LATEST TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. Seven Men Killed at a Mexican Wedding

PITTSBURG, April 26.—This morning a fire broke out in a four story brick building, the upper stories of which were occupied by roomers, and was almost totally destroyed. Two of the occupants were found dead; they died of suffocation. Two jumped and it is believed were fatally hurt.

CHILLESTON, April 26.—It was a beautiful day for unveiling the Calhoun monument. There were tremendous crowds present. Secretary Lamar was the orator of the day. There was a great rush to hear him.

MILWAUKEE, April 26.—After brief services here, Alexander Mitchell was buried at the Forest Home cemetery to-day.

POSTPONED TILL OCTOBER. LONDON, April 26.—Dr. Parker has received so many letters urging him not to go to Brooklyn to conduct the Beecher memorial services on account of fears of excessive heat that he has resolved to postpone his visit till October.

A FATAL FIGHT. CITY OF MEXICO, April 26.—During the festivities at a wedding here to-day, a free fight was indulged in, in which seven men were killed, including the bridegroom.

LAUNCHED. LONDON, April 26.—The Thistle, which will go to America to compete for the America's cup, was launched to-day.

OVERRULED. CHICAGO, April 26.—Judge Tully has overruled the change of venue for the Chicago hoodlums.

COOL WEATHER. LYNCHBURG, Va., April 26.—Cool weather prevails throughout this region. The mountains are covered with snow.

SNOW IN GREAT BRITAIN. LONDON, April 26.—A heavy snow storm is reported throughout Scotland and Wales.

NO CHOLERA IN MEXICO. SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—The American consul at Mazatlan telegraphs that there is no cholera in Mexican ports. The reports were started during the late election, doubtless for political reasons.

MORE WARLIKE. LONDON, April 26.—It is rumored that Germany will keep Schuabell a good many years. If France wants him she will have to send her armies for him. There are rumors circulating that Bismarck expects to implicate Gen. Boulanger with Schnobels in treason.

ST. ELMO'S LIGHT. Seen on a Fishing Boat in the Columbia River. The crew of boat No. 32, of the Cutting Packing Company, report that last Monday night they noticed a ball of fire on the masthead of their fishing boat, they being abreast of Fort Stevens at the time; the wind blowing a squall; in a moment it played around lower down, ran out to the end of the sprit, and as one of the men made a move to transfer itself to the back collar of his son's vest, where it glowed with great brilliancy and then disappeared. One of the men said "it looked to be just the size of one of the electric lights in town and was just as bright."

St. Elmo's light, as these lights are called, is a common phenomenon on board ship, and is usually seen on the top of one of the masts, at the ends of the yards and other points on the vessel during a squall. They are usually considered harmless. This is the first instance brought to our knowledge where a phenomenon was observed in the Columbia river.

DEATH OF JAMES DUFFY. An Old and Well Known Astorian Passes Away.

By the death of James Duffy at St. Vincent's hospital Monday night, says the Portland Welcome, the last of the old-time stewards between San Francisco and Panama in the early fifties, leaves these scenes of toil and woe. As early as 1859 Jimmy opened the famous El Dorado saloon in San Francisco, which he conducted for a number of years, but his friends one by one dying, or seeking new fields, he sold out and struck out for Portland, where he soon found employment as bartender in the American Exchange hotel on Front and Washington streets, then ran under the management of Jumbo & Perkins. Here he remained from 1869 until that structure was partially destroyed by fire in 1879. After this he went to Astoria and presided over the Parker House for a number of years, and finally drifted back to this city, where with Bob King, now circuit court bailiff, he opened a neat place on Alder street. Failing in this, his last effort, he took sick and gradually dwindled away to but a shadow of his former self. He was buried from the hospital, Tuesday last, and his funeral was attended by many of the old-timers who knew him, and knew him well in the ups and downs of his eventful life. He spent last summer at Clatsop beach.

The O. R. & N. Lease Signed. NEW YORK, April 25.—The lease of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company was signed to-day. The lease is to the Oregon Short Line, but the Union Pacific guarantees the payment of the Oregon Railway & Navigation bonds and interest thereon, and a 6 per cent. dividend. The lease is for ninety years.

NEW YORK, April 25.—Charles Francis Adams signed for the Short Line, Judge Dillon for the Union Pacific and ex-Governor Hawley for the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, and Elijah Smith for the Oregon & Transcontinental. The first named company will resume its functions as a construction company, building the necessary feeders for the Union Pacific. It is believed that the result will be pushed for a more important voice in the Northern Pacific board at the next election.

The Tribune says: The lease was virtually agreed upon last November, but there were many difficulties to overcome, the last being President Adams, as to the situation about giving the guarantee. This was finally overcome, but owing to certain legal hindrances, the lease was made to the Short Line instead of to the Union Pacific outright.
