The county court meets next Monday.

John West has been reappointed notary public at Westport.

The A. B. Field is being repaired and put in trim for the season's work.

The grand lodge of Oregon, I. O. O. G., meets at East Portland May 17th.

E. E. Goff leaves on Monday for Portland, and from there thinks of going east.

C. H. Oerkwitz has leased the Pacific house to Oysterville and will run it this season.

Lewis Morrison and his theatrical company want to play in Astoria about May 2nd.

Capt. J. H. D. Gray is having his wharf repaired and strengthened for the season's traffic.

Chaplain Stubbs has resigned as general superintendent of the Portland seaman's friend society.

P. O'Hara has opened a neat meat market on the roadway and is ready to supply customers in his line.

The roadway near Johansen's is in repair. There is about fifty feet east of there that will be in trim next week.

Geo. Harmon has given up a life on the ocean wave for the present and will try farming on his place near Knappa.

"April's Fool's Day" was observed yesterday by numerous practical jokes which, in general, were taken good naturedly.

Superintendent Stronach, the Portland manager of the Postal Telegraph company, says they will soon build a telegraph line to Astoria.

Antoine Nito, a Greek, aged 42, died of consumption at the hospital yesterday morning. The funeral will take place at 9:30 to-morrow morning.

The Alaskan, which is ten feet longer than the Olympian, is being overhauled at Portland for prospective summer travel on the lower Columbia.

The box sheet for the Adelaide Randall Bijou opera company's entertainment will open at the New York Novelty Store at ten o'clock this morning.

L. Carlson, proprietor of the saloon below Trullinger's mill, fell from the soda wagon on the roadway in that vicinity yesterday morning and broke his ankle.

The Astoria Iron Works have sent to Pittsburg for suitable steel for the building of the new boiler for No. One's engine, and will get to work at it upon its arrival.

The Gen. Miles upon her return from Shoalwater bay, will tow the Mountaineer to Seattle, she having been sold to parties there, and will return with a cargo of coal.

County warrants on fund "A" or "B" or "Z," or any other fund will be taken on par on subscriptions to this compendium of daily happenings, or the weekly edition thereof.

The trustees of the state insane asylum have bought thirty-five acres of land north of the asylum building at Salem as an extension of the grounds, paying \$3,960.40 therefor.

The Woman's Relief Corps will give the supper on the occasion of the ball for the benefit of the fire department tournament fund on the evening of the 11th inst., at Liberty Hall.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer is informed that beside the Mountaineer, the Union and Dispatch will be taken from here to that city to be used on the deeply, darkly, desperately blue waters of the Sound.

A new postoffice is established at the forks of Deep river, and Mrs. Mary E. Ferchen has been appointed postmaster thereof. The first mail out left that office yesterday. A large number of settlers will be accommodated by the office.

Prof. Van Scoy, president of the Willamette university, will preach at the Methodist church to-morrow morning and evening. After the morning sermon there will be a "wiping-out service on pledge," conducted by the pastor.

Eastern freights for Astoria must be on the cars in transit to-day to get the benefit of the low rates that vanish next Monday. Immense quantities of Pacific coast freight are on the way, many business men laying in supplies that they know they will use, for the year.

The lease of the O. R. & N. lines to the Union Pacific company is authentically reported to be in a practically completed form, with a few minor details to perfect and its final execution, will, in all probability be accomplished in New York next week. The lease is on a six per cent. basis.

The first accident of the season occurred on the river at 7:30 yesterday morning. "Black Martin," fishing for M. J. Kinney, upset above Tongue Point; he was taken off the bottom of the capsize boat by the steamer S. G. Reed; the boat and net was picked up by Wm. Smith and Harry Louderback.

In the upper Astoria school for the month ending yesterday, in Mr. M. H. Parker's room there were enrolled

21 boys and 21 girls, with an average daily attendance of 38. In Miss Lake's room there were 30 boys and 31 girls, with an average daily attendance of 52. The school is in a prosperous condition.

Some few boats went out yesterday, but compared to the number that will run later on it may be said that there is comparatively little gear in the water. Later on the number will be large. On the first of last July there were 1,542 boats in the water. By that time this year it is believed just as many will be running. There are thought to be enough here now to man the boats for the season of '87.

This morning, says Thursday's Telegram, Justice Tuttle examined into the cases of Peter Grant and Pat O'Brien, charged with kidnaping James Charze and Henry Lanterman, for the purpose of shipping them on an outward bound vessel. The court evidently did not find much in the case, because the accused were permitted to go on their own recognizance to appear before the grand jury.

C. G. McCord, the general agent of the Canadian Pacific railroad came down from Portland last Thursday and has been looking at dockage facilities, etc., ever since. He says he came to get away from the turmoil of business in Portland, but after half a day here he concluded he'd struck the wrong place for that, as we seemed to be the busiest burg he'd struck yet. And then he went to Fort Stevens.

Since his arrival numerous inquiries have been made of Capt. Reed, of the Wm. H. Starbuck, of the fortunes of Tiny Arizono, "Briektop" Wilson, Joe Langdon, "Chips" the carpenter and the Japanese, that sailed the deep with him on the voyage before last to Gotham. "Chips" lost three fingers off his right hand by a timber crushing them; the others lost some money in the Bowers, finally coming out all right and all are prospering in the metropolis.

The Adelaide Randall Bijou Opera company, which has won the plaudits of the southern and California press, will appear here on next Tuesday evening in Offenbach's sparkling opera, "The Princess of Trebizonde." The orchestra, chorus, costumes, etc., are of premier quality and the music loving of our population will have an opportunity next Tuesday evening of seeing what is pronounced to be one of the best operatic combinations in existence. The sale of reserved seats will begin at the New York Novelty store at ten o'clock this morning.

At Tacoma last Thursday, S. W. Wall, a newspaper man, shot at H. S. Harcourt, another newspaper man in the office of the Tacoma News. The bullet struck Harcourt in the breast, passed through his coat and vest, and was stopped by a steel shank in his cravat. R. P. Boise, the News local editor, jumped in and tried to take the revolver away from Wall. The pistol was again discharged, this time accidentally, the bullet shattering Boise's thumb. Wall then ran down stairs and was arrested and jailed in default of \$10,000 bail. The cause of the row is said to have been an attack on Wall, who is the Tacoma correspondent of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, by the News. Jealousy between the two towns is at the bottom of the trouble.

FR. BIDWELL, Cal., April 1.—The house of J. B. Bolin was burned last night and three of his sons, aged seven, ten and fifteen years, respectively, were burned to death. Bolin was absent at the time, and his wife is in a precarious condition on account of injuries from trying to save the boys. The two daughters escaped.

DEATH OF A GOOD MAN.  
FOREST GROVE, April 1.—Rev. Horace Lyman died at his residence here last night.

BLAINE'S OLD INVESTMENT.  
ST. LOUIS, April 1.—The Little Rock and Fort Smith railroad passed into Jay Gould's hands to-day.

RAGER INVESTORS.  
LOS ANGELES, April 1.—Over one hundred men stood in line last night waiting a chance to buy lots in the new town on the San Gabriel railroad. One boy was given \$75 for his place in the line. Business men spent the night on stools and chairs.

THE PEOPLE'S CONFIDENCE SHAKEN.  
CHARLESTON, April 1.—The appointment of Mowry causes the greatest indignation. The people's confidence is shaken in Congressman Widdle and Senator Wade Hampton.

WONDERFUL HAPPENINGS IN KENTUCKY.  
EVANVILLE, Ind., April 1.—Intelligence was received in this city to-day which tells of a singular volcanic disturbance and eruptions of blood in a river near New Concord, Callaway county, Kentucky, yesterday, that frightened the inhabitants out of their wits. The wells have all dried up. Explosions were heard all night. Columns of flames are continually shooting up.

BEALIN, April 1.—The Bulgarian regency will soon convoke the sobranje for prolonging the office of regent and revoking the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia. The new prince will not be elected, but the place will be kept open for Alexander.

THE COUNTY'S CASH BOX.  
Some Figures as to the Present Financial Status of the County.

A law passed by the last legislature makes it obligatory on the county officials of each county in the state to publish a financial statement of the county's affairs on the 1st of April and 1st of October of each year.

The necessary blanks have been somewhat delayed in arriving here, and the reports of the sheriff and treasurer are not yet in. County Clerk Trenchard has made up his reports to March 31st, and from the advance sheets, so to speak, of the reports, it is learned that since July 1st, 1886, there have been drawn county warrants as follows:

For the expenses of the clerk's office, \$247.25; for the expenses of the sheriff's office, \$610.08; circuit court expenses, \$2,701.31; county court, \$1,107; public property, \$1,793.03; incidentals and interest, \$1,055.62; insane and poor, \$1,054.14; coroner's office, \$204.55; assessor's office, \$1,000.05; roads and bridges, \$1,245.30; justice's courts, \$935.08; making a total of \$11,950.41; bonds outstanding, \$20,000; interest on same, due April 1st, 1887, \$8,000; warrants outstanding as per report July 2nd, 1886, \$44,190; amount due state as per last report, \$8,756.15; amount due state on taxes, 1886, \$4,303.17; warrants issued outstanding with interest (estimated) thereon, \$5,000; school fund per last report, \$1,116.16; school fund received, \$7,438.90.

The above makes a total of \$102,934.79. As a set off are credits as follows:  
Amount paid state treasurer, \$7,036.15; interest paid on bonds October 1st, 1886; school orders paid, \$2,073.30; warrants and interest thereon paid, \$13,247.46; warrants canceled, \$79.10; warrants not called for, \$810.55; cash on hand, \$2,283.28; cash due on sale sold, \$400; unpaid taxes of 1886, up to date of making out this report, \$17,339.12.

The above makes a total of \$68,768.96. From this the aggregate shows—Liabilities, \$102,934.79; assets, \$68,768.96; balance, \$34,165.83.

## ROISTEROUS BREEZES.

Considerable Air Moving in this Vicinity Yesterday.

At an early hour yesterday morning the rain stopped falling momentarily and the wind in great surges came screeching over the sheltering shoulder of the hills to the south-west to see why. As the clouds rolled away and the stars shone out, the gusts increased in force and frequency and by three o'clock the wind was blowing at the rate of fifty-five miles an hour. It knocked at doors and flung open shutters; it rattled the sash and swayed the windows; it shook the houses and lifted the porch eaves; it knocked over loose fences, howled in the halls, fluttered the paper on the walls, creaked the signs, swung the wires till the fire alarm sounded, roared in the attics, banged and hammered up and down the streets, and whistling in the rigging of the vessels in the stream woke the sailors to find that they were dragging their anchors. Then it flew out to sea, and with increased din and fury it met other roisterous spirits of the vasty deep and shrieked up and down the coast till sunrise.

In the city there was no damage done; from the river come reports of one vessel bumping into Booth's cannery, of the *Lady Isabella* and *Sir Henry Lawrence* being forced from their moorings on the sands, with, apparently, no damage, and over from Knappa is reported serious loss to a family named Butts, who had started from up the river to go to the North Shore Packing company, with some \$800 or \$900 worth of gear to work there during the season. When the storm struck the sea it sent it in wreck on the shore, the gear being all lost; the occupants managed to get away in a small boat and reached Knappa at daybreak. At Three Tree point two fishing boats went ashore, the men escaping, and at the Barbary coast, near Pillar Rock, two more boats were also driven ashore. Some cannery boats broke loose along the river front, but were regained, and when the force of the storm wester is considered, the wonder is that there was less of casualty.

"Rayo" Surprises San Franciscans.  
Several members of various athletic clubs of this city, who consider themselves good sprinters, indulged in some practice runs at the Bay District tract yesterday, but no record was kept of their efforts. A match race of 100 yards for a wager of \$100 was run by H. C. Thompson, of the Mission athletic club, and George Rayo, resulting in a victory for the latter in 11 1/4 seconds. Rayo won the race with ease. It surprised the Mission club boys. For three months Rayo has been watching his chance to swamp some of the amateur sprinters. He came down from Astoria about four months ago, and worked for a month in a grocery store at South San Francisco. Recently he has been working in a coal yard on Eighteenth and Folsom streets. He set his trap for Thompson and another celebrated amateur sprinter, Thompson's friends lost heavily yesterday. Rayo is a professional runner, and can speed 100 yards in about 10 1/4 seconds. — S. F. Call, March 29.
