British Army sailed.

Some heavy salmon contracts have been made. In case the salmon should take a notion to strike it will be pretty rough on some of those who have "sold to deliver."

There will be an important meeting of Beaver Lodge No. 25, I. O. O. F., this evening to take steps toward the observance of the 68th anniversary of the founding of the order, on the 25th of April.

The regular quarterly teachers' examination will be held at the office of county superintendent Page on Tuesday and Wednesday next. This will be the last teachers' examination under the old law.

On the last steamer came a boiler and other machinery for the new cannery to be run by Wm. T. Coleman & Co., this season on their premises in the warehouse, work on which will be pushed to speedy completion. Mr. Weber will have charge of the cannery.

The inactivity that existed throughout the canneries last week has given place to considerable energy, and three or four are reported putting up salmon this week. There now seems to be an eagerness to "get in," and the presumption is that more will be in operation next week.

Eastern and San Francisco papers speak in favorable terms of Mme. Trebelli and M. Musin, who are advertised to appear here next Friday evening. The lady is said to be the greatest living contralto; the gentleman the equal of any living violinist. The occasion will doubtless be one of pleasure to the many lovers of music in Astoria.

Secretary Hodgkin, of the state fireman's association, has received from the chief engineer of the Vancouver fire department, where it is proposed to hold the annual fireman's tournament the third week in June, that he can raise only \$233.50 for premiums, when at least \$1,000 is needed. This is not very encouraging news to companies which intended to take part in the tournament. Astoria will be there in force and try to win the contests, premiums or no premiums.

There is little doubt, says a Salem dispatch to the Oregonian, that the new supreme court clerk will be Claude Thayer, son of the judge. The rumor that there has been a difference between Judges Thayer and Strahan about the naming of the appointee has evidently had good foundation, as is shown by the delay in the appointment, when it was generally understood that the clerk would be appointed at the first of this term. Judge Strahan has finally given his consent to the appointment, which will probably be made as soon as Mr. Thayer, Jr., can arrive from Tillamook.

The building in which the first newspaper was published at Eugene City was torn down last week, says the Telegram, to make room for a new brick block. The old building was erected in 1858, and the paper published there was known as the Pacific Journal. In the same building was afterward published the People's Press. These newspaper offices were visited by many of the leading men on the Pacific coast—Dr. Watkins, J. W. P. Huntington, David Logan, Col. J. W. Nesmith, Col. E. D. Baker, the "Gray Eagle of Republicanism" and the finest orator then in America, and many others. With the destruction of this old building one of the most notable landmarks in the early history of Eugene has passed away.

A reward has been offered by the commander for the arrest of the perpetrator.

CONTINUED ACTIVITY IN SALMON.

Reports of Recent Sales in San Francisco.

The unprecedented movement in salmon at this period in the year has up to this point received no check. Transactions during the past week have probably aggregated larger than for any week since the movement began. Orders for carload lots exhibit a very noticeable increase. English buyers have also bid \$1.30 per dozen f. o. b. for round lots of Columbia river salmon, which is equivalent to \$1.32 1/2 domestic. One lot of 5,000 cases was placed at this price. It is intimated that stocks in the hands of the two principal distributors of this product have been so reduced that they will soon be in the market as buyers, and this causes canners to hold for extreme prices.

Transactions for the week aggregated about as follows:

The sales of salmon (futures) to this date aggregate about 620,000 cases, which is about two-thirds the probable pack of the entire coast for the season. This in dollars aggregates about \$3,000,000 of a product, not one case of which has been packed up to this date. Nothing could better illustrate the condition of stocks throughout the world, or the desirability of salmon as a food product. Of the sales to date, the distribution approximates as follows:

This practically places this quantity of the pack in the hands of the jobbing trade of the salmon consuming countries. These contracts are understood to be for delivery if packed, and the actual deliveries from the figures given. Nevertheless, transactions illustrate the condition of the market as well as if deliveries were made on the day of purchase.

The amount of business done in salmon for future delivery this season is very heavy and over 400,000 cases Pacific coast fish have been contracted for. Besides this contracts have changed hands several times at a profit with each transfer and one firm is credited with having handled on paper over 380,000 cases thus far this season. Eastern and foreign buyers have freely entered the market and at this writing there is every prospect of the boom continuing. Prices are very firm as last quoted for Alaska and Sacramento, and higher prices for Columbia river.—S. F. Daily Comm. News, 18.

The market continues as active as ever. There has been offered and declined at \$1.25 for Fraser river fish. There has also been an additional sale made of the "Scandinavian" 12,500 cases at \$1.35. A re-sale of "Occident" has also been made, 5,000 cases at \$1.35. Sacramento river has been largely placed for export at \$1.31 @ \$1.31 1/2 for July and August delivery; one operator having taken 5,000 cases and another 3,000 cases. The Cutting Packing company have sold their Eel river pack at \$1.25 for export to Great Britain. Other large sales of Columbia river at \$1.40 and outside rivers at \$1.22 1/2 have also taken place.—S. F. Journal Commerce, 17.

CIRCULAR NO. 8.

OREGON RAILWAY AND NAVIGATION CO., GENERAL FREIGHT DEPARTMENT.

PORTLAND, Or., March 21, 1887. To Agents and Shippers:

Your attention is called to the following extract from the interstate commerce law:

"Sec. 2. That if any common carrier subject to the provisions of this act shall, directly or indirectly, by any special rate, rebate, drawback or other device, charge, demand, collect or receive from any person or persons a greater or less compensation for any service rendered or to be rendered, in the transportation of passengers or property subject to the provisions of this act, than it charges, demands, collects, or receives from any other person or persons for doing for him or them a like and contemporaneous service in the transportation of a like kind of traffic under substantially similar circumstances and conditions, such common carrier shall be deemed guilty of unjust discrimination, which is hereby prohibited and declared to be unlawful."

Please note that in accordance with above, all special rates or arrangements will be abrogated on 31st inst. Agents will be furnished with amended tariffs (if necessary) and complete instructions for future guidance, on or before April 5th, 1887.

Southern Pacific R. R. Possibilities.

"In the near future you will see a strife between the Northern, Central and Southern Pacific railroads for the northwestern trade, and I think Huntington's systems will carry off the chicken pie," said a well posted railroad man to a News reporter yesterday. "Possession of the Oregon & California railroad will not satisfy the Southern Pacific. I am told it will build from here to Vancouver, spanning the Columbia with a bridge, which is practicable. From thence it will continue on to Olympia, Steilacoom, and other places, paralleling the Northern Pacific and capture the trade of Lewis river and Cowlitz river and other rich agricultural sections. The Northern Pacific played a big piece of nonsense when it built its line down the Columbia to Kalama. It should have made for the Sound via Vancouver. Now the chances are it will have a competing line. Then again, the Southern Pacific may build from Forest Grove to Astoria, via the Nehalem valley, which Ben Holladay originally intended to do, and for which a land grant was given. This line would prove a paying one. As soon as the stage riding on the Oregon & California is reduced to five or six hours, which will be in about six weeks, there will be a good passenger movement."—News, 23.

THE NEW THROUGH FREIGHT RATES.

Following is the tariff on west bound freight from Chicago and St. Louis to Portland, as fixed by the transcontinental lines on the 15th inst. Rates from St. Paul and Missouri river are also given to make the table complete. They are subject to the joint western classification and will go into effect April 5.

These rates will also apply to Astoria and Seattle: to all points on the Northern Pacific west of Rathdrum, and on the Oregon Short Line west of Kuna. According to this, Spokane and Falls, Walla Walla, Pendleton and Baker City will be on a plane with Pacific coast terminals for some time to come.—Oregonian.

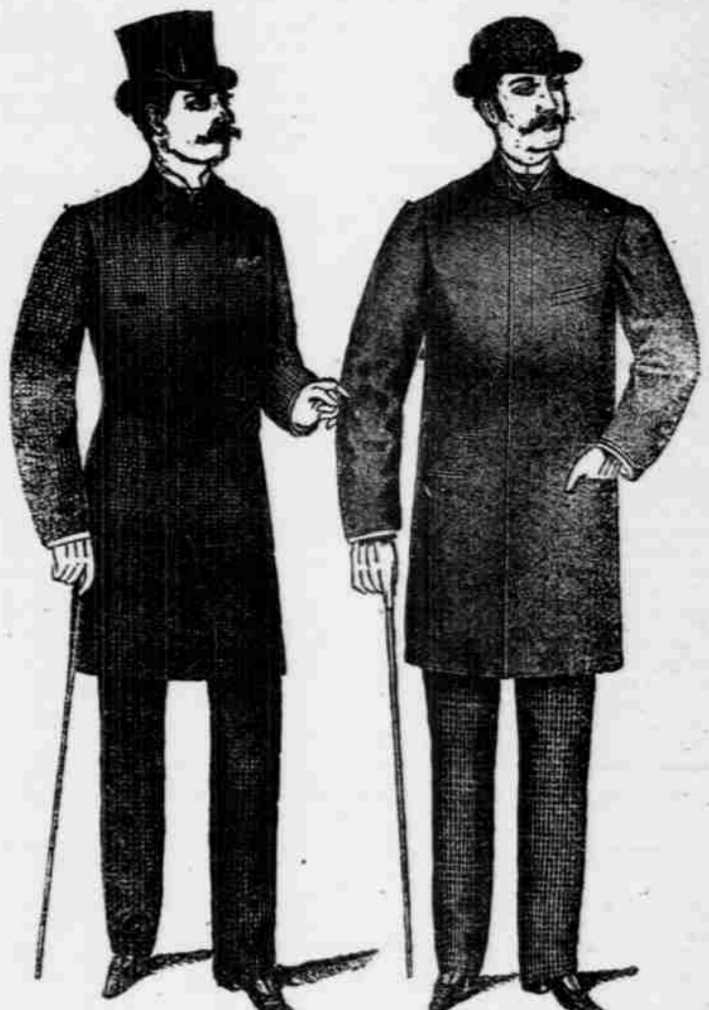
