Adheres to Former Instructions.
WASHINGTON, April 5.—In the matter of the restoration of lands granted to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from Portland to Astoria and from Forest Grove to McMinnville, in the state of Oregon, as provided by the act of forfeiture approved January 31, 1885, the secretary of the interior has decided on appeal of the Oregon & California railway company to adhere to the instructions issued July 8, 1885.
In determining what land shall be restored as adjacent to and continuous with uncompleted portions of the road, it is held that these lines form two distinct roads and that the lands lying northwest of Forest Grove in a quadrant, formed by the meeting of the separate grants, should be restored to the public domain as not lying opposite to and continuous with any portion of constructed roads. This decision will affect the disposition of about 275,000 acres of land.

Capsized in the Oeur d'Alene.
SPOKANE FALLS, April 5.—Nelson Martin's boat, the *Spokane*, struck on a drift about one and a half miles below Kingston, on the Oeur d'Alene river on her return trip to-day, and sank. Five lives are lost, as follows: J. C. Hanna of Spokane Falls, N. J. Higgins of Bangor, Maine, Mr. Pike, representing Hegele & Co., of Portland, Edward Jerome of Lewiston, and another man, name unknown. There were nineteen passengers on board at the time. A survivor of the accident states that nothing could be done to save any of the men who were lost, and from the swiftness of the current and the existence of drifts, it is only a wonder that more lives were not lost. The steamboat was taken completely under the drift. The captain and engineer were arrested, but set at liberty on their own recognizance. A party of men are making every effort to recover the bodies, but those acquainted with the locality consider the search useless.
