In the police court yesterday John Doe, whom many supposed dead, was fined \$5 for being drunk.

Theo. Bracker is enlarging his place of business and adding to the general conveniences of the establishment.

Rev. Geo. C. Hall has rented Capt. A. D. Wess' house, and will go to keeping house upon the arrival of Mrs. Hall from the east, who is expected here on the 10th inst.

The members of the Astoria fire department are called to meet at their respective engine houses in full uniform at 1:30 p. m., next Monday, for inspection and parade.

The bridge across the Willamette between Portland and East Portland, is about completed. It is 1,650 feet in length. It will be formally opened for business to-day or to-morrow.

A stage containing the Stutz theatrical company was upset in the Siskiyou mountains between Ashland and Yreka last Tuesday night, seriously injuring three of the occupants.

And now it is said the interstate commerce law will keep away a good many theatrical troupes. If this be so it will prove a blessing in disguise, as far as the aforesaid theatrical troupes are concerned.

Seaside Lodge No. 12, A. O. U. W., has offered a reward of \$50 for the recovery of the body of Wm. Wilson, a member of the lodge, drowned from a plunger in the stream above of Kinney's cannery, last Monday.

At three o'clock this afternoon E. C. Holden will sell at public auction on Gray's dock a lot of condemned U. S. property, consisting of blacksmiths and carpenters' tools, garden tools, spades, shovels, axes, etc. See advt.

There will be preaching in the Norwegian language in the Lutheran church, upper Astoria, this evening at 7:30. Next Sunday, Rev. H. Eng, pastor of the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran church, preaches his farewell sermon.

Capt. Babbidge of the S. G. Reed, says that whatever honor belongs to the saving of Martin Matson and his boat puller, on the 2nd inst., by right belongs to Capt. Kindred, who was on the boat, and had charge at the time of the rescue.

The "timber land fraud" cases were dismissed by U. S. district judge Allyn last Tuesday, at Vancouver. The U. S. grand jury that found the indictment was partially composed of women; the supreme court of the territory recently decided that women couldn't vote; hence, it is argued, they couldn't act as jurors; therefore, q. e. d., the indictments were quashed. The guilt or innocence of the accused plays no part in the proceedings. It was just a plain quash.

During March, says the News, 619 cabin passengers arrived here by steamer from San Francisco, and 800 in the steerage. During the same month 332 first class passengers and 1,084 immigrants passed Heron on the Northern Pacific, and 254 first class passengers and 1,193 immigrants passed Huntington on the Oregon Short line, bound this way. The total arrivals were 4,282, as compared with 2,100 for February, and 1,986 for January—a total of 8,369 for the first three months of the year.

Captain Charles F. Powell opened the bids in Portland last Tuesday for delivering 20,000 tons stone at Yaquina bay, for the jetty, as follows: Hoffman & Bates, \$12,000; M. S. Hart, \$12,600; Wilcox, \$15,000; P. O'Neill, \$15,000; Wiberg & Jansen, \$10,800; Bates & Steele, \$10,400; Keady & Fordyce, \$23,000; Ingham & Newton, \$9,600. The stone is to be delivered on scows within fifteen miles of Newport, the delivery to begin about May 1. The contractor is prohibited from employing alien labor on the work. The contract was awarded to the lowest bidder subject to the approval of the department at Washington.

A TESTIMONIAL OF REGARD.

(Wisner, Nebraska, Chronicle 2.)

The Congregational churches of West Point and Wisner are without a pastor. Last Sunday completed the second year of Prof. G. C. Hall's ministerial services here, and as has been announced he had resigned the pastorate of these churches to accept a call to Astoria, Oregon.

Several weeks ago a joint committee was chosen from the two societies to draft resolutions expressive of the respect in which he was held by his flocks here and of their feelings upon the dissolution of the relations that have existed between them and him. The following are the resolutions:

WHEREAS, It has pleased the Great Shepherd that the beloved pastor of the Congregational churches at Wisner and West Point, Nebraska, should be called to a broader field of labor and usefulness, be it

Resolved, By the members of the congregations aforesaid, in joint conference assembled, that, with deep regret, we heard the call, long apprehended, summoning from us the watchful shepherd of our little flocks, whose brief stay among us has been a constant inspiration to higher aims and nobler thoughts, and for whom even our early indifference was turned to deep respect, our love to tender reverence;

That, in the departure of the Rev. George C. Hall, we lose a faithful pastor and a genial friend, whose only enemy was the hydra-headed monster whom he so fearlessly fought in all forms, whose only ambition was to do the will of Him who sent him; and to be it further

Resolved, That we heartily congratulate the brethren in Astoria, upon the accession to their pastorate of a tireless, earnest worker in the Master's vineyard; and especially do we commend to their society, their love and their tender care one "whose own works praise her in the gates," a kind, loving, noble, Christian woman.

The "Olympian" and the "Oregon."

The O. R. & N. steamer Olympian, now under charter to the Pacific Coast Steamship company as a summer excursion boat on their Alaska route, sailed from Astoria on Wednesday last for San Francisco, under command of Capt. Carroll. She had a summer sea and reeled off about fourteen miles per hour down to the latitude of Coos bay, where she ran into a hurricane which lasted about fourteen hours. She stood it pretty well until about 4 p. m. on Thursday, when a big sea stove in her starboard wheel. Fortunately the steamer Oregon was close in sight and Capt. Carroll set his ensign for a relief.

"What can I do for you?" asked Capt. Pohlman, as he drew alongside. "Send me a carpenter, if you please," was the laconic reply. The Oregon lowered her boat under the charge of her first officer, with two sailors and a carpenter. They pulled to the disabled ship, now listed over with a big weight of water on her after decks, and were about to climb on board when the boat was swamped under the Olympian's guards. All four men were in the water, but lines and life-buoys were lowered to them and they were hauled safely aboard. In three hours the carpenter had repaired all damages, and the Olympian stood on her course, arriving in port four hours behind the Oregon. But it was a close call for the four men in the boat.—Ex.
