CINCINNATI, April 23.—Unusual rains throughout Ohio have caused the river to rise rapidly. At noon today the Ohio river was 43 feet above high water and rising rapidly.

MIXING RAILROAD BRIDGES.

The reason why the Oregon and California railroad has not yet pushed its way across the Klamath river was learned by a reporter yesterday. It is an old story, but one which a railroad man who can account for the curious mixing up of freight while in transit, will readily believe.

The Southern Pacific company shipped from New York sections of an iron bridge to be thrown across the Klamath, and about the same time a Mexican railway company ordered a similar bridge which arrived at New Orleans with that of the Southern Pacific company.

A general jumble of the two bridges was effected in some mysterious way at New Orleans, and when the material arrived at the Klamath river, the bridge builders concluded that the contractors had sent them a Japanese puzzle to put together.

Then a batch of angry telegrams was received at New Orleans from the City of Mexico, and the agents of the Southern Pacific company began to understand that some one had blundered, and that the cost of the blunder, involving the shipment of several carloads of iron a round distance of 4,000 miles, would have to be borne by the Southern Pacific company.

The bridge over the Klamath will probably be finished by May 1st, and there will remain only twenty-nine miles of track to build to complete the line to a connection with the California and Oregon at Ashland.—S. F. Chronicle

DROWNING OF "WHISKY BILL."

Wm. Lennert, better known as "Whisky Bill," was drowned at the station at Sand Island, last Friday night. He fell off the board walk between the net racks and the mess house, into two or three fathoms of water, being intoxicated at the time. The body was recovered where it fell, yesterday morning and brought to town. The funeral will be at eleven o'clock this forenoon.

The fishermen who brought his body to the city express considerable indignation against the proprietors of two whisky saws at Point Ellice, who, they assert, are responsible for this man's death. They state that the proprietor of one of these saws called Lennert over from the station Friday afternoon and plied him with liquor till his money was all gone and then sent him adrift, drunk, and alone, in his boat at nine o'clock. He made the net racks all right, but in trying to cross to the mess house, fell and lost his life.
