Mr. Lewis, secretary Wisconsin Y. M. C. A., will arrive this afternoon.

The express companies have raised their rates—interstate commerce law.

Capt. Wm. Hobson brought the Quikstep from the Sound yesterday.

Vancouver has subscribed over \$400 toward the tournament fund so far.

The receipts of the social at Mrs. G. C. Flavel's last Thursday evening, were \$28.

THE WEEKLY ASTORIAN, printed at home and full of home news, is published this morning.

The first excursion of the season starts from Portland to-day for the Cascades.

Gov. Penoyer has been asked to commute Marple's death sentence to imprisonment for life.

Sheriff Ross has begun to levy on the delinquent tax list, the last days of grace having expired.

Gov. Semple takes charge as chief executive across the river to-day. The place is worth about \$3,000 a year.

Since the removal of Gov. Squire, threats to move the Chinese out of Seattle by force are becoming frequent.

Miss Nina Larowe will give a readying for the benefit of the church at the M. E. church next Thursday evening.

The Portland Democrat has got onto Artfield and bunco Kelly. The lead is a promising one, and worth following up.

Counterfeit silver dollars are reported plenty in neighboring towns. Look out for them. They are said to be mostly dated 1925.

If Umattilla county's delinquent taxes were all paid the county would be only \$4,186.50 in debt. But the delinquent taxes total \$54,148.29.

Judge C. H. Page has returned from Portland. While in that city he was the recipient of deserved complimentary mention from the press.

The coast survey steamer McArthur is refitting at Mare Island. When finished she will make a hydrographic cruise along the coast of Oregon.

The steam collier San Pedro recently made the trip from Tacoma in 66 hours, averaging 13 knots an hour. This is believed to be the fastest trip on record between these ports.

The Idaho is to sail today for Alaska. She takes considerable freight and passengers from here for Chilkat, where D. L. Beck & Sons ship a large consignment of supplies.

After May 1st the time between Astoria and San Francisco, via O. & C. railroad, will be 52 hours. On that date daily trains will be put on from Portland, leaving there at four p. m.

A dozen new vessels were launched from the Main street wharf yesterday, the product of Astoria mechanics. They are of small tonnage, but in the aggregate make a good showing.

The British bark Martha Fisher cleared for Queenstown yesterday with 44,019 bush wheat, worth \$28,200, and sailed for the home port. The barkentine Portland started in tow to the interior.

Mr. E. C. Holden will represent Oregon at the general Presbyterian assembly at Omaha next month. While east he contemplates a trip to his native home in England, which he has not visited for forty years.

By authority of the lieutenant general, U. S. A. Major Chas. A. Wilkoff is appointed inspector of the rifle practice for the department of the Columbia, to relieve Lieut. James N. Allison, Second Cavalry.

The United States revenue cutter Bear, which has been undergoing repairs at Vallejo, is expected to start on her regular summer cruise to the Behring sea to protect the seal interests, to-day. The Corwin accompanies her.

It is reported that sealing schooners have been given the three-league limit, which permits them to catch seal within nine miles from land, whereas before they were not allowed such a chance to catch the seals and were obliged to hunt for them at sea.

The fourteen-year-old son of Dunsmuir Douglas, who works at Saml. Elmore's cannery, failed to come home at the usual hour yesterday afternoon, and diligent search by his alarmed father and friends up to eleven o'clock last night failed to furnish any clue as to his whereabouts.

The indications are that there will soon be an unusual flow of water down the Columbia river. The heaviest fall of snow that has occurred for years fell the past winter in the mountains on the upper Columbia. Portland and The Dalles, says an up-country exchange, would do well to set their houses in order and prepare for the overflow.

Last Thursday evening Chas. Johnson, fishing for the Anglo-American Packing Co., started above Tongue Point to put out his net. A squall coming up, he told the boat puller to take down the sail. While doing so the boom flew around and hit Johnson, knocking him overboard, and throwing the boatpuller between it and the gunwale of the boat. Before he could recover himself his unfortunate companion had disappeared. The drowned man was a Russian Finn, unmarried, 28 years of age. His countrymen offer \$25 reward for the recovery of the body.

About six weeks ago, says the Walla Walla Union, a farmer named Thomas C. Ried, occupying Mrs. McEzard's farm on Mill creek, left for Portland with his team, ostensibly to secure employment. After reaching Portland he wrote to his wife, saying that she had been a good wife, but as they could not get along together it was best they should part. The unfortunate woman is left destitute, with three small children. Everything Ried had is mortgaged, even to the sewing machine, which he directs his wife to return to the agent, Ried is in Portland with a widow of considerable means.

Beaver Lodge No. 33, I. O. O. F., will celebrate the 85th anniversary of the founding of the order, at their room next Tuesday evening, on which occasion the programme will be as follows: Music by the band from 7:30 to 8; opening ode, by the lodge; prayer; music, by the choir; remarks of N. John George, who lives some seven miles below Astoria, was in Newport yesterday, says the News of the 19th, and reports the wreck of the steamer Dawn ashore at that place. It will be remembered that this little steamer drifted out over the Columbia bar some two or three months ago, and was taken in tow by the Empire, but during a storm she parted her cable and was abandoned at sea. Last Saturday she came ashore, bottom up, at the place above mentioned. Mr. George succeeded in saving her propeller and shaft and a portion of her steel gear. He thinks her engine and boiler are in the surf a short distance south of that place and can probably be saved. It was very near this place that the bottle came ashore, containing the story of the vessel's loss and the suffering and starvation of the crew.

A New York dispatch says: Another effect of the interstate law in transportation of salmon from the Pacific coast to eastern markets. This industry furnishes a large amount of freight to transcontinental roads during the season, and there has been in the past active competition for it. Last season, during the war in rates the tariff was forced down, and even at the low rates then prevailing the Canadian Pacific railroad was in the field, and succeeded in getting a good deal of business. It is now understood that the Canadian Pacific railroad is making a \$1 rate to salmon packers to Chicago. The rate is proportionally low to eastern points, with more than fair prospects of securing a larger part of the business unless the interstate commission comes to the rescue. Pacific coast business has almost ceased.

Apportionment of County School Monies. County school superintendent is completed at 9:45 last evening the apportionment of county school monies to the several districts as follows: To each of the school districts the sum of \$50, was appropriated, making \$1,100. To district No. One, with 615 pupils, was appropriated \$1,697.40, making a total with the \$50, of \$1,747.40. To district No. 2, with 64 pupils, a total of \$226.64; No. 3, 28 pupils, \$127.28; No. 4, 22 pupils, \$110.72; No. 5, 25 pupils, \$121.76; No. 6, no report; No. 7, 34 pupils, \$149.84; No. 8, 43 pupils, \$178.68; No. 9, 155 pupils, \$477.80; No. 10, 39 pupils, \$156.64; No. 11, 50 pupils, \$198; No. 12, 35 pupils, \$149.80; No. 13, 30 pupils, \$132.80; No. 14, 37 pupils, \$152.12; No. 15, 26 pupils, \$121.76; No. 16, 28 pupils, \$127.28; No. 17, 26 pupils, \$121.76; No. 18, 488 pupils, \$1,396.88; No. 19, 29 pupils, \$130.64; No. 20, 24 pupils, \$116.24; No. 21, 37 pupils, \$152.12; No. 22, 28 pupils, \$127.28; No. 23, 15 pupils, \$91.40. ## LATEST TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

St. Augustine, Fla., April 22.—The war department has ordered the removal to Mount Vernon, Alabama, of the Apaches confined in Fort Marion. IDENTIFIED.

Globe, Arizona, April 22.—The man arrested here as Wm. Springer Colton, the wife murderer, has been identified as the right man. A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

North Yakima, April 22.—A fearful accident occurred on the Cascade branch of the Northern Pacific railroad four miles from Cle-elum, last Thursday afternoon. A train ran into a construction train, the engine and the two men in it being flung into a crushed mass. Altogether there were seven killed and twelve wounded. The accident was on account of a failure to flag as per orders.

Tucson, April 22.—The freight conductors and brakemen on this division of the Southern Pacific railroad have struck. They want 300 hours for a month's work instead of 400. The company retorts by declaring that seventeen hours constitute a day's work.

CLEAR OF SMALL POX. LOS ANGELES, April 22.—The last yellow flag was taken down yesterday. Outside of the pest house, the city is clear of small pox.

CANNERY SUPPLIES. SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—The schooner Viking is taking aboard a full equipment for a salmon cannery. SNOW IN THE ROCKIES.

CHEYENNE, April 22.—A severe snow storm is raging in the Rockies between Ogden and Cheyenne. Freight trains had to be sidetracked.

SALMON SPECULATIONS. SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—The salmon pack of '87 is estimated at a million cases. 550,000 cases are already sold. The Sacramento fishing promises to be less a feature than ever. Illegal fishing at all seasons, debris and seines will destroy almost the whole business.

In the evening a union service will be held in the M. E. church, when Mr. Lewis will deliver an address. The gentlemen attending the international convention from Astoria, are E. A. Stokes, C. A. Hanson, president, Rev. O. B. Whitmore, G. A. Charnock, general secretary.

## "YELLOWSTONE KIT," THE MESSIAH.

A Pacific Coast Fakir Turns Religious Exhorter.

Everyone in Astoria remembers a street fakir who worked Astoria in '83 and '84. He was a low-sized, stout individual with black, bead like eyes, and a mass of curly black hair, crowned with a sombrero, gaudy with bullion braid. He pulled in quite a lot of money with an old game that was taught in the Sunday schools in Arkansas twenty years ago, but which served his purpose. He called himself "Yellowstone Kit." This same individual has recently turned up down south: A Jacksonville, Fla., dispatch says: "A most peculiar sight is witnessed on the streets of Jacksonville these evenings. The colored populace of the city and suburbs, even for miles into the country, seem to be possessed with feelings of frenzy over a man who has been restoring sight to the blind, making the lame walk, and curing by the laying on of hands. At least 'people enthused think so.' "So far has this man, who travels under the grandiloquent name of 'Yellowstone Kit,' worked upon these people that he lectures them upon their moral duties, voting, social conditions, rights, religious beliefs, and has created more furor among them than Sam Jones ever created among the southern whites. "He harangues violently, with a peculiar flow of words, dresses gorgeously and gives away barrels of bread, crackers, meat and dresses to colored women and colored servants in hotels and families. The latter leave their work to such an extent while they hover about the speaking stand that complaints come in numerously to the city authorities on the matter. "Last night over 4,000 whites and blacks, many respectable citizens among the former, were gathered about his stand, when some one threw a stone, aimed at 'Kit,' but which striking an electric light demolished the globe. In an instant a wild uproar followed, people crowded about the stand, thinking an assault was intended on him they styled 'Second Messiah.' "Riot was imminent when the sheriff came over, but by his loud outcry the 'Messiah' hushed the crowd and had the blacks completely under control. He lectures in favor of gamblers on coming elections, and is the talk of the day. He is a man of slender build, dark, swarthy features, curling, kinking hair of raven blackness, piercing blue eyes, and dresses very gaudily, fairly blazing with genuine diamonds. "In Key West excitement ran so high that factions were formed and an attempt to assassinate 'Kit' was made, in which he was severely injured. "In Tallahassee, Fla., Bannbridge and Albany, Ga., and other sections of the state the same peculiar excitement existed among the colored people, all claiming that he is the 'Messiah.' "It is said that he carried away \$20,000 from Key West as a recompense for his arduous work of faith. If the excitement continues here he will leave this city with considerably more than that."
